AT the Council-Chamber *Whitehall*, the 14th of April 1810,

P R E S E N T,

The Lords of His Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the Forty-eighth Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, intituled "An Act for enabling His Majesty to establish a permanent Local Militia Force under certain Restrictions, for the Defence of the Realm," it was, amongst other Things, enacted, that a permanent Local Militia Force should be raised in such Counties, or Parts of Counties, as His Majesty should by any Warrant, under His Royal Sign Manual, direct: And whereas it was by the said Act further enacted, that the said Force should not in any County, or Part of any County, exceed Six Times the original Quota, or Proportion of original Quota of the Regular Militia: And whereas it was also, among other Things, further enacted, that the Warden of the Cinque Ports, Two ancient Towns, and their Members, should carry the said Act into Execution, within his Jurisdiction, and should appoint the Number of Men to be raised, in pursuance of the said Act, for each of the said Ports, Two ancient Towns, and their Liberties, and the several Members thereof respectively: And whereas by another Act passed in the Forty-ninth Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, it was, amongst other Things, further enacted, that it should be lawful for His Majesty's Privy Council to ascertain, settle, and fix the Quota of Local Militia for the said Cinque Ports, Two ancient Towns, and their Members, and for that Purpose to require and have all such Returns of the Number of Men liable to serve, and exempt therein, as should be necessary to enable the said Privy Council to regulate and fix a proper Quota for such Local Militia: And whereas Returns have been made to His Majesty's Privy Council of the Number

of Men liable to serve, and exempt in the Cinque Ports, Two ancient Towns, and their Members, and of the Number of Volunteers serving therein; His Majesty's Privy Council, in pursuance of the said last mentioned Act of Parliament, and of the Powers and Authorities therein contained, have accordingly ascertained, settled, and fixed, and do hereby ascertain, settle, and fix the Quota of Local Militia for the said Cinque Ports, Two ancient Towns, and their Members, at One thousand five hundred, including the Volunteers, to be apportioned among the said Ports, Two ancient Towns, and their Liberties, and the several Members thereof respectively, according to the Provisions of the said first recited Act. And His Majesty's Privy Council do order and direct, that this Order be transmitted to the Warden of the Cinque Ports, in order that he may proceed upon the same, pursuant to the Directions of the said first recited Act. *Steph. The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS, by virtue of the Powers vested in His Majesty by sundry Acts of Parliament, His Majesty was pleased, by His Order in Council, bearing Date the 12th of April last, to allow, and did thereby allow, until the Twenty-fifth Day of March One thousand eight hundred and ten, the Importation into any Port or Place of Great Britain, of certain Articles of Provision, in the Manner and under the Conditions therein mentioned; and whereas by an Act, passed in the present Session of Parliament, it is enacted, that an Act, made in the Thirty-ninth Year of His present Majesty, intituled "An Act for enabling His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation, and permit the Importation of Corn, and for allowing the Importation of other Articles of Provision without Payment of Duty, to continue in Force until Six Weeks after the Commencement of the next Session of Parliament," which was continued by an Act of the Thirty-ninth and For-
