PRESENT,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

HIS Majesty having taken into His Considera-tion the glorious Exertions of the Spanish Nation for the Deliverance of their Country from the Tyranny and Usurpation of France, and the Assurances which His Majesty has received from several of the Provinces of Spain, of their friendly Disposition towards this Kingdom; His Majesty is pleased, by and with the Adrice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered;

First, That all Hostilities against Spain on the Part of His Majelty shall immediately ceale.

Secondly, That the Blockade of all the Ports of Spain, except such as may be still in the Possession or under Controll of France, shall be forthwith

Thirdly, That all Ships and Vessels belonging to Spain shall have free Admission into the Ports of His Majesty's Dominions, as before the present Hostilities.

Fourthly, That all Ships and Vessels belonging to Spain, which shall be met at Sea by His Majelly's Ships and Cruizers, shall be treated in the same Manner as the Ships of States in Amity with His Majesty, and shall be suffered to carry on any Trade now confidered by His Majesty to be lawfully carried on by Neutral Ships.

Fifthly, That all Vessels and Goods belonging to Persons residing in the Spanish Colonies, which shall be detained by any of His Majesty's Cruizers after the Date hereof, shall be brought into Port, and shall be carefully preserved in safe Custody, to await His Majesty's further Pleasure, until it shall be known whether the faid Colonies, or any of them, in which the Owners of such Ships and Goods reside, shall have made common Cause with Spain against the Power of France.

WHEREAS the Time limited by His Ma-jesty's Order in Council of the Twenty fifth Day of November One thousand eight hundred and seven, prohibiting the transporting into any Parts out of this Kingdom of any Pig Iron, Bar-Iron, Hemp, Pitch, Tar, Rosin, Turpentine, Auchors, Cables, Cordage, Masts, Yards, Bowsprits, Oars, Oakum, Sheet-Copper, or other Naval Stores, will expire upon the Eleventh Day of this instant July: And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, and the Safety of this Kingdom, that the faid Prohibition should be continued for some Time longer, His Majesty doth therefore, with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby order, require, prohibit, and command, that no Perfon or Persons whosoever go at any Time, for the Space of Six Months, from the said Eleventh Day of this inflant July, presume to transport into any Parts out of this Kingdom any Pig-Iron, Bar-Iron, Hemp, Pitch, Tar, Rosin, Turpentine, Anchors, Cables, Cordage, Masts, Yards, Bowsprits, Oars, Oakum, Sheet-Copper, Sail-Cloth or Canvas, or other Naval Stores, or do ship or lade any Pig-Iron, Bar-Iron, Hemp, Pitch, Tar, Rofin, Turpentine, Anchors, Cables, Cordage, Masts, Yards, Bowsprits, Oars, Oakum, Sheet-Copper, Sail-Cloth or Canvas, or other Naval Stores, on board any Ship or Vessel, in order to transporting the same into any Parts beyond the Seas, without Leave or Permission first being had and obtained from His Majesty or His Privy Council, upon Pain of incurring the Forfeitures insticted by an Act passed in the Thirtythird Year of His Majesty's Reign, intituled " Au " Act to enable His Majesty to restrain the Expor-" tation of Naval Stores, and more effectually to prevent the Exportation of Salt-Petre, Arms, and
