which His Majesty began His happy Reign.
And it is hereby further ordered, that His Majesty's Printer do forthwith print a competent Number of Copies of the Said Form of Prayer and Thankigiving, that the same may be forthwith sent round and read in the several Churches of England and Wales, and the Town of Berwick-upon-Tweed. IN obedience to the Orders of the Honourable the House of Commons, Notice is hereby given, that Application is to be made during the next Sellion of Parliament, for Leave to bring in a Bill for the Purpose of making, maintaining, and repairing a Ditch, Cut, or Waterway, from Auchmoor Bridge to the faid Loch; which faid Cut or Waterway, will poss through the Parishes of Kinglassie and Ballingry, in the County of Fise, and the Parish of Portmoak, in the County of Kinrols; with Power to make such Dams, Sluices, Side Drains, and Banks, as may be necessary for the said Purpose, in order to drain from the present Surface of the Loch, a Quantity of Water not exceeding Six Feet in perpendicular Height; and for obtaining such other Powers as are necessary for carrying the said Work into Essect. September 22, 1809.

Otice is hereby given, to the Proprietors of Lands and Litutes, in the Parishes of Ellingham, Ringwood, and Sopley, in the County of Southhampton, and to all other Persons whom it may concern, that in the next Session of Parliament a Petition will be presented to the Honourable House of Commons, for Leave to bring in a Bill, in order to obtain an Act of Parliament for dividing, allotting, inclosing, exchanging, watering, irrigating, draining, improving, embanking, and appropriating the Common and leveral Meadows, Marihes, Pastures, Lands, Waste Grounds, Moors and Waters, and improvable Congregation, or Assembly, on the Sunday next Places, and for altering, diverting, rendering navi-
