labour to convince all Men of the Advantages which refult from a due and proper Obedience to the Laws and Ordinances which Wildom has established; happy if by the Sobriety of our Lives we shall be favoured, like the faithful Men who have gone before us, as the Instruments of Divine Providence in discouraging the Principles which tend only to the Subversion of all good Covernment and focial Order.

From the great Experience of your Majefty's faithful Reprefentative in thefe and other Matters, which concern the Interests of our Church, we confidently expect high Encouragement in the Discharge of the difficult Duties recommended to us by your Majefty. He has fully fatisfied us of your Majefty's Determination to support us under every difcouraging Embarraffment, and of your Royal Conviction that by timely Caution and the firm and prudent Conduct recommended to us by your Majefty, our public Miniferations may be bleffed of God to make the virtuous and upright more fledfall, and to reclaim those who may for a Time have wandered in Search of pernicious Novelties.

Firmly convinced of the indiffoluble Connection which muft ever fubfift between the temporal Welfare of a People and the faithful Difcharge of their more facred Duties, we shall exert our molt strenuous Endeavours to maintain and improve that happy Union by impreffing a just Senfe of the bleffed Effects of it upon the Minds of all those that are committed to our Care; admonishing them, as they value the diftinguishing Privileges of an excellent and admired Conflitution, to cultivate and extend the Obfervance of those spiritual Obligations which alone can render these Blefings permanent or themselves

happy. The condescending and indulgent Communication of the pious and benevolent Sentiments by which your Mejesty is animated at this momentous Crilis, has made a deep Impression on our Hearts; binding us by new Ties of Affection to your Majefty's Perfon, and calling forth a more ardent Zeal in behalf of your Government. While we feel that, from the general Afpect of the Times, our Duties as Pastors of the Church of Scotland are multiplied, and that our Refponfibility is increased, we feel allot hat our Minds are invigorated by the firm Reliance which your Majefty is pleafed to repofe in our Wildom and Fidelity.

We rejoice in the renewed Affurance, that the Good of the Church and the Welfare of your People are the Objects of your Majefty's conftant and moft anxious Care; and we have learned, from long Experience, that no Services are more acceptable to your Royal Mind than those which are conducive to these great Ends of your Government. Under this Impression, we shall labour with united Essort to promote by our Deliberations the particular Interefts of the Church of Scotland, and the Profperity and Happinels of that Portion of your Subjects who have been accuftomed to receive from it, through us, the wholefome Precepts of the Gofpel.

We receive your Majefty's Royal Donation for the Propagation of Christian Knowledge and the Principles of the Reformed Religion, in the Highlands and Islands of Scotland, as a pleafing Expref-tion of your Majefty's unremitted Attention to the best Interests of your People. It shall be our Care to fecure, by a faithful Application of this Bounty the valuable Objects for which it has been beltowed

That Almighty God, the Father of our Lord Jefus Chrift, may protect your Majelly's Perfon, and prosper the Administration of your Government ; that he may blefs abundantly our Gracious Queen, the Prince and Princels of Wales, and all the Members of your illustrious House; and that, after a long and happy Reign over a loyal and affectionate People, you may at length be received to the Glory of the Heavenly Kingdom, are, through Jesus Chrift, the united and fervent Prayers of, May it pleafe your Majefty, your Majefty's molt faithful, moit obedient, and most loyal Subjects, the Ministers and Elders met in this National Affembly of the Church of Scotland.

During nearly Half a Century, your Majefty's Subjects have had displayed to them from the Throne, an Example of every public and private Virtue; an Example which has excited their Refpect and Veneration, and by its powerful Influence has been of incalculable Benefit in promoting their Happinefs.

Your Majelty has been called to discharge the Duties of a highly important Station, in one of the most eventful Periods to be found in History; a Period during which ancient Inflitutions have been destroyed, Thrones levelled with the Ground, and all the Relations which had for Ages connected the great Commonwealth of Europe torn afunder.
