THEREAS it is expedient further to encou-rage the Trade from Malta to Countries under the Reftrictions contained in His Majefty's Order in Council dared the Eleventh Day of November One thousaud eight hundred and seven, His Majelty, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, is pleafed to order, and it is hereby ordered, that Licences be granted by the Governor, Lieute-nant-Governor, or other Perfon having the chief Civil Command at Malta, but in His Majelty's Name, to fuch Perfon or Perfons as the faid Governor, Lieutenant Governor, or Perfon having the chief Civil Command, shall think fit, allowing fuch Perfon or Perfons to export from Malta direct to any Port or Ports within the Streights of Gibraltar, any Articles of the Produce or Manufacture of His Majesty's Dominions, and any Articles which shall have been imported into Malta from this Kingdom, or from any Port or Place within the Streights of Gibraltar, (not being Naval or Military Stores,) in any Veffel belonging to any of His Majefly's Sub-jects, or in any Veffel belonging to any Country not at War with His Majelty, or in any Veliel not ex-ceeding One Hundred Tons Burthen, and being un-armed, belonging to any Country within the faid Streights; and also to import in any fuch Veffel or Veffels as aforefaid, from any Port within the Streights of Gibraltar to Malta aforefaid, (the Port and Deltination being specified in such Licence,) any Articles whattoever, and to whomfoever the fame may appear to belong, fuch Articles to be fpecified in the Bill of Lading of fuch Veffel; fubject, how-ever, to fuch further Regulations and Rettrictions with refpect to all or any of fuch Articles fo to be exported or imported, as to the faid Governor, Lieutenant-Governor, or other Perfon having the chief Civil Command at Malta aforefaid for the Time being respectively, shall from 1 ime to Time feem fit and expedient.

And it is further ordered, that in every fuch | pertain.

T the Court at the Queen's Palace, the 15th of | Licence shall be inferted the Names and Refidence of the Perfon or Perfons to whom it shall be granted, the Articles and their Quantities permitted to be exported, the Name and Description of the Vessel, and of the Master thereof, and the Port or Ports to which the Vessel shall be allowed to go; and that no Licence fo to be granted shall continue in Force for longer Time than Four Months from its Date. nor for more than One Voyage; nor shall any fuch Licence be granted, or acknowledged to be valid if granted, to permit the Clearance of any Veffel to any Port which shall be actually blockaded by any Naval Force of His Majefty or His Allies.

And it is further ordered, that the Commanders of His Majetty's Ships of War and Privateers, and all others whom it may concern, shall fuffer every fuch Vessel failing conformably to the Permission given by the Otder, and having any fuch Licence as aforetaid-to pais and repais direct between Malta and fuch Port or Ports within the Streights of Gibraltar as shall be specified in the Licence, in such Manner, and under fuch Terms, Regulations, and Reftrictions as shall be expressed therein.

And it is urther ordered, that in cafe any Veffel fo failing as aforefaid, for which any fuch Licence as aforefaid shall have been granted, and which shall be proceeding direct upon her faid Voyage, shall be detained and brought in for legal Adjudication, fuch Veffel, with her Cargo, shall be forthwith re-leafed by the Court of Admiralty in which Procecdings that be commenced, upon Proof being made that the Parties had duly conformed to the Terms, Regulations, and Reflrictions of the faid Licence ; the Proof of fuch Conformity to lie upon the Person or Persons claiming the Benefit of this Order, or obtaining or using fuch Licence, or claiming the Benefit thereof.

And the Right Honourable the Lords Commif-And the Right Honourable the Lords Commi-fioners of His Majefty's Treafury, His Majefty's Principal Secretarics of State, the Lords Commif-fioners of the Admiralty, and the Judge of the High Court of Admiralty, and the Judges of the Courts of Vice-Admiralty, are to take the neceffary Measures he ein as to them shall respectively ap-pertain. HEREAS by an A&, passed in the Forty-eighth Year of His Majetty's Reign, intituled " An Act for further continuing, until Three Months after the Ratification of a Definitive Treaty of Peace, an Act, made in the Forty-fourth Year of His prefent Majefty, for permitting the Importation into Great Britain of Hides and other Articles in Foreign Ships," it is enacted, that an Act, made in the Forty-fourth Year of His prefent Majeity, intituled " An Act for permitting, until the Fifth Day of May, One thousand eight hundred and five, the Importation of Hides, Calf-Skins, Horns, Tallow, and Wool, (except Cotton Wool,) in Foreign Ships, on Payment of the like Duties, as if imported in British or Irish Ships;" which, by an Act, made in the Forty-fifth Year of His prefent Majesty, was revived and further continued until the Twenty-fifth Day of March One thonfand eight hundred and fix, and extended to Goat-Skins imported in Foreign Ships; and which was further continued by an Act, made in the Forty-feventh Year of His prefent Ma-jefty, until the Twenty-fifth Day of March, One thousand eight hundred and eight, shall be, and the fame is thereby further continued until Three Months after the Ratification of a Definitive Treaty of Peace: And whereas His Majetty was pleafed, by His Order in Council of the Twentyfirit Day of September last, pursuant to the Powers vefted in His Majefty by the faid Act, to allow, for the Space of Six Months from the Twenty-fifth Day of the faid Month of September, the Importation in Foreign Ships of any Hides, Pieces of Hides, dreffed or undreffed, Calf-Skins, or Pieces of Calf-Skins, dreffed or undreffed, Horns, or Pieces of Horns, Tallow, and Wool, (except Cotton Wool,) and Goat-Skins, dreffed or undreffed, on the Terms fpecified in the faid Order: And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majelty's Service, that the faid Permiffion should be continued for fome Time longer, His Majelly is thereupon pleafed, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, to allow, and doth hereby allow, for the Space of Six Months from the Twenty-fifth Day of this inflant March, the Importation of any Hides, Pieces of Hides, dreffed or undreffed, Call Skins, or Pieces of Calf-Skins, dreffed or undreffed, Horns, or Pieces for Lange Tellaw and Weak (Strange Office) of Horns, Tallow, and Wool, (except Cotton Wool,) and Goat-Skins, dreffed or undreffed, in any Foreign Ship or Veffel; and His Majelty doth hereby order, that, on the Arrival at any Port of the United Kingdom of any Foreign Ship or Veffel, with any of the Articles above mentioned, the faid Goods shall be admitted to Entry on Payment of the fame Duties of Cuftoms and Excile as are due and payable on the like Goods when imported in any British or Irish-built Ship or Veffel .-And the Right Honourable the Lords Commif-fioners of His Majefty's Treafury are to give the meceifary Directions herein accordingly.

ISPATCHES, of which the following are Copies, have this Day been received from Lieutenant-General Beckwith, Commander of His Majefty's Forces in the Leeward Islands, addreffed to Viscount Caftlereagh, One of His Majefty's Principal Secretaries of State.

My LORD, Martinique, Feb. 1, 1809. N my lait, No. 42, I had the Honour to report to your Lordship the Sailing of the Army from Califle Bay upon the 28th ultimo. I have how the Satisfaction to acquaint your Lordship that we landed in Two Divisions upon the 30th.

The First Division, under the Orders of Lieutenant-General Sir George Prevost, confisting of between Six and Seven Thouland Men, at Bay Robert on the Windward Coast in the Course of the Afternoon without Oppolition ; and notwithstanding the Difficulties of the Country, we occupied a Position on the Banks of the Grande Lezard River before Day-break of the 31st, with a Corps of nearly Four Thousand Men, after a Night March of Seven Miles through a difficult Country.

Thefe Services were greatly facilitated by the judicious and manly Conduct of Captain Beaver of His Majefty's Ship Acafta, who led into the Bay in a bold and officer like Manner, preceded by His Majefty's Brig Forefter, Captain Richards. The Exertions and Succefs of this Meafure were completely effective, Two Transports only striking in the narrow Pallage at the Entrance of the Bay.

Hitherto we have experienced no Reliftance from the Militia of the Country, and they manifest a Difpolition every where to return to their Homes, in conformity to a joint Proclamation by the Admiral and myself, which is obtaining a very extensive Circulation.

The Second Division of the Army, confifting of upwards of Three Thousand Men, under the Command of Major-General Maitland, landed near St. Luce and Point Solomon on the Morning of the 30th, but as our Communication with that Corps is not yet established, I cannot enter into any Details.

Lieutenant-General Sir George Prevolt, with the Advance in my Front, will take Polleffion of the Heights of Bruno in the Courle of this Day, and I am led to expect will there for the first Time feel the Pulle of the regular Troops of the Enemy.

The Port of Triuité, which lies beyond the Line of our Operations, will, by Order of Captain Beaver of the Navy, be taken Poffeffion of this Day by a Detachment of Seamen and Marines from the Squadron to Windward, under the Command of Captain Dick of His Majelly's Ship Penelope.

• The Admiral, with the Body of the Fleet and Store-Ships, is in the Vicinity of Pigeon Island, at the Entrance of Fort Royal Bay.

Our Operations to Windward have been vigorous and effectual in Point of Time, and the Privations of the Troops have been confiderable, and borne in a Manner worthy of the Character of British Soldiers.

From what has passed, I am of Opinion the Inhabitants of the Country manifest a friendly Disposition; and atter the Heights of Surirey shall be carried, which I expect will be strongly contested, the Campaign will be reduced to the Operations of a Siege, and the Defence of the Fortres.

The Services rendered by the Captains and Officers. of the Navy to Windward have been great and effen-tial, and the Exertions of Captain Withers of the Navy, principal Agent for Transports, peculiarly meritorious.

My LORD, February 5, 1809. IN my Letter of the 1st Instant, I had the Honour to report for His Majesty's Information the Progress then made in our Operations against the Enemy; my Expectation that Lieutenant-General Sir George Prevolt would meet them upon Morne Bruno, and that the Heights of Surirey would be warmly con-telled, was realifed in the Courfe of the fame Day, and both were carried under the Direction of the Lieutenant-General with that Decifion and Judgment which belong to this refpectable Officer, and much to the Honour of Brigadier General Hoghton, the Officers and Men of the Fufilier Brigade aud Light Battalion, engaged on that Service.

On the 2d it appeared to me to be defirable to extend to the Right of our Polition, which was effected in a fpirited Manner by the King's Infantry. An Exertion was then made to carry the advanced Redoubt, but having foon reason to believe that it would have been acquired with a Lofs beyond the Value of the Acquilition, the Troops were withdrawn, and the Enemy abandoned it during the Night, with another Redoubt contiguous to it, with evident Marks of Diforder; both will be occupied and included in our Pofition this Night. Pigeon Island furrendered at diferetion Yesterday, which enables the Shipping to enter Fort Royal Bay; all their Batteries on the Cafe Naviere Side have been destroyed and abandoned, a Frigate and iome other Merchant Veffels burned, the lower Fort abandoned, and all their Troops withdrawn from Fort Royal to the principal Fortrefs.

I confider the Investiture to be nearly completed, and we muft now look for the Operations of a Siege. Time does not admit of Details, but your Lordhip will perceive that these Operations have been effected in eight Days from our quitting Barbadoes, notwithstanding heavy Rains and most unfavourable Weather, in which the Troops have borne every Species of Privation in a Manner worthy their Character as British Soldiers.

HAVING, in my Communications of the 1st and 5th Inftant, submitted to your Lordship's Consi-deration general Reports of the Operations of the Army I have the Honour to command, I now beg Leave to inclose the special Reports of the General Officers commanding Divisions, and of Brigadier-General Hoghton, whole Brigade was in Action upon the 1st; with separate Returns of our Lols upon the 1st and 2d, which, I am inclined to believe, will terminate our Operations in the Field.

The Lower Fort, formerly Fort Edward, was taken Polleffion of before Daybreak in the Morning of the 8th, by Major Henderson, commanding the Royal York Rangers, with that Regiment, without Refiftance, and we now occupy that Work.

St. Pierre furrendered to Lieutenant-Colonel Barnes, of the 46th Regiment, the Day before Yefterday, and I have not yet received the Details.

In the Courfe of all thefe Services, where the Co-operation of the Navy was practicable, the greatest Exertions have been made by the Rear-Admiral; and the important Advantages rendered on Shore by that excellent Officer Commodore Cockburn, in the Reduction of Pigeon Island, and the landing Cannon, Mortars, and Ammunition at Point Negroe, and conveying them to the feveral Batteries on that Side, have been of the higheft Importance to the King's Service.

S1R, IN conformity with your Orders I dilembarked on the 30th Ultimo, with the Fusileer Brigade of the First Division of the Army, at Malgré Tout, in the Bay Robert, at Four o'Clock P. M. and proceeded from thence to De Manceaux's Ettate, where I arrived late, in confequence of the Difficulties of the Country, and the unfavourable State of the Roads for the Movement of Cannon.

Before the Dawn of the next Day I reached Papin's, and proceeded from thence with the Advance, composed of the Royal Fusileer Regiment, and the Grenadier Company of the 1st Welt India Regiment. The Enemy retiring before me, I reached the Heights of De Bork's Estate towards Evening, where I was joined at Daylight, on the 1st Instant, by Brigadier-General Hoghton with the 23d Regiment and the Light Infantry Battalion, under the Command of Major Camphell, of the Royal West India Rangers. I loft no Time after this Junction, and pushed forwards the Honourable Lieutenant-Colonel Pakenham, with the Royal Fulileers, to pollels himfelf of Morne Bruno; this Movement I supported by the Light Infantry Battalion, under Brigadier-General Hoghton, who was ordered, after uniting the Two Corps, to proceed to force the Heights of Desfourneaux, whilk I held the Royal Welch Fulileers in referve to itrengthen fuch Points of Attack as might require it.

As the greater Part of this Operation was conducted by the Brigadier General with Spirit, I shall now beg Leave to refer to his Report, which accom-panies mine. To it I have only to add, that on my coming on the Heights of Surirey, I had innumera-ble Proofs of the Valour and Judgment of the Ho-nourable Licutenant Colonel Pakenham, of the Excellence of the Fusileer Brigade, and of the spirited and judicious Exertions of Lieutenant Colonel Ellis and Majors Pearfon and Offley of the 23d or Royal Welch Fulilcers, allo of the Bravery of Major Campbell and the Light Infantry Battalion, all of which have enabled me to retain this valuable Position without Artillery, within Three Hundred Yards of the Enemy's intrenched Camp covered with Guns. The Officers belonging to my Staff diffinguished them-

the Action. I have to lament the Lois of Captain Taylor, Acting Deputy Quarter Master General, who was severely wounded whill rendering effectual Services to his Country.

I cannot omit acknowledging, that to Lieutenant Hobbs, of the Royal Engineers, 1 am indebted for the Rapidity of our Movements; and ultimate Succefs, from his Acquaintance with this Country, which enabled him to guide and direct our Movements. Enclosed is a Return of Killed, Wounded, and Miffing on this Occasion.

Heights of Surirey, Feb. 1, 1809. SIR. I HAVE the Honour to repeat, that, in Obedience to your Orders, I moved from the Habitation Bork at Seven o'Clock this Morning, with the Light Battalion commanded by Major Campbell, and being joined on the Heights of Bruno by the Honourable Lieutenant-Colonel Pakenham with the 7th Regiment, the Rifle Company of the 23d Regiment, and the Grenadiers of the 1ft Weft India Regiment, 1 proceeded towards the Heights of Defourneaux, agreeably to my Inftructions. The Column was fcarcely in Motion before a confiderable Body of the Enemy's Regular Forces commanded (as has been fince alcentained) by General of Brigade D'Houdelot, was difcovered very advantageoully polted on the Declivity of a Hill, with the River Monfieur in their Front, and One or Two Field Pieces on their Left. Having reconnoitered their Pofition, I determined to attack them, although the Light Artillery attached to the Brigade could not be brought up. The Honourable Lieutenant-Colonel Pakenham, with the Rifle Company and Grenadiers of the 7th, and the Rifle Company of the 23d, was directed to turn the Right, and Major Campbell with the Light Battalion the Left of the Enemy's Polition, whill I -proceeded to attack them in Front with the Battalion Companies of the 7th, and the Grenadiers of the 1ft Well India. The Rebilt proved in every Refpect such as was to be expected from the Bravery and Difcipline of the Troops which I had the Honour to drave placed under my Command. The Enemy were driven back from every Part of their Polition with confiderable Lofs, and retired in the greatest Difor-.der

The Honourable Lieutenant-Colonel Pakenham having turned the Right Flank of the Enemy, pulhed forward towards the Heights of Surirey fupported, in the first Instance, by the Right Wing of the 23d, under the Command of Lieutenant-Colonel Elus, and fubfequently by the Remainder of that Regiment (uncer Major Pearfon), which had joined me, by your Orders, immediately after the Action on the River Monfieur.

The Enemy had collected a confiderable Force (chiefly drawn from Fort Bourbon) to defend the . Approaches to the Heights of Surirey, fupported by a finall field Train, and tavoured by a very ftrong Po--fition. Notwithlanding fuch formidable Obnacles, Lieutenant-Colonel Pakenham, feconded by the Exeffions of Lieutenant Colonel Ellis, Majors Pearfon -and Offley of the 33d, and the determined Bravery

Telves by their Zeal and Activity during the Heat of 1 of the whole Detachment, after repeated Attacks, at length, by a very fpirited Charge, compelled the Enemy to take shelter under the Cover of their Redoubts, and established his Position on the Heights.

At this Moment you refumed the Command of the Advance, and in conformity with your Orders, I brought up the Remainder of the Royal Fuzileers, and the Light Battalions, to the Heights of Surirey.

SIR, Camp, la Coste, February 8, 1809. THE Division under my Command landed at St. Luce early on Monday Morning the 30th January, without Opposition. I had previously directed the Royal York Rangers, commanded by Major Henderfon, to land at Ance d'Arlet to take the Battery on Point Solomon, and to poffefs him. felf of the Heights commanding Pigeon Island.

The Day we landed we marched to the Neigh-bourhood of Ance Ceron, and the following Day to Riviere Sallée. We halted for a Supply of Provisions on the 1st of the Month; on the 2d we marched from the Riviere Sallée to Lamantin; on the 3d from Lamantin to Champin and La Croif. fades, within Gun Shot of the Enemy's Fort * Deffaix, which Polition covers the landing Place at Cohé. We have met with no Opposition. The Militia was numerous, but as we advanced rapidly, and intercepted the Main Body near Lamantin, they fubmitted, and agreed to disperse and return to their Plantations.

The Royal York Rangers, under the Command of Major Henderlon, landed the fame Day with the reft of my Division upon another Point; and having taken the Battery at Point Solomon, marched and gained the Heights above Pigeon Island. He was not opposed. Brigadier-General Sir Charles Shipley, Commanding Engineer, and Brigadier-General Stehelin, commanding the Royal Artillery, fuper-intended the Conftruction of the Batteries. The neceflary Ordnance was landed in a fmall Bay, Weft of Point Noire; Captain Cockburn of His Majefty's Ship Pompée with the Seamen, got the Mortais and Howitzers to the Batteries by the greatest posible Exertions, and nothing can exceed what has been reported to me of the great Exertions of Captain Cockburn of the Royal Navy.

The Morning of the 4th the Island furrendered, our Batteries having done great Execution among the Garrifon the Night preceding.

Ou the 5th Inftant my Division marched from La Croiffades and Champin, by Brunot, des Fournean, Tiberge, Bagou, Monique, to our present Position at La Coste above Point Negroe, which completes the Inveitment on the Weft Side.

I have every Reafon to be highly fatisfied with the Troops I have the Honour to command ; neither Officers or Soldiers have failed in Exertion, and in bearing the great Fatigues of the March with exemplary Fortitude. I have the Honour to be, &c.

Copy of a Letter from the Honourable Rear-Admiral Sir Alexander Cochrane, K B. Commander in Ghief of His Nicjefly's Ships and Veffels at the Leeward Islands, to the Honourable W. W. Pole, dated on board the Neptune, off Martinique, the Ath of February 1809. SÍR.

FJAVINO on the 20th January received a Letter from Lieutenant-General Beckwith, informing me that in confequence of fome Alteration of Circumstances he was induced to proceed on the Attack of Martinique, and expreffing a Wilh to fee me at Barbadoes, in order to make the final Arrangements, I loft no Time in meeting him there for that Purpofe; and having embarked all the Troops, I committed the principal Landing of the Army intended to be put on Shore at Bay Robert, to Captain Beaver, of His Majefty's Ship Acalta, who had Lieutenant-General Beckwith, the Commander of the Forces, with him ; Major-General Sir George Prevoit, commanding the Division, being embarked on board the Penelope. By the inclosed Letter trom Captain Beaver their Lordships will see that he completed this Service, with his ufual Ability, on the 30th of January, and Morning of the 31lt, whilit the other Division, under Major-General Maitland, was lauded on the 30th at Saint Luce, under the Superintendance of Captain Fahie, of the Belleifle, who had formed the molt judicious Arrangements for the Purpofe.

about Six Hundred Men were detached on board His Majetty's Ship York, under the Command of Major Lencerion of the Royal York Rangers, to take Polieffion of the Battery at toint Solomon, in order to fecure a fafe Anchorage for the Men of War and Transports: after effecting this the Rangers puthed on, and invelled the Fort of Pigeon Island, on which a Mortar was brought to bear to early as the ift Initant, but not finding the Fire of that fufficient, Nine others, including Howitzers, were landed, Five of which were got up to the Top of a commanding Height, by the very great Exertions of Captain Cockburn of the Pompée, and the Seamen under his Orders, who ably gave Support to Brigadier-Generals Sir Charles Shipley and Scehelin in completing the Batteries, which opened lad Night, at Six o'Clock, with fuch Effect as to oblige the Enemy to capitu-... late this Morning ; and One Hundred and Thirty-fix Perfons that were in the Fort, furrendered themfelves Prifoners of War. Our Lofs confilted of Two Sea-. men killed, and One Soldier of the Royal York Rangers wounded. The Enemy's of Five killed and feveral wounded.

lu order to cut off the Retreat of the Enemy, I previouily fent the Æolus and Cleopatra, Frigates, and the Recruit, Sloop of War, to the upper Part of

Fort Royal Bay; when this was perceived, the Enemy let Fire to, and deftroyed the Amphitrite Frigate, of Forty-four Guns, and all the Shipping in the Harbour; having, on our first Landing, burnt the Carnation at Marin, alfo a Corvette at St. Pierres on the following Night.

The Army under Lieutenant-General Beckwith having advanced towards the Heights of Surirey, fell in with the Enemy on the 1ft Inftant, who was defeated with confiderable Lofs; fince then two Actions have taken place, which has given to His Majefty's Forces Poffeffion of the before-mentioned Heights, commanding Fort Bourbon. The Enemy upon this abandoned the lower Fort, or Fort de France, having deftroyed the Guns, and from the different Explosions I fuppofe they have blown up the Magazines.

Major-General Maitland reached Samantin on the 2d without Oppofition; and has fince formed a Junction with the Lieutenant.General. I am now moving the Squadron to the Fort Royal Side of the Bay, fo as to embrace the double View of an early Communication with the Head Quarters of the Army, and affording the Supplies neceffary for the Siege of Fort Bourbon on both Sides.

From the Zeal which has manifeded itfelf in each Service, I make no doubt but the Batteries will foon be in a fit State to open upon the Enemy, and I hope before long, that I shall have the Satisfaction to communicate to their Lordships that the Fort has furrendered.

The Militia who were forced to ferve, have returned to their Homes.

Copy of another Letter from the Honourable Rear-Admiral Sir Alexander Cochrane, K. B. Sc. to the Honourable W. W. Pole, dated on board the Neptune, off Martinique, the 5th February 1809.

8-I-R,

AVING left Carlifle Bay, Barbadoes, about A Noon on the 28th January, with the Expedition for the Attack of this Ifland, I had the Pleafure, on the Evening of the fame Day, to meet with His Majefty's Ship Cleopatra, and the French Frigate La Topaze in Company; when Captain Pechell gave me the Letter, of which the inclofed is a Copy, flating the Manner of her Capture; and on my Arrival off here, the Hazard joined with Captain. Maude of the Jafon's Report, which I alfo inclofe.

Captain Pechell in the Cleopatra, from his advanced Polition, closed the Enemy first, and bore the Brunt of the Action. He placed his Ship in a Situation to attack with Advantage, and in fuch a Mauner as did credit to his Intrepidity and Judgment, and evinced also the high State of Discipline and Steadiness of his Officers and Crew.

Captain Maude, of the Jalon, loft not a Moment in getting into Action, and I had every Thing to expect from his Zeal and Gallantry, which I have witheffed for a Series of Years.

Particular Credit is also due to Captain Cameron, of His Majelty's Sloop Hazard, for boldly chacing, with a Determination to bring to Action, an Ene-

my's Frigate of the largest Class, before any of the other Ships were in Sight.

His Majefly's Ship Cleopatra, off Baffeterre, SIR, Guadaloupe, Jan 23, 1809. IN Confequence of feparating from His Majefly's

Ship Jalon, and there being no Probability of Communication either with Captain Maude, or Captain Pigot of the Latona, and Senior Officer of the Blockading Squadron, I beg to inform you, that Yefterday, in obedience to the Signals made to me by Captain Maude, I chaced a Ship in the N. N. W. which I fhortly afterwards made out to be a French Frigate, who, on feeing us, hauled clofe in Shore, and anchored under a small Battery a little to the Southward of Point Noir, having afcertained that they were fecuring her, (by Springs on her Cables, and others fail to the Trees on Shore) as well as her Situation would permit, I made every Preparation for attacking her, the Wind being at this Time from the Southward and Weftward, but very light and variable; at half paft Two P. M. we got the true Breeze and turned up to Windward till within a Cable's Length of the Shore, and half Mufket-fine diftant from the Enemy, which was effected at Five o'Clock, when his Firing commenced. I faw from the Shape of the Land and the fhoal Water between us, that I could not clofe without Danger of being raked, I was therefore obliged to anchor in Six Fathoms and a Half, and returned his Fire, which fortunately cut away his outfide Spring, when he fwung in Shore with his Head towards us, giving us the Advantage I refused him before; this I to effectually preferved, that he never afterwards got more than Half his Broadfide to bear ; we thus engaged for Forty Minutes, when the Jalon and Hazard came up, the former having taken a Pofition on her S arboard Quarter, and firing her Bow Guns, the Hazard at the fame Time directing hers to the Fort, the Eveny hauled down his Colours, finding he was not able to fultain fo unequal a Combat.

She proves to be the French National Frigate Topaze, carrying Forty-eight Guns, Eighteen, Twenty-four, and Thirty-fix Pounders, commanded by Monf. Lahalle, Capitaine de Frigate, with a Complement of Three Hundred and Thirty Men; the has been fromBred Forty-feven Days, and had on board One Hundred Troops and Eleven Hundred Barrels of Flour for Cayenne, but meeting with fuperior Force off that Port the was obliged to puth for Guadaloupe.

Our Lofs is comparatively finall with that of the Enemy, having only Two Killed and One Wounded, as his Guas were chicfly pointed at our Maks and Rigging, which he fucceeded in cutting very much, molt of our Fore and Main Rigging that away, and had we been under fail mult have loft our Main Topmalt; on the other Side Twelve Killed and Eourteen Wounded, as near as can be aftertained, for the Inflant her Colours were hauled down. One-third at leaft took to the Water, and feveral were either killed or drowned in attempting to effect their Efcape.

Having thus, Sir, given you the Detail, it becomes a pleafing Duty to me to reprefent the Zeal with which Captain Cameron of the Hazard offered his Services before the Action, and had the Wind allowed him to get up fooner, would have attacked the Fort, and thereby prevented many of the Troops getting on Shore.

1 am happy, alfo, in having an Opportunity of bearing Teltimony to the Gallantry difplayed by the Officers and Crew of His Majefty's Ship under my Command; and beg leave to recommend my First Lieutenant Simplon to their Lordships' Notice; alfo Lieutenants Puckingham and Lambert as good Officers, and every Way deferving their Lordships' Favour.

His Majesty's Ship Jason, off Bassierre, SIR, Guadaloupe, Jan. 23, 1809.

1 BEG. Leave to acquaint you, that while cruizing of Baffeterre in purfuance of your Order to blockade the French Frigate at that Anchorage, on the Morn-ing of the 22d the Cleopatra made the Signal for a Julpicious Sail bearing North, which I immediately directed her to reconnoitre, and foon after made fail in the Jafon in that Direction ; the was in a thort Time difcovered to be an Enemy's Frigate, flanding in for the Land, where the effected her Purpole of anchoring close under a finall Battery. As I perceived 'by the Cleopatra's Motions, it was Captain Pechell's Intention to bring her to Action as early as poffible, I confidered it unnectifiary to make any Signals to him; and he most fully anticipated my Withes, by bringing his Ship to Anchor on the Frigate's flai-, board Bow, and opened a heavy Fire, which was warmly returned and kept up by the Enemy, till the Jalon came to on his Quarter, and commenced her Fire from the Bow Guns, foon after which the ftruck her Colours. After filencing the Battery fhe was taken polieffion of, and proved to be the National Frigate La Topaze, of Forty-eight Guns, (long "Eighteens and Thirty-two Pounder Carronades) and Four Hundred Men, many of whom, with some Troops the had on board, had efcaped on Shore, from Rochefort, loaded with Flour for the Supply of the French Colonies, commanded by Monfieur Lahalle, Capitaine de Fregate, and Officer of the . Legion of Honour.

Captain Pechell fpeaks in high Terms of Commendation of the Conduct of his Officers and Ship's Company.; and I have allo every Reafon to be fatisfied with that of those of my own Ship, and only regret a fuller Opportunity for their Exertions was not afforded them.

In juffice to Captain Cameron, of the Hazard, I. conceive it my Duty to inform you that (notwithflauding the Disparity of Force, and the Uncertainty of falling in immediately with any of our Cruizers) the Enemy's Ship was chased by him from Daylight, and that nothing but the baffling Winds prerented his coming into Action, and taking the Station assigned him. Being anxious to regain my Station off Baffeterre to prevent the Efcape of the other Frigate, which I had in the Afternoon diffatched the Cherub to watch, I left the Prize in Charge of the Cleopatra and Hazard; and the Service on which I have fince been employed not having permitted me to communicate with them, I am ignorant of the Number killed and wounded on board the French Ship. The Cleopatra, I am forry to fay, had two badly wounded (fince dead); this Ship not a Man hurt.

His Majefly's Ship Acafla, Bay Robert, SIR, 31/f January 1809.

I HAVE the Honour to inform you, that, at Day-dawn of Yefterday, the Division of Transports carrying the Army under the Command of Lieutenant-General Beckwith were Four Leagues to Windward of the Carvel Rock.

I immediately bore, up with it for Bay Robert, being joined in my Way thither by the Ethalion, Forrefter, Ring-Dove, Haughty, and Eclair, the Eurydice having joined me the preceding Evening.

The Weather was uncommonly windy and fqually, and there was a very confiderable Swell as far out as Loup Garou, neither of the fmall Frigates (the Cleopatra or Circe) had joined, to go in with the Tranfports, and, not knowing what Oppofition might be made to a Landing, I determined to enter the Cul de Sac with all the Men of War, that I might effectually protect the Landing, if Occasion required, which I could not possibly have done had I anchored as far out as Loup Garou.

Having therefore placed Boats with Flags, at a Graplin upon the Edges of the Shoals, I led in with the Acasta, followed by the Penelope and Transports, and anchored the whole of them about Noon.

This Decifion, I truft, Sir, you will approve, as it enabled me to land the Firft and Second Brigades, amounting to Four Thousand Five Hundred Men, with a certain Proportion of Artillery and Horfes, before Sunfet, which I could not otherwise have done, and this Morning by Seven o'Clock all the Referve were landed.

To Captains Cochrane of the Ethalion, and Bradhaw of the Eurydice, 1 am indebted for arranging the Boats for the first Landing, and more particularly to Captain Dick of the Penelope, for fuperintending that Arrangement, and leading in the Transports, which he did with great Judgment.

From Captain Withers, the principal Agent for Transports, I received all that Affiltance in the various Arrangements which I had to make, which could be expected from an Officer of great Zeal and clear Comprehension; and Lieutenant Schhoule, whom you did me the Honour to appoint as my Adjutant for this Expedition, rendered me very effential Service in carrying on the detailed Duties of the Squadron.

Extrast of a Letter from Captain Browne, of His Majefly's Sloop the Plover, to Admiral Young, Commander in Chief at Plymouth, and transmitted by the latter to the Hon. W. W. Pole, dated at Sea, the 22d Instant.

I BEG to report to you that His Majefly's Sloop under my Command, this Day at 10 P. M. captured, after a Pursuit of Thirty-fix Hours, the French Ketch Privateer, L'Amiral Martin, of Bayonne, mounting Four Eighteen-Pounder Guns, with a Complement of One Hundred and Four Men.

Extract of a Letter from Captain M'Kinley, of His Majefly's Ship the Lively, to the Hon. W. W. Pole, dated Villa Garcia, March 15, 1809.

BEG Leave to flate to you, for the Information be of my Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, that fince my last Letter of the 6th Inflant (which I had the Honour of transmitting by the Statira,) on the 7th Inflant, a Body of French Troops entered the Towns of Carril and Villegarcia, and having killed fome old Men and Women whom they faw in the Streets, and fet Fire to a few Houles of the Prople whom they judge inimical to them, they retreated to Paden.

On the 9th a Party of Eighty Infantry and Four Cavalry, under the Command of Three Officers from Pontivedra, entered Marin, but a Fire being opened on them from this Ship, and the Plover, and the Carronade from the Launch, they made a most precipitate Retreat; the Commanding Officer on a good Horfe, and the Four Cavalry benefiting by their being mounted, left their Companions, who outrunning their Officers, a Captain and Lieutenant fell into the Hands of the Spaniards, who delivered them to me.

It is with the most heartfelt Satisfaction that I can with Confidence affore their Lordships that the Spirit of the Gallicians is aroufed to the most enthufialtic Ardour, governed by a cool and determined Courage, which the Feelings of Loyalty and Patriotilin naturally infpire, and they could ently look for Aid to the Generofity of the British Government speedily to succour them with Aims and Ammunition to enable them to fucceed in the glorious and just Caufe which they have undertaken, to expel the perfidious Invaders of their Country.

The Enemy is much diffreffed by a malignant Fever; not less than two Cart. Loads are buried daily from the Head Quarters at St. Jago; the Military Governor and Commanding Officer of Artillery, with a Number of other Officers, have fallen victims to it.

Skinnishes daily take place between the Pealants and the Enemy, which renders their procuring Provilions both difficult and haraffing, and many fall Victims to Fatigue . In this perpetual Warfare, the Enemy invariably duffer, particularly on the 2d In-thant, when One Hundred and Five Frenchmen were pillaging the Convent of St. Bernardo de San Clandio, where Don Bernardo Gonçales, with Thirty-Two Spaniards attacked them, took many Horfes laden with Pillage, and only Sixteen of the Enemy. escaped. On the 9th, 10th, and 11th Instant, the French attacked the Pealants of Deza and Traldeza, fultained by those of Banos and Taberros, and were

obliged to retreat with the Lofs of One Hundred and Fourteen Men and an Officer.

The Appearance of His Majefty's Ship has very much gratified the Spaniards, who are incefant in their Praife and Gratitude to the British Government.

On my coming to this Place on the 11th Inftant, I left the Plover at Marin, the French being at Pontevedra, but have received Information To-day, that a Division of the Spanish Army, under the Command of the Marquis de Valladares was attacked on the 1sth by Marshal Soult, who has fince retired to Tuy, and ordered all his Detachments in the Vicinity of Vigo to join him by forced Marches; i would not therefore detain her longer.
