

AT the Court at the *Queen's Palace*, the 16th of May 1810,

P R E S E N T,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council of the Twenty-second Day of November last, for prohibiting the Exportation out of this Kingdom, or carrying Coastwise, Gunpowder or Salt-Petre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, will expire upon the Sixth Day of June next: And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, and the Safety of this Kingdom, that the said Prohibition should be continued for some Time longer, His Majesty doth therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby order, require, prohibit, and command, that no Person or Persons whatsoever, (except the Master-General of the Ordnance for His Majesty's Service,) do at any Time, during the Space of Six Months, to commence from the said Sixth Day of June next, presume to transport into any Parts out of this Kingdom, or carry Coastwise, any Gunpowder or Salt-Petre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, or ship or lade any Gunpowder or Salt-Petre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, on board any Ship or Vessel, in order to transporting the same into any Parts beyond the Seas, or carrying the same Coastwise, without Leave or Permission in that Behalf first obtained from His Majesty or His Privy Council, upon Pain of incurring and suffering the respective Forfeitures and Penalties inflicted by an Act, passed in the Twenty-ninth Year of His late Majesty's Reign, intituled "An Act to empower His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation of Salt-Petre, and to enforce the Law for empowering His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation of Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition; and also to empower His Majesty to restrain the carrying Coastwise of Salt-Petre, Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition:"—And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, the Master-General and the rest of the principal Officers of the Ordnance, and His Majesty's Secretary at War, are to give the necessary Directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain.

To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty.

*May it please Your Majesty,*

WE, Your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Mayor, Justice, Recorder, Vicar, Burgesses, and other Inhabitants of the Town, Borough, and Parish of Okehampton, cannot omit the Opportunity, which the present Situation of foreign and domestic Politics affords, of humbly approaching Your Majesty with our sincere and heartfelt Assurances of Loyalty and Attachment to Your Majesty's Person and Family.

We cannot observe, without the utmost Concern and Indignation, the Attempts of mischievous and misguided Men to bring the Decisions of the Legislature into Contempt, which, by sapping the Foundation of the happy System of Legislation, which cost our Ancestors such Exertions and so much Blood to erect, may eventually enable them to effect the overthrow of that splendid Fabric of human Policy, the British Constitution; which is not only the purest Form of Government that ever existed, and the most fortunate to live under, but far surpasses any Thing which the Ingenuity of individual Invention could have conceived, or the most sanguine Friend of rational Freedom could ever hope to see realized.

Under the specious Pretext of defending our Liberties, we are called upon to sanction such Innovations upon the Constitution as would endanger our Religion, our Liberties, and our Laws.—We trust, however, that the good Sense of the British Nation will enable them clearly to see through these Designs, and that by giving their decided Support to the Constitution as by Law established, they will effectually protect it from the Attacks of foreign as well as domestic Enemies.

We beg, therefore, to assure Your Majesty, that we feel perfect Confidence in the Wisdom of Parliament, and in the recent Assurance that Your Majesty will not be wanting in the Discharge of Your Duty to preserve domestic Peace and Tranquillity under the Protection of the Law.

That the Blessings of the British Constitution may be transmitted unimpaired to Posterity, and that Your Majesty and Your illustrious Descendants, imitating Your Virtues, may long continue to reign over this happy and free People will ever be the Prayer of Your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects.
