

Side of the Basou after mentioned, and to make, complete, and maintain a Branch of Railway or Tram Road from the said Main Line at or near to a Cottage or Dwelling-House, now in the Occupation of Messrs Pidcocks and Company, or their Undertenant, across the Eastern Branch of Lydney Pill aforesaid, down to and along the Eastern Side of the said Pill and intended Basou, to the said Cross Pill; and also to make and maintain a Basou on the Eastern Side of the said Lydney Bill immediately above the said Cross Pill, and to make and maintain a Cut or Canal to extend from the said Basou, and to communicate with the said River Severn at Nafs Point, with proper Towing-Paths, Lock Entrance, Harbour, and Tide-Gates into the said River Severn; and to divert the Water from Lydney Pill aforesaid, into the said Basou and Canal; and to stop up and discontinue the present Course of Lydney Pill below the said Cross Pill into the said River Severn; and to deepen, enlarge, and use the Part of the said Pill between the said Basou and the Place where the Pill divides into Two Branches; and to widen, enlarge, and extend the Eastern Branch of the said Pill to be fit for Navigation, to the Bridge above the Warehouse of the said Messrs. Pidcocks and Company, near to the said Lower Forge; or to make a new Cut for the whole Extent last aforesaid, or any Part thereof; which said Variations, Extensions, additional Branches, Basou, Wharfs, and Canal, are intended to pass and be made in or through the Parish of Lydney, in the County of Gloucester, and of which a Plan and Book of Reference are deposited with the Clerk of the Peace of the said County of Gloucester.

His Majesty, for the better apprehending and bringing to Justice the Person who fired such Gun or Pistol, is hereby pleased to offer a Reward of FIVE HUNDRED POUNDS to any one who shall discover and apprehend the said Offender, to be paid on Conviction by the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury.

*W*HEREAS it has been represented to the King, that on the 11th of April instant, William Rickcords, Esq; the Collector of His Majesty's Customs at the Port of Deal, received by the Post from some Person or Persons unknown, a Letter with the Deal Post-Mark, dated Deal, the 5th of April 1810, signed "Mr. Air-Gun without a Noise," and a Postscript signed "Burdett;" stating that a Plan was laid to take away the Life of the said William Rickcords in February last, but that the Plot was discovered by a Woman; and

warning the said William Rickcords to prepare for the World to come, and expressing the Writers' Hope that they should soon have the Pleasure of seeing the Blood from the said William Rickcords's Carcase running down the Canals;

His Majesty, in order to promote the Discovery of the Offender or Offenders by whom the aforesaid threatening Letter was sent to the said William Rickcords, is hereby graciously pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to all Persons privy thereto, (except him, her, or them who actually sent the same,) upon such Persons giving such Information as may lead to the Conviction of the Offender or Offenders who actually sent the said Letter.
