And it is hereby further ordered, that His Majesty's Printer do forthwith print a competent Number of Copies of the said Form of Prayer and Thanksgiving, that the same may be forthwith sent round and read in the several Churches of England and Wales, and the Town of Berwick-upon-Tweed.

IN obedience to the Orders of the Honourable the House of Commons, Notice is hereby given, that Application is to be made during the next Session of Parliament, for Leave to bring in a Bill for the Purpose of making, maintaining, and repairing a Ditch, Cut, or Waterway, from Auchmoor Bridge to the said Loch; which said Cut or Waterway, will pass through the Parishes of Kinglassie and Ballingry, in the County of Fife, and the Parish of Portmoak, in the County of Kinross; with Power to make such Dams, Sluices, Side Drains, and Banks, as may be necessary for the said Purpose, in order to drain from the present Surface of the Loch, a Quantity of Water not exceeding Six Feet in perpendicular Height; and for obtaining such other Powers as are necessary for carrying the said Work into Effect. September 22, 1809.
