A T the Court at the Queen's Palace, the 16th

PRESENT,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council. WHEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council of the Twenty-second Day of November last, for prohibiting the Exportation out of this Kingdom, or carrying Coasswife, Gunpowder or Salt-Petre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, will expire upon the Sixth Day of June next: And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, and the Safety of this Kingdom, that the said Prohibition should be continued for some Time langer. His Majesty doth therefore, by and with the longer, His Majesty doth therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby order, require, prohibit, and command, that no Person or Persons whatsoever, (except the Master General of the Ord-nance for His Majesty's Service,) do at any Time, during the Space of Six Months, to commence from the faid Sixth Day of June next, presume to transport into any Parts out of this Kingdom, or carry Coastwife, any Gunpowder or Salt-Petre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, or thip or lade any Gunpowder or Salt-Petre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, on board any Ship or Vessel, in order to transporting the same into any Parts beyond the Seas, or carrying the same Coastwise, without Leave or Permission in that Behalf first obtained from His Majesty or His Privy Council, upon Pain of incurring and suffering the respective Forseitures and Penalties insliced by an Act, passed in the Twenty-ninth Year of His late Majesty's Reign, intituled "An "Act to empower His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation of Salt-Petre, and to enforce the Law for empowering His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation of Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition; and also to empower " His Majesty to restrain the carrying Coastwise of "Salt-Petre, Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition:"—And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, the Master-General and the rest of the principal Officers of the Ordnance, and His Majelly's Secretary at War, are to give the necessary Directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain.
