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Brussels, May 27.

THe Prince of Parma is resolved to go to *Actb* and *Mons* the beginning of the next week, and in his return will visit *Charleroy*. To morrow the Nations of this City are to meet, in order to the renewing the Imposition upon Beer, &c. We have Letters from *Lille* of the 23 Instant which say, that Monsieur *Pelletier*, the Chief of the French Commissioners was returned thither from *Courtray*, so that the Conferences there are again at a stand. From *Liege* we have an Account, That on Thursday last 200 Germans, by order of the Elector of *Cologne*, entred *Vifet*, a small Town upon the *Mense*, between that City and *Maestricht*, and obliged all the Vessels that pass up the River to pay the Imposition of the 60th Penny for the Merchandizes they were laden with, of which they of *Liege* having notice, resolved immediately to dislodge them, and on Friday Morning 8 or 9000 Men, Soldiers and Burghers marched thither with four or five pieces of Cannon, and having assaulted the Place, the Germans after a stout resistance all the day, were forced to Capitulate towards the Evening, and had leave to march out with their Arms, Bag and Baggage. Two hours after, some thousands of the Country Militia, who were drawn together to relieve the Place, arrived there, though too late, but we are expecting to hear that some Action has pass between them, and those of *Liege* in their return home. They took at *Vifet* about half a score Freemen of their City, who having in these differences, Declared themselves for the r Prince, were retired thither, and have carried them to *Liege*, where it's thought they will pass their time very ill.

Hague, May 27. Here passes hardly any thing of Moment at present, but when the Prince of *Orange* returns, which he will now do very suddainly, and that the States of *Holland* meet, we may be able to give you an Account of several things that may be worth the knowing.

Paris, May 24. We do not yet hear what Resolution the King has taken, upon the Advice presented to him by the Bishops, concerning the Convoking a National Council, or a general Assembly of the Clergy. This we know, that His Majesty is much offended with the Bishop of *Arras*, who refused to jyn therein with the others. In the mean time matters stand at *Rome* in the same posture as formerly, the Cardinal *d'Estree*, after the several Audiences he has had of the Pope, and Conferences with the Cardinals, not being able to induce the Pope to

depart from his Pretensions. The King of *Sweden* presses hard by his Ministers here, that the French will wighdraw their Garrisons out of the Dutchy of *Deuxponts*, that so he may take Possession of it, as of Right belonging to him.

Falmouth, May 16. The 13th Instant arrived here the Unity of *London*, laden with Oyls from *Galipoli*, she came about five weeks since from *Cadiz*, and the Master tells us, that putting into *Gibraltar*, he saw there the *Golden Horse* of *Argiers*, mounted with 48 Guns, and that he was informed by the English Commanders, that one of His Majesties Frigats had taken another Algerine of 24 Guns; and that as he was coming out of the *Streights*, he met an English Frigate, having with him an Algerine Prize; which it's supposed was the same he had an account of at *Gibraltar*, and that the Frigate was the *Sapphire*, and the Prize the *Rose* of *Argiers*.

Plymouth, May 17. Yesterday sail'd from hence His Majesties Ship the *Guernsey*, Captain *Tennent* Commander for *Portsmouth*. Here are now in Port the *Foresight*, the *Assurance*, the *Sweepstakes*, and the *Mermaid*, the latter being come in from Cruising to Victual here.

Windsor, May 17. An Humble Address has been presented to His Majesty, by the Mayor and Aldermen of *Lynne Regis*, which follows,

WE Your Majesties Obedient Subjects, the Mayor, Aldermen, and Common-Council, and other the chief Inhabitants of Your antient Burrough of *Lynne Regis* in the County of *Norfolk*; in all Loyalty and Dutiful Reverence, do give Your Majesty our Humble and hearty Thanks for Your Royal Affection, and Continuance to the Excellent Constitution of the Church of England, and constant care to defend it against the ill designs of Popery, and all other Oppositions whatsoever; for Your firm Resolution, to maintain both the Just Rights of the Monarchy, and the Liberty and Property of Your People; particularly, for Your late Gracious Declaration, and those Instances of Your Princely Goodness, and Condescensions contain'd therein, which we think sufficient to allay the Fears, and remove the Misunderstandings of all well-meaning and reasonable Men; and with Gratitude to Your Majesty, we account our selves highly obliged to praise Almighty God for the manifold Blessings we enjoy from, and under Your Majesties Government, exercised with great Justice, Wisdom, and Clemency; Wherefore, as Religion and Allegiance engages, we in a deep and grateful sense, of Your Princely Grace and Favour, do beseech the King of Kings, that he will Grant Your Majesty, a long and prosperous Reign; and to our utmost we shall endeavour with our Lives and Fortunes, the preservation of Your Royal Person, and the support of Your Royal Authority.

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
