tique in Force until Six Weeks after the Commence- ! ment of the next Sellion of Parliament," which was continued by an Act of the Thirty-ninth and Fortieth Years of His present Majelly, and amended and further continued by several subsequent Acts until the Twenty fifth Day of March One thousand eight hundred and ten, shall, from and after the faid Twenty-fifth Day of March One thousand eight hundred and ten, be, and the same is thereby further continued until the Twenty-fifth Day of March One thousand eight hundred and eleven, except so far as respects the Exportation of Corn, Grain, or Flour to Ireland; His Majesty is thereupon pleased, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, to allow, and doth hereby allow, until the Twenty-fifth .Day of March One thousand eight hundred and eleven, the Importation, into any Port or Place of Great Britain, of any Beans, called Kidney or French Beans, Tares, Lentiles, Calavancies, and all other Sorts of Pulse; and also of Bulls, Cows, Oxen, Calves, Sheep, Lambs, and Swine, and of Beef, Pork, Mutton, Veal, and Lamb, (except Salted Beef, and Pork,) and of Bacon, Hams, Tongues, Butter, Cheese, Potatoes, Rice, Sago, Sago Powder, Tapigca, Vermicelli, Millet Seed, Poultry, Fowls, Eggs, Game, and Sour Crout, in any British Ship or Vessel, or in any other Ship or Vessel belonging to Persons of any Kingdom or State in Amity with His Majesty, and navigated in any Manner whatever, without Payment of any Duty whatfoever; provided that a due Entry shall be made of all such Articles as aforesaid, that shall be imported, with the proper Officers of the Customs at the Port where the fame shall be imported, under the Penalties and Forfeitures mentioned and referred to in the faid above recited Act, passed in the Thirty-ninth Year of His present Majesty: And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majetty's Treatury are to give the necessary Directions herein accordingly. Extract of a Letter from Viscount Weilington to the Earl of Liverpool, dated Vigea, March 28, 1810

HE French Corps under the Command of Mar-thall Nev, and that under Loifon, and Keller, shall Ney, and that under Loison, and Keller. man's Corps, are in Old Catille, and in Politions on the Tormes, with their Advanced Poils upon the Agueda. The Advanced Poils of the British Army, under Brigadier-General Cranford, are likewife upon the Agueda, and between that River and the Coa.

The French attacked the Post at Barba del Puerco, which was occupied by Four Companies of the 95th Regiment, under Lieutenant-Colonel Beckwith, on the Night of the 19th Instant.

Immediately opposite Barba del Puerco, on the other side of the River, is St. Felices, and between these two Villages the only Bridge on the Agueda |

below Ciudad Roderigo; and the recent Fall of Rain had filled the River, which was nowhere fordable.

The Enemy had collected a Brigade of Infantry at St. Felices, and croffed the Bridge with Six Hundred Men after dark; keeping the Remainder on the other Side. These followed the Piquet of the 95th up from the Bridge, and immediately made their Attack; but they were repulsed with the Lofs of Two Officers and Seven Men killed, and Six Prifoners and Thirty Firelocks

I am forry to add, that Lieutenant Mercer of the 95th, and Three Men, were killed, and Ten were wounded in this Affair; which was highly creditable to Colonel Beckwith, and displayed the Gallantry and Discipline of the Officers and Troops under his Command. The Adjutant Lieutenant Stewart offtinguished himself.
