WHEREAS it is expedient in the present State of the Subjects of Her Most Faithful Majefly, and during the Interruption in Commercial Correspondence between Great Britain and Portugal, that Claims should be permitted to be given for Portuguese Property brought in and detained by His Majesty's Ships of War and Privateers; His Majesty is pleased, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, that Claims for Portuguese Property, given by Perfons duly authorized by the Owners, or by the Conful or other Person authorized by the Portuguese Minister resident at this Court, shall be admitted in the High Court of Admiralty; and it is further ordered, that immediate Restitution shall pass of all fuch Property as shall appear by the Bills of La-ding or other Documents found on board Portuguele Ships, coming from Portuguele Settlements to the Ports of Portugal, to belong to Her Most Faithful Majesty, or to any of Her Subjects residing at the Date of this Order, in the Brazils, or in any Foreign Settlement belonging to Her Crown, or in England, or in any Country in Amity with His Majesty, upon a general Claim for every such Ship and Goods, given by the Consul under the Authority aforesaid: And it is further ordered, that the Property of the Subjects of Her Most Faithful Majesty, at the Date of this Order, reliding in Portugal, either belonging to them separately, or jointly with Subjects residing in the Brazils, or other Places beforementioned, shall be pronounced to belong as claimed, upon a general Claim given for the same on board such Portuguese Ships as aforesaid: And it is further ordered, that the Property last-mentioned,

Portuguese Property, and belonging to Persona resident in Portugal at the Date of this Order, shall remain subject to His Majesty's further Orders; and, in the mean Time, shall be put into the Joint Cultody of Agents to be named on Behalf of His Majesty, and on Behalf of the Portuguese Minister refident at this Court, or of any Claimant; and that fuch Parts thereof as are perishable, or which it may be otherwise expedient to fell, shall be fold by the aforesaid Agents, under Commissions to be issued by the High Court of Admiralty, and the Proceeds depolited in the faid Court: - And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majetty's Treasury, His Majetty's Principal Secretaries of State, the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, and the Judges of the High Court of Admiralty and Courts of Vice Admiralty, are to take the necessary Measures herein as to them shall respectively appertain. Copy of a Letter from Admiral Montagu, Commander in Chief of His Majesty's Ships and Vessels at Portsmouth and Spithead, to the Honourable W. W. Pole, dated on board the Royal William, at Spithead, the 20th Instant.

SIR,

HAVE the Honour to inclose, for the Information of my Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, a Letter which I have received from Lieutenant Tracey, commanding the Linnet Brig, giving an Account of the Capture of La Courier, French Lugger Privateer, which shews much Judgment and Gallantry in that Officer.

His Majesty's Brig Linnet, at Sea, January 16, 1808.

I HAVE the Honour to inform you, on Saturday the 16th Instant, Cape Barsleur W. by N. Six or Seven Leagues, I saw a French Lugger in chace of an English Ship and Brig: The Two latter I immediately joined, and thought proper to run in Company with them until Night should favour my closing with the Lugger. At half-past Six P. M. the Lugger commenced a Fire on the Ship, which the gallantly returned. At Seven the Lugger attempted to haul off; but my being within Musket-shot rendered his Attempt fruitles. Ten Miuutes past Seven I fired a Broadside of Round and Grape, with a Volley of Musketry, which carried away his Bowsprit and Main Lugg. I then hailed him to strike; instead of which she hoisted her Lugg. I then commenced a steady Fire, which lasted One Hour and a Half, (with Round, Grape, and Musketry;) during which Time her Luggs were knocked down, and as often hoisted, (at least Ten Times.) Fifty Minutes past Eight, being in a sinking State, hailed she had struck: proves to be Le Courier of Cherbourg, commanded by Captain Alex. Black, mounting Eighteen Guns, with a Complement of Sixty Men; Second Captain of which was killed, and Three Seamen wounded; fails remarkably fast; out Four Days; made no Capture; but came from under the Isles of Marcou at Eleven A. M. this Instant, as well as all other Property, under private Claims I where the anchored for Shelter from the late Gale.
