WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the present Seffion of Parliament, intituled "An Act 44 for further continuing, until Three Months af-45 ter the Ratification of a Definitive Treaty of . 4. Peace, an Act made in the Forty-fourth Year of His prefent Majefly, for permitting the Importa-tion into Great Britain of Hides, and other Ar-ticles in Foreign Ships;" it is enacted, that an Act. made in the Forty-fourth Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, intituled "An Act for permitting, until the Fifth Day of May, One thouland eight hundred and five, the Importation of Hides, Calf-Skins, Horns, Tallow, and Wool, (except Cotton-Wool,) in Foreign Ships, on Payment of the like Duties as if imported in British or Irish Ships," which by an Act, made in the Forty-fifth Year of His prefent Majelty, was revived and further con-tinued until the Twenty-fifth Day of March, One thousand eight hundred and fix, and extended to Goat-Skins imported in Foreign Ships ; and which was further continued by an Act, made in the Fortyfeventh Year of His present Majesty, until the Twenty-fifth Day of March One thousand eight hundred and eight, shall be, and the same is thereby further continued until Three Months after the Ratification of a Definitive Treaty of Peace: And whereas, in virtue of the Powers vefted in His Majefty by the feveral former Acts above recited, His Majefty was pleafed by His Order in Council of the Eighteenth Day of November last, to permit, until the Twenty-fifth Day of this inftant March, the Importation in Foreign Ships of any Hides, Pieces of Hides, dreffed or undreffed, Calf Skins, or Pieces of Calf-Skins, dreffed or undreffed, Horns, or Pieces of Horns, Tailow, and Wool, (except Cotton Wool,) and Goat-Skins dreffed or undreffed, on the Terms fpecified in the faid Order: And whereas it is judged expedient that the faid Permiffion fhould be continued for fome Time longer, His Majefty is thereupon pleafed, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, purfuant to the Powers vested in His Majefty by the Act passed in the present Session of Parliament, to allow, and doth hereby allow, for the Space of Six Months, from the Twenty fifth Day of this inftant March, the Importation of any Hides, Pieces of Hides, dreffed or undreffed, Calf-Skins, or Pieces of Calf-Skins, dreffed or undreffed, Horns, or Pieces of Horns, Tallow, and Wool, (except -Cotton Wool, ) and Goat-Skins, dreffed or undreffed, , in any Foreign Ship or Veilel; and His Majefty doth hereby order, that on the Arrival at any Port . of the United Kingdom of any Foreign Ship or I Veffel, with any of the Articles above mentioned, the faid Goods shall be admitted to Entry on Payment of the fame Duties of Cultoms and Excife as are due and payable on the like Goods when imported in any British or Irish-built Ship or Veffel: —And the Right Honourable the Lords Commismissioners of His Majesty's Treasury are to give the necessfary Directions herein accordingly.

## PRESENT,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS His Majefty, by His Order in Council of the Eleventh of November laft, was pleafed to order and declare, that all Trade in Articles which are of the Produce or Manufacture of France or her Allies, or of any other Country at War with His Majelty, or from which, although not at War with His Majefly, the British Flag is excluded, or of the Colonies belonging to His Majelty's Enemies, should be deemed and considered to be unlawful (except as is therein excepted ;: And whereas His Majesty, by His further Order in Council of the Iwenty-fifth of November last, was pleafed to order and declare, that nothing in the aforefaid Order of the Eleventh November contained, should extend to subject to Capture and Confilcation any Articles of the Produce and Manufacture of the faid Countries and Colonies laden on board British Ships, which would not have been subject to Capture and Confiscation if such Order had not been made.

His Majefty, taking the faid Orders into Confideration, is pleafed, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, that nothing in the faid laft-mentioned Order fhall extend, or be conftrued to extend, to authorize Britifh Ships to export and convey any Articles of the Produce or Manufacture of the faid Countries, or Colouies, from Guernfey, Jerfey, Man, Gibraltar, Malta, or from any Neutral or Allied Country, to any other Country or Place than to a Port of the United Kingdom, unlefs fuch Articles fhall have been previoufly imported into fuch Places as aforefaid from fome Port of the United Kingdom. And the Right Honourable the Lords Commiffioners of His Majefty's Treafury, His Majefty's Principal Secretaries of State, the Lords Commiffioners of the Admiralty, and the Judges of the High Court of Admiralty and Vice-Admiralty, are to take the neceffary Meafures herein as to them may refpectively appertain.
