Duty shall be fixed in the Proclamation, or other lawful Inftrument which shall be made and iffued by the faid Governor for the Purpole of imposing such Duty, which Time shall not be lefs than Six Months from the Day of iffuing such Proclamation or other lawful Inftrument; and provided also, that the Rate of Duty imposed on the Importation of Goods (not the Growth, Produce, or Manufacture of Great Britain or Ireland) from any Part of His Majesty's Dominions, when so imported in British built Veffels, owned and navigated according to Law, shall in no Case be so high as that which shall be imposed on the like Goods so imported in the Vessels of Foreign States.

And it is His Majefty's Pleafure, that no Goods, Wares, or Merchandize, the Growth, Produce, or Manufacture of the Countries to the Eaftward of the Cape of Good Hope, be imported into the faid Settlement, or the Territories or Dependencies thereof, except by the United Company of Merchants trading to the Eaft Indies; and that no fuch Goods, Wares, or Merchandize be permitted to be exported from thence, except for Sea Stores only, or by the United Company of Merchants trading to the Eaft Indies, or by their Licence.

But it is His Majesty's Pleasure, that nothing in this Order contained shall extend to prevent Ships or Veffels employed in the Southern Whale Fishery from carrying on the same, in such and the same Manner as might have been done if this Order had not been made.

And it is alfo His Majefty's Pleafure, that no Arms, or Artillery, Gunpowder, or Ammunition of any Sort, be allowed to be imported into the faid Settlement, or the Territories or Dependencies thereof, except by the faid United Company of Merchants in England trading to the Ealt Indies, or by Licence from His Majefty.

And it is His Majesty's further Pleasure, that the Trade and Commerce to and from the faid Settlement, and the Territorics and Dependencies thereof, shall be subject to such of the Laws of Trade and Navigation as would have affected the same if this Order had not been made, except fo far as such Laws are contrary to this prefent Order.

And the Right Honourable the Lords Commif-: fioners of His Majefty's Treatury, and the Lords : Commiffioners of the Admiralty, are to give the neceffary Directions herein, as to them may respectively : appertain. Steph. Cottrell.

The KING's Moft Excellent Majefty in Council. WHEREAS, in virtue of the Powers vefted in His Majefty by fundry Acts of Parliament, His Majefty was pleafed, by His Order in Council, bearing Date the 5th of October laft, to allow, and

did thereby allow, until the Twenty-fifth Day of March One thousand eight hundred and nine, the Importation into any Port or Place of Great Britain. of certain Articles of Provision, in the Manner and under the Conditions therein mentioned ; and whereas by an Act, paffed in the prefent Sellion of Parliament, it is enacted, that an Act, made in the Thirty-ninth Year of His prefent Majefty, intituled "An A& for enabling His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation, and to permit the Importation of Corn, and for allowing the Importation of other Articles of Provision without Payment of Duty, to continue in Force until Six Weeks after the Commencement of the next Seffion of Parliament," which was continued by an Act of the Thirty-ninth and Fortieth Years of His prefent Majelty, and amended and further continued by feveral fubfequent Acts until the Twenty-fifth Day of March One thousand eight hundred and nine, shall, from and after the faid Twenty-fifth Day of March One thousand eight hundred and nine, be, and the fame is thereby, further continued until the Twenty-fifth Day of March One thousand eight hundred and ten, except fo far as refpects the Exportation of Corn, Grain, or Flour to Ireland; His Majesty is thereupon pleased, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, to allow, and doth hereby allow, until the Twenty-fifth Day of March One thousand eight hundred and ten, the Importation into any Port or Place of Great Britain of any Beans, called Kidney or French Beans, Tares, Lentiles, Calavancies, and all other Sorts of Pulfe; and alfo of Bulls, Cows, Oxen, Calves, Sheep, Lambs, and Swine, and of Beef, Pork, Mutton, Veal, and Lamb, (except Salted Beef, and Pork,) and 'of Bacon, Hams, Tongues, Butter, Cheefe, Potatoes, Rice, Sago, Sago Powder, Tapioca, Vermicelli, Millet Seed, Poultry, Fowls, Eggs, Game, and Sour Crout, in any Britifh Ship or Veffel, or in any other Ship or Veffel belonging to Perfons of any Kingdom or State in Amity with His Majefty, and navigated in any Manner whatever, without Payment of any Duty whatfoever; provided that a due Entry shall be made of all fuch Articles as aforefaid, that shall be imported with the proper Officers of the Cuftoms at the Port where the fame shall be imported, under the Penalties and Forfeitures mentioned and referred to in the faid above-recited Act, passed in the Thirty-ninth Year of His prefent Majesty: And the Right Honourable the Lords Commiffioners of His Majefty's Treafury are to give the neceffary Directions herein accordingly.
