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Vienna, June 5.

THe Emperor at the desire of the Nobility, has resolved to remain at *Oedenburg*, during the whole Session of the Dyet, and to gratifie the States, his Imperial Majesty has made the Count of *Estersbach* Palatine of *Hungary*, and its hoped all other things will be so ordered, as that the Dyet will have a happy Conclusion. Count *Tackley* is not yet come thither, and there is a report that he begins to raise new difficulties, which if it be true, gives great cause to suspect he is Treating with the Turks.

Brussels, June 17. Don *Balthazar Fuen Mayor*, who came hither two days since from the *Hague*, is this Morning gone for *Mons*, to wait upon the Prince of *Parma*, and to acquaint him with the Resolutions of the States-General of the *United-Provinces*, upon his Representations concerning the French Pretensions in *Luxemburg* &c. We have an Account of the death of, Don *Bernardo de Salinas*, who dyed the 8th Instant at *Hanover*, being on his Journey to *Denmark*, whither he was going in the quality of Envoy Extraordinary from the King of *Spain*. The Affairs of *Liege* continue still extremely embroiled; the Emperors Commissioner the *Sieur Fodocus* is endeavouring to Compose them, he has been at *Liege* and has persuaded the Magistrates to send Deputies to *Cologne* to make their Submission, which will hardly be accepted, unless they restore things into the same state they were in before these Disorders happened, and resolve to receive their Princes Edicts about the 60th Penny; who in the mean time has put a strong Garrison into the Castle of *Stockem* near *Liege*, in order to the obliging all Vessels that pass, to pay that Imposition, which they at *Liege* are so concerned at, that they were once resolved to have marched out with what Force they could make, and to have attacked it as they did *Wet*, but that it appeared to be an Enterprize of too great difficulty.

Brussels, June 20. The Letters we receive from *Luxemburg*, dated the 15th Instant, say, that the French Troops were on their march, in order to their Quartering as they did lately, in that Countrey, for that *Chinay* and other places they pretend to, are not yielded to them. They of *Liege* do every day more and more exasperate things; for a Party of theirs being lately abroad, surprized, and fell upon forty of the Princes Horse, who were gathering Contributions, of whom they killed several upon the place, and took some Prisoners. The Court continues at *Mons*, the States of *Hainault* being at present Assembled there. The Duke of *Arschot*, who was given over by every body, is now in a condition that gives hopes of his Recovery.

Paris, June 21. The Duke of *Luxemburg* has not only the Kings leave, to return to Court, but to wait the next Quarter, which begins the first of the next Month, as Captain of the *Guards du Corps*; and on Thursday last he lay at *Versailles*, which ma-

ny people were very much surprized at, not having before heard any thing of his being restored to the Kings Favour. Monsieur de *Lauxun*, who has been so long a Noble prisoner at *Pignerol*, is removed to the Citadel of *Cbalons*, where he is permitted to see his Friends, and to Write and Receive Letters, which its believed, will be soon followed with an entire Liberty. The Jesuits were yesterday before the Parliament, according to the Order that had been sent them, on occasion of the new Briefs they have received from the Pope concerning *Father Mainburg*, which they were forbid to obey.
