HE following Addresses having been transmitted to the Right Honourable Lord Hawkesbury, His Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for the Home Department, have been by his Lordship presented to the King; which Addresses His Majesty was pleased to receive very graciously:

To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty,

The humble Address of the Noblemen, Gentlemen, Freeholders, and other Inhabitants of the County of Banff.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

WE, the Noblemen, Gentlemen, Freeholders, and other Inhabitants of the County of Banff, beg Leave to approach your Royal Presence, actuated

At this awful Conjuncture we are folicitous to renew our Assurances of unshaken Attachment to your Majesty's Person, Family, and Government; and to express in this public Manner our firm Resolution of maintaining to the utmost of our Power the Honour and Dignity of your Majesty's Crown, and the true Interests of the United Kingdom.

While we contemplate, with unfeigned Concern, the Nations around us crouching before an ambitious and powerful Conqueror, we felicitate ourselves as Inhabitants of a more favoured Land, which has hitherto been enabled to withstand the siercest Rage of the Enemy, which has Courage to resist his Encroachments, and Power to check the Progress of his Devastations.

We are not infensible of the Dangers which fur-round us, nor indifferent to the vast Resources of a persevering Foe; but these serve only to confirm us in Attachment to that unrivalled Constitution, of which he would attempt to deprive us.

Firm in the inspiring Considence of a good Cause, and humbly relying on the Protection of the Supreme Ruler, we pledge ourielves not to relax our strenuous Exertions for the Prefervation of that precious Inheritance which we derive from our Ancestors, neither murmuring at the Sacrifices we may be called upon to make, nor shrinking from the Difficulties we may encounter in the arduous Contest.

That your Majesty may long continue to reign on the Throne of this Kingdom, and in the Hearts of a faithful and united People, is the most servent Wish and Prayer of your Majesty's dutiful and loyal Subjects of the County of Banff.
