At the General Session of the Peace of our Lord the King, holden for the City of London, at the Guildhall within the said City, on Tuesday the 5th Day of June in the Fiftieth Year of the Reign of our Sovereign Lord George the Third, by the Grace of God of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland King, Defender of the Faith, before Thomas Smith Esq; Mayor of the City of London, Sir John William Anderson, Baronet, Sir Charles Price, Baronet, Sir Charles Flower, Baronet, Aldermen of the said City, John Silvester, Esq; Recorder of the said City, Joshua Jonathan Smith, Esq; William Domville, Esq; George Scholey, Esq; Sir William Plomer, Knight, other of the Aldermen of the said City, and others their Fellows, Justices of our said Lord the King, assigned to keep the Peace of our said Lord the King within the said City, and also to hear and determine divers Felonies, Trespasses, and other Misdemeanors committed within the said City;

To the Relations of the late Mr. HENRY ASHMORE.

Yardley, June 4, 1810.
