Treasury-Chambers, Whitehall, April 18, 1810.

WHEREAS the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury are authorized by an Act passed in the 47th Year of His present Majesty, Cap. 51, intituled "An Act to extend the Provisions of an Act made in the last Session of Parliament, for abolishing Fees received by certain Officers and other Persons employed in the Service of the Customs in the Port of London, and for regulating the Attendance of Officers and others so employed to the Out Ports, and to appropriate the Fees of certain abolished and vacant Offices in the Customs to the Superannuation Fund," to extend the Provisions of an Act passed in the 46th Year of His present Majesty, intituled "An Act for abolishing Fees received by certain Officers and other Persons employed in the Service of the Customs in the Port of London, and for regulating the Attendance of Officers and others so employed," to any Port or Ports in Great Britain, and to the Officers, Clerks and other Persons so employed in the Service of the Customs therein.

Now we, being three of the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, having taken the said Acts into our Consideration, and deeming it fit and expedient to exercise the Power so vested in us, do, in pursuance of that Part of the said first recited Act, by which we are required to give Notice in the London Gazette Three several Times, at least Fourteen Days before such Extension shall take place, hereby give Notice to all Persons concerned, that from and after the 31st Day of May 1810 all the Provisions contained in the said recited Act of the 46th Year of His present Majesty's Reign shall be extended, so far as the same relate to the Abolition of Fees to the several Ports in Scotland, including Grangemouth, intended to be constituted a Port.

WHEREAS it has been represented to the King, that on the 11th of April instant, William Rickcords, Esq; the Collector of His Majesty's Customs at the Port of Deal, received by the Post from some Person or Persons unknown, a Letter with the Deal Post Mark, dated Deal, the 9th of April 1810, signed "Mr. Aerdun without a Noise," and a Postscript signed "Burdett," stating that a Plan was laid to take away the Life of the said William Rickcords in February last, but that the Plot was discovered by a Woman; and warning the said William Rickcords to prepare for the World to come, and expressing the Writers' Hope that they should soon have the Pleasure of seeing the Blood from the said William Rickcords's Carcass running down the Canals;
