THE following Addresses having been transmitted to the Right Honourable Lord Hawkebury, His Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for the Home Department, have been by his Lordship presented to the King; which Addresses His Majesty was pleased to receive very graciously:

To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty.

*Most Gracious Sovereign,*

WE, your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Mayor, Bailiffs, and Burgesses of the Borough of Berwick-upon-Tweed, in Guild assembled, beg Leave to approach your Majesty with this our humble Address relative to the present eventful Period.

We are fully aware of the Danger to which we are exposed from the gigantic Power and insatiate Ambition of an Usurper, by whom a great Part of Europe has been enthralled; and we are sensible that as this Country now presents the only Barrier to his universal Dominion, he will not soon relinquish the Idea of its Subjugation: Yet while we contemplate the Energy of the Measures adopted by your Majesty's Government, we feel confident that, under Divine Providence, we shall be able to fetter and controul this Disturber of the World, and convince him that the Stability of your Majesty's Dominions is not to be shaken by any Combination of Forces which he can bring against them.

Deeply impressed with these Sentiments, and convinced that the Contest in which we are engaged is for the Preservation of every Thing most dear to us as Men; and that Peace can only be hoped for by a steady Perseverance in opposing the Enemy, we feel it our Duty to assure your Majesty that we are ready to make every Sacrifice, and to use every Exertion which may be necessary for maintaining the Honour and Safety of your Majesty's Crown, together with the Freedom, the Independence, and the Prosperity of the British Empire.

Aware of the Obstacles which the Enemy ever throws in the Way of actual Negotiation for a solid Peace, we are determined cheerfully to submit to every Privation attendant on, and to contribute every Aid in our Power towards the Prosecution of the War in which the Nation is engaged;—a War unexampled in History for the Mode in which it is conducted on the Side of the Enemy, but which is waged on the Part of your Majesty for the Preservation of all that is dear to Britons. And we rejoice in those vigorous Measures lately adopted by your Majesty's Ministers, which we hope will be continued, and which, under Divine Providence, we are persuaded are the only effectual Means of bringing about an honourable and permanent Peace. More and more convinced of the inestimable Value of your Majesty's Life, we continually offer up our Prayers to the Supreme Being for its prolonged Preservation.
