You Monopolizing Mr. Barny scull take care of your premises as you dont have them about your Ears for damd if the shant if the Commons be took away for tis no more sin to let your premises on fire and burn you in the midll of the flames than tis for you to take the writes of the poor away you may depend on it You shall come short hom if the the Commons be took away.

His Majesty, for the better apprehending and bringing to Justice the Persons concerned in writing and sending such Letter, is hereby pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any one of them (except the Person who actually wrote the same) who shall discover his or their Accomplice or Accomplices therein, so that he, she, or they may be apprehended and convicted thereof

TO ALL DEPUTY AND ASSISTANT-COMMISSARIES.

Commissary-General's Office, Great George-Street, Westminster, July 18, 1808.

ALL Deputy and Assistant-Commissaries, who are upon Half-Pay or Leave of Absence, are hereby required, for the Information of the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, to give into this Office their Places of Residence. Those on Half-Pay are to notify Quarterly how long they have been on Half-Pay, and whether they are able to go on Service if required, and if not, to state the Reason which would prevent them from so doing; and those on Leave of Absence are likewise ordered to report Monthly to the Commissary General, the Period of their Leave, and by whom granted.
