Gentlemen of the Houfe of Commons,

His Majelty has commanded us to thank you for the liberal and ample Supplies which you have granted for the Services of the prefent Year.

His Maiefly deeply regrets the neceffary Extent of the Demands which those Services have created ; . but we are commanded to express to you the Confolation which He has derived from obferving that the Refources of the Country, manifelling themfelves by every Mark of Profperity, by a Revenue increasing in almost all its Branches, and by a Commerce extending itself in new Channels, and with an increased Vigour in Proportion as the Enemy has in vain attempted to deftroy it, have enabled you to provide for the Expences of the Year, without imposing the Burden of any New Taxation in Great Britain; and that, while the Taxes which have been neceffarily reforted to for Ireland have been imposed upon Articles which will not interfere with the growing Profperity of that Country, you have found it confiltent with a due Regard to its Finances to diminish fome of those Burdens, and relax fome of those Regulations of Revenue, which had been felt the most inconvenient in that Part of the United Kingdom.

His Majesty further commands us to return you His Thanks for the Provision which you have enabled Him to make for the Establishment of His Screne H ghnels the Duke of Brunswick.

My Lords, and Gentlemen,

His Majesty has directed us to acquaint you, that Portugal, refcued from the Opprefiion of the Enemy, by the powerful Affiftance of His Majefty's Arms, has exerted Herfelf with Vigour and Energy in making every Preparation for repelling, with the continued Aid of His Majefty's Force, any renewed Attack on the Part of the Enemy, and that in Spain, notwithstanding the Reverses which have been experienced, the Spirit of Refiftance against France still continues unfubdued and unabated : And His Majefty commands us to affure you of His firm and unaltered Conviction, that not only the Honour of His Throne, but the beft Intereils of His Dominions, require His most strenuous and perfevering Affiliance to the glorious Efforts of those loyal Nations.

His Majefty has commanded us to recommend to you, upon your Return to your refpective Counties, to use your best Exertions to promote that Spirit of Order and Obedience to the Laws, and that general Concord amongst all Classes of His Majesty's Subjects, which can alone give full Effect to His Majesty's paternal Care for the Welfare and Happiness of His People. His Majesty has the fullest Reliance upon the Affections of His Subjects, whole Loyalty and Attachment have hitherto fupported Him through that long and eventful Period, during which it has pleafed Divine Providence to commit the Interefts of thefe Dominions to His Charge. His Majefty feels that the Prefervation of domettic Peace and Tranquillity, under the Protection of the Law, and in Obedience to its Authority, is amongft the most important Duties which He owes to His People.

His Majefly commands us to affure you that He will not be wanting in the Difcharge of that Duty; and His Majefly will always rely with Confidence on the continued Support of His loyal Subjects, to enable Him to refift with Succefs the Defigns of Foreign Enemies, and to transmit unimpaired to Pofferity the Bleffings of the British Constitution.

Then a Commiffion for proroguing the Parliament was read. After which the Lord Chancellor faid;

My Lords, and Gentlemen,

BY Virtue of His Majefly's Commiffion under the Great Seal, to us and other Lords directed, and now read, we do, in His Majefly's Name, and in Obedience to His Commands, prorogue this Parliament to Tuefday the Twenty-first Day of August next, to be then here holden; and this Parliament is accordingly prorogued to Tuefday the Twenty-first Day of August next.

DISPATCHES have been received at the Office of the Earl of Liverpool, from Lieutenant-General Sir John Stuart, dated Meffina, 24th April 1830, transmitting the Copy of a Dispatch and Enclosure from Brigadier-General Oswald, of which the following are Copies.

Head Quarters, Camp. before St. Maura, SIR, March 24, 1810.

HAVE the honour to report to your Excellency, that the Troops, with the Naval Forces under the Orders of Captain Eyre, of His Majefty's Ship Magnific nt, as per Margin*, failed from Zante on the Morning of the 21st, and reached the Island of St. Maura the fame Evening. Early the next Day, the Army difembarked to the Southward of the Town. The Enemy retiring from the Batteries, on the Approach of His Majefty's Ship Imo-gene and Gunboats, the Troops immediately moved forward. Lieutenant Colonel Lowe, commanding the Advance, a Portion of which (Greek Light Infantry), under Major Church, was kept upon the Flank, and drove a Party of Albanians from the ad-jacent Heights. The Town was found to be eva-cuated; General Camus having with his whole Forces (amounting to above One Thousand Men) retired into the Fortrefs and ftrong Fieldworks contingent thereto; at the fame Time acquainting the Civil Administration with his Inability any longer to protect them.

The Fortrels of St. Maura is lituated upon a nar-
