THIS Day, the Lords being met, a Message was sent to the Honorable House of Commons by Sir Francis Molyneux, Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, acquainting them, that *The Lords, authorized by virtue of His Majesty's Commission for declaring His Royal Assent to several Acts agreed upon by both Houses, do desire the immediate Attendance of this Honorable House in the House of Peers to hear the Commission read*; and the Commons being come thither, the said Commission, empowering the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, the Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, and several other Lords therein named, to declare and notify the Royal Assent to the said Acts, was read accordingly, and the Royal Assent given to

An Act for granting Annuities to discharge certain Exchequer Bills.

An Act for the Regulation of His Majesty's Royal Marine Forces while on Shore.

An Act for allowing the Importation and Exportation of certain Goods and Commodities into and from the Port of Falmouth in the Island of Jamaica.

An Act to allow the Importation of Rum and other Spirits from the Island of Bermuda into the Province of Lower Canada, without Payment of Duty, on the same Terms and Conditions as such Importation may be made directly from His Majesty's Sugar Colonies in the West Indies.

An Act to authorize His Majesty, during the present War, to make Regulations respecting the Trade and Commerce to and from the Cape of Good Hope.

An Act for continuing, until the 25th Day of March 1814, several Acts for the Free Importation of Cochineal and Indigo; and until the 25th Day of March 1819, an Act of the Forty-sixth Year of His present Majesty, to permit the Exportation of Wool from the British Plantations in America.

An Act to make perpetual several Laws relating to the Encouragement of the Silk-Manufacturers; to the allowing the Importation of Rape Seed, and other Seeds used for extracting Oil, whenever the Prices of middling British Rape Seed shall be above a certain Limit; to the encouraging the Growth of Coffee in His Majesty's Plantations in America; and for amending and making perpetual several Laws relating to the preventing the clandestine running of Goods, and the Danger of Infection thereby; and to the allowing the Importation of Seal-Skins, cured with foreign Salt, free of Duty.

An Act for amending so much of an Act of the Forty-first Year of His present Majesty, for building and keeping in Repair the Pier at Sheerness, in the Isle of Sheppy, in the County of Kent, and for other Purposes therein mentioned, as relates to the said Pier.

An Act to continue the Term and alter the Powers of an Act of His present Majesty, for re-

pairing the Road from the Township of Saltney, in the County of Flint, to the Town of Flint.

An Act for making and maintaining a Road from Horsham to join the Turnpike Road leading to Guildford, with Two Branches therefrom, in the Counties of Suffex and Surrey.

Navigation of the North Seas.

NOTICE is hereby given, that the Light on the Island of North Ronaldsfay, in Orkney, North Lat. 59° 45' and West Longitude 2° 15' will be discontinued and cease to be lighted, from and after the 1st Day of June next 1809; but the revolving Light erected in 1806 upon the Start Point of the Island of Sanday, from which the Light on North Ronaldsfay bears by the Compass N. N. E. $\frac{1}{2}$ E. distant about Eight Miles, will continue to be lighted as heretofore, this Light having been found to be in the most central Situation for pointing out the low Shores of the North Isles of Orkney.
