The KING's Moft Excellent Majefty in Council.

WHEREAS the Time limited by His Majefty's VV Order in Council of the Twenty-fecond Day of November 1aft, for prohibiting the Exportation out of this Kingdom, or carrying Coaltwife, Gunpowder or Salt-Petre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, will expire upon the Sixth Day of June next: And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majefty's Service, and the Safety of this Kingdom, that the faid Prohibition fhould be continued for fome Time longer, His Majefty doth therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby order, require, prohibit, and command, that no. Person or Persons whatloever, (except the Master General of the Ordwhatloever, (except the manufacture) do at any Time, during the Space of Six Months, to commence from the faid Sixth Day of June next, prefume to transport into any Parts out of this Kingdom, or carry Coastwife, any Gunpowder or Salt-Petre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, or ship or lade any Gunpowder or Salt-Petre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, on board any Ship or Veffel, in order to transporting the same into any Parts beyond the Seas, or carrying the fame Coaftwife, without Leave or Permission in that Behalf first obtained from His Majefty or His Privy Council, upon Pain of incur-ring and fuffering the respective Forseitures and Penalties inflicted by an Act, paffed in the Twenty-ninth Year of His late Majefty's Reign, intituled "An "Act to empower His Majefty to prohibit the "Exportation of Salt-Petre, and to enforce the Law for empowering His Majefty to prohibit the Exportation of Gunpowder, or any Sort of " Arms or Ammunition; and alfo to empower " His Majelly to reftrain the carrying Coaffwife of "" Salt-Petre, Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms or " Ammunition :"-And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, the Master-General and the reft of the principal Officers of the Ordnance, and His Majesty's Secretary at War, are to give the neceffary Directions herein, as to them may refpec-tively appertain. W. Fawkener. tively appertain.

"HE following Address has been transmitted to His Majelty's Principal Secretary of State to His Majelly's Principal Secretary of State for the Home Department, and has been prefented by him to the King; His Majefty was pleafed to receive it in the molt gracious Manner.

To the KING's Moft Excellent Majelly. May it pleafe Your Majefly,

WE, Your Majelty's most dutiful and loyal Sub-Jects, the Mayor, Juffice, Recorder, Vicar, Burgeffes, and other Inhabitants of the Town, Borough, and Parish of Okehampton, cannot omit the Opportunity, which the prefent Situation of foreign and domeitic Politics affords, of humbly approaching Your Majelty with our fincere and heartfelt Affurances of Loyalty and Attachment to Your Majefty's Perfon and Family.

We cannot oblerve, without the utmost Concern and Indignation, the Attempts of milchievous and milguided Men to bring the Decilions of the Legillature into Contempt, which, by fapping the Foundation of the happy Syltem of Legislation, which colt our Anceltors fuch Exertions and fo much Blood to erect, may eventually enable them to effect the overthrow of that fplendid Fabric of human Policy, the British Constitution; which is not only the purest Form of Government that ever existed, and the most fortunate to live under, but far furpaffes any Thing which the Ingenuity of indi-vidual Invention could have conceived, or the moft fanguine Friend of rational Freedom could ever hope to fee realized.

Under the specious Pretext of defending our Liberties, we are called upon to fanction such Innovations upon the Constitution as would endanger our Religion, our Liberties, and our Laws. -We truft, however, that the good Senfe of the British Nation will enable them clearly to fee through thefe Defigns, and that by giving their decided Support to the Constitution as by Law effablished, they will effectually protect it from the Attacks of foreign as well'as domettic Enemies

We beg, therefore, to affure Your Majefty, that we feel perfect Confidence in the Wildom of Parliament, and in the recent Affurance that Your Majefty will not be wanting in the Difcharge of Your Duty to preferve domestic Peace and Tranquillity under the Protection of the Law.

That the Bleffings of the British Conflication may be transmitted unimpaired to Polterity, and that Your Majelty and Your illustrious Defcendants, imitating Your Virtues, may long continue to reign over this happy and free People will ever be the Prayer of Your, Majelty's most dutiful and loyal.
