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**A**T the Court at the *Queen's Palace*, the 30th of *March* 1808,

P R E S E N T,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

**W**HEREAS His Majesty, by His Order in Council of the Eleventh of November last, was pleased to order and declare, that all Trade in Articles which are of the Produce or Manufacture of France or her Allies, or of any other Country at War with His Majesty, or from which, although not at War with His Majesty, the British Flag is excluded, or of the Colonies belonging to His Majesty's Enemies, should be deemed and considered to be unlawful (except as is therein excepted): And whereas His Majesty, by His further Order in Council of the Twenty-fifth of November last, was pleased to order and declare, that nothing in the aforesaid Order of the Eleventh November contained, should extend to subject to Capture and Confiscation any Articles of the Produce and Manufacture of the said Countries and Colonies laden on board British Ships, which would not have been subject to Capture and Confiscation if such Order had not been made.

His Majesty, taking the said Orders into Consideration, is pleased, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, that nothing in the said last-mentioned Order shall extend, or be construed to extend, to authorize British Ships to export and convey any Articles of the Produce or Manufacture of the said Countries, or Colonies, from Guernsey, Jersey, Man, Gibraltar, Malta, or from any Neutral or Allied Country, to any other Country or Place than to a Port of the United Kingdom, unless such Articles shall have been previously imported into such Places as aforesaid from some Port of the United Kingdom. And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty,

and the Judges of the High Court of Admiralty and Vice-Admiralty, are to take the necessary Measures herein as to them may respectively appertain.

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

**W**HEREAS by an Act, passed in the present Session of Parliament, intituled "An Act for further continuing, until Three Months after the Ratification of a Definitive Treaty of Peace, an Act made in the Forty-fourth Year of His present Majesty, for permitting the Importation into Great Britain of Hides, and other Articles in Foreign Ships;" it is enacted, that an Act, made in the Forty-fourth Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, intituled "An Act for permitting, until the Fifth Day of May, One thousand eight hundred and five, the Importation of Hides, Calf-Skins, Horns, Tallow, and Wool, (except Cotton-Wool,) in Foreign Ships, on Payment of the like Duties as if imported in British or Irish Ships," which by an Act, made in the Forty-fifth Year of His present Majesty, was revived and further continued until the Twenty-fifth Day of March, One thousand eight hundred and six, and extended to Goat-Skins imported in Foreign Ships; and which was further continued by an Act, made in the Forty-seventh Year of His present Majesty, until the Twenty-fifth Day of March One thousand eight hundred and eight, shall be, and the same is thereby further continued until Three Months after the Ratification of a Definitive Treaty of Peace: And whereas, in virtue of the Powers vested in His Majesty by the several former Acts above recited, His Majesty was pleased by His Order in Council of the Eighteenth Day of November last, to permit, until the Twenty-fifth Day of this instant March, the Importation in Foreign Ships of any Hides, Pieces of Hides, dressed or undressed, Calf-Skins, or Pieces of Calf-Skins, dressed or undressed, Horns, or Pieces of Horns, Tallow, and Wool, (except Cotton Wool,) and Goat-Skins dressed or undressed, on the Terms specified in the said Order: And whereas it is judged

expedient that the said Permission should be continued for some Time longer, His Majesty is thereupon pleased, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, pursuant to the Powers vested in His Majesty by the Act passed in the present Session of Parliament, to allow, and doth hereby allow, for the Space of Six Months, from the Twenty-fifth Day of this instant March, the Importation of any Hides, Pieces of Hides, dressed or undressed, Calf-Skins, or Pieces of Calf-Skins, dressed or undressed, Horns, or Pieces of Horns, Tallow, and Wool, (except Cotton Wool,) and Goat-Skins, dressed or undressed, in any Foreign Ship or Vessel; and His Majesty doth hereby order, that on the Arrival at any Port of the United Kingdom of any Foreign Ship or Vessel, with any of the Articles above-mentioned, the said Goods shall be admitted to Entry on Payment of the same Duties of Customs and Excise as are due and payable on the like Goods when imported in any British or Irish-built Ship or Vessel:—And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury are to give the necessary Directions herein accordingly.

**THIS** Day a Deputation, consisting of the Right Hon. the Lord Mayor, Twelve Aldermen, the Recorder, the Sheriffs, and Twelve of the Common Council, of the City of London, waited upon His Majesty at the Queen's Palace, (being introduced by Lord Somerville, the Lord in Waiting,) with the following Address, which was read by John Silvester, Esq; the Recorder.

To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty,

The humble and dutiful Address of the Lord Mayor, Aldermen, and Commons of the City of London, in Common Council assembled.

*Most Gracious Sovereign,*

**WE**, your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Lord Mayor, Aldermen, and Commons of the City of London, in Common Council assembled, humbly approach the Throne with renewed Assurances of our unshaken Attachment to your Majesty's sacred Person and Government.

Your Majesty's faithful Citizens of London are truly sensible of the Blessings which the People of this Country enjoy in a peculiar Manner; for whilst it has pleased the Almighty to permit the Overthrow of many Nations of Europe, we have the Happiness yet to possess, unimpaired, our glorious Constitution, to be governed by the mildest and most benevolent of Sovereigns, and to be protected by good and wholesome Laws, wisely administered. To obtain these Blessings our Forefathers freely shed their Blood; they are placed in our Hands as a precious Pledge; and we fondly hope that our Children's Children will enjoy the same to the latest Period of Time.

We are not unmindful, Sir, that, by the preponderating Influence of the Government of France,

almost every State upon the Continent has been compelled to unite in forming one vast gigantic Confederacy; whose Efforts are solely directed to bring Destruction upon your Majesty's Dominions.

We view this Combination without Dread, firmly relying upon a Continuation of the Divine Protection, upon Union amongst all Ranks of your People, the Extinction of Party Spirit, (most essentially necessary at this very important Crisis,) upon the Goodness of our Cause, the Valour and Skill of your Majesty's Fleets and Armies, and on the Vigour, Firmness, and Wisdom of your Majesty's Councils.

With these Aids we doubt not your Majesty will confound and defeat the Designs of our inveterate Enemy; and, in due Time, be enabled to conclude a Peace at once honourable, secure, and lasting.

*Most Gracious Sovereign,*

**MAY** it please your Majesty, we, your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Magistrates, Town Council, Clergy, Attornies at Law, Merchants, Manufacturers, and others, Inhabitants of your Majesty's Royal Burgh and Parish of Forfar, assembled for the Purpose of addressing your Majesty on the present trying Situation of public Affairs, beg Leave to approach the Throne with the most unfeigned Expressions of inviolable Attachment to your Majesty's Person, Family, and Government, and with the most unanimous and cordial Tender of our most faithful and zealous Services in Support of the Dignity of your Majesty's Crown, the Defence of your Empire, and the Glory and Prosperity of your Reign.

We believe that it is the nearest Wish of your Majesty's paternal Breast that such Energies, successfully exerted, may, by the Blessing of God, soon enable your Majesty, by a safe, an honourable, and lasting Peace, to alleviate the Burdens, and secure the Repose of your Dominions; and that the Moment when such an Opportunity shall present itself it will be eagerly embraced. But until that happy Day shall come, we beg Leave most humbly to assure your Majesty, that it is our earnest Desire, and shall be our never-ceasing Endeavour, to animate ourselves, and all around us, to a manly and patriotic Perseverance in a Conflict at once so arduous, so honourable, and important; to cherish that Spirit of Unanimity and cordial Co-operation which is so essential to successful Exertion, and patiently and cheerfully to endure those Deprivations which the Expence of maintaining such a Contest must indispensably require.

That it may please Him, by whom alone Kings reign, long to preserve your Majesty's important Life, to bless your Majesty's Councils, and speedily and surely to guide the Efforts of your Majesty's Government to a successful Issue, is the ardent Prayer of, May it please your Majesty, your Majesty's most dutiful, most faithful, and most obedient Subjects, the Magistrates and Town Council, Clergy, Attorneys at Law, Merchants, Manufacturers, and others, Inhabitants of the Burgh and Parish of Forfar.

To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty,  
The humble Address of the Magistrates and Town Council of the Royal Burgh of Dingwall, in Council assembled.

*Most Gracious Sovereign,*

WE, your Majesty's most loyal and faithful Subjects, the Magistrates and Town Council of the Royal Burgh of Dingwall, impelled by a Sense of the Duty we owe to our King and Country, beg Leave, at a Period unexampled in the Annals of History, to approach your Majesty's Throne with Sentiments of the most profound Respect and grateful Attachment. We cannot but be sensible of the arduous Struggle in which we are engaged with a powerful and inveterate Foe, who has been but too successful in humbling and subjugating almost every other Power that might have been deemed capable of interposing between him and universal Empire. Exasperated as he is against this Country, which alone has opposed an effectual Barrier to his unbounded Ambition, he will, no Doubt, bend his utmost Efforts to sacrifice us to his Vengeance, and to effect our Ruin. We trust, however, that his unavailing Threats and impotent Malice will serve only to rouse still further the Spirit of the Nation, to call forth its Energies, and to promote that Unanimity and strenuous Exertion which, under the Direction of your Majesty's wife and vigorous Councils, cannot fail, with the Blessing of Heaven, to counteract and disconcert his Plans, to repel the intended Mischief, to retort his Devices on his own Head, and, finally, to baffle every hostile Combination. The new Species of Warfare, in which our Adversary's mad Policy has now involved us, may, and no Doubt will, impede our Commerce, and affect our Manufactures; but for the Alleviation of these Evils we look up with Confidence to the Liberality of Government, the Patriotism of the People, and the steady Firmness of the British Character. We know not who could be so mean and dastardly as not to en-

counter some temporary Hardships, and submit without murmuring to Privations of unusual Magnitude, rather than expose to the most imminent Hazard all that they hold valuable on Earth. When our Religion, our Laws, and our Liberties are threatened; when the Independence, and perhaps the very Existence, of the Empire is at Stake, who would not sacrifice Ease and Affluence, and even some Share of common Necessaries, to avert the impending Blow? Impressed with these Sentiments, while we are fully persuaded that your Majesty's Ministers will be far from rejecting any serious Offer on the Part of the Enemy to conclude a Peace on fair and honourable Terms, we trust, at the same Time, they will never suffer themselves to be drawn into any premature Negotiation, which might compromise the Dignity of the Crown, or the Honour and Interest of the Nation.

*Most Gracious Sovereign,*

We, therefore, earnestly deprecate all Expressions of Impatience, all Want of Unanimity, as calculated to palliate the Energies of Government at a Time when they should be most vigorously exerted for the Preservation of the United Kingdoms. And we beg Leave to assure your Majesty, that no Privations can induce us to swerve from our continued Support of your Majesty's Government at this eventful Crisis.

We fervently pray that, when it shall have pleased the Supreme Disposer of all Things to restore Tranquillity to the World, your Majesty may long live

to enjoy the grateful Contemplation of your People's Happiness.
