The humble Address of Your Majesties most Dutiful and Loyal Subjects, the Lord Lieutenant, Deputy Lieutenants, Justices of the Peace, Gentlemen, the Freeholders, and other Inhabitants within Your Majesties County of Cambridge.

WE being truly sensible of Your Majesties Princely Care, to preserve the Libertie a nd Properties of your Subjects, and knowing your Resolution to govern according to the Established Law of this Realm, manifested to us not only by your Majesties late Royal Declaration, but also by the whole Series of your Majesties Reign, do most humbly, with our whole Hearts and Minds, acknowledge the same; and do likewise return your Majesty our most humble Thanks, for Your so often repeated Acts of Graces, which ought to have produced true and unfeigned Obedience in all your Majesties Subjects: But since many ill minded and seditious Persons, have contrived and set on foot Traiterous and Wicked Designs, against your Majesties Royal Person and Government, by Law established; We do most faithfully Resolve and Declare, That we will assist and stand by your Majesty, your Heirs and Lawful Successors, with our Lives and Fortunes, against all Popish, Seditious, and Easious Dissenters, and all other Persons of what Degree or Condition soever, that shall Contrive or endeavour to do any Violence to your Majesties Sacred Person, or attempt the Alteration or Subversion of your Majesties Government, either in Church or State: And as a Testimony thereof, We have here publickly and unanimously set our Hands, humbly beseeching your Majesty to accept the same. The humble Address of the Nobility, Gentry, Clergy, and other the Inhabitants of Your Majesties Loyal County of Rutland.

WE Your Majesties most Faithful and Dutiful Subjects, seriously considering the unspeakable Misery and Confusion of this Nation before, and its great and constant Felicity and Happiness ever since your Majesties blessed Restauration, can never sufficiently bless God for the one, or enough abhor and detest the Principles, Ways, and Methods, that lead us into the other. And now of late we have been highly transported with your Majesties most Gracious Declaration, assuring us that no Irregularity can provoke your Majesty to Act contrary to the Laws and Constitutions of your Realm, vouchsafing to render Causes and Reasons of your Wisdom and Goodness to us, and as it were Appealing to the mercies of Your loving Subjects, not content barely to Secure us, unless You also further satisfy us. We can never be sufficiently sensible of, or return suitable Thanks to your Sacred Majesty for so great a Condescension, and had we any thing dearer than our Lives and Fortunes, we would lay all at your Majesties Feet, for the just defence of your most Sacred Person, undoubted Prerogative, and the most Primitive Religion, as now by Law Established: Beseeching the King of Kings to blast and defeat the Counsels and Designs of all Your Majesties Enemies, Romish and schismatical, and that the Church of England (that sure and formidable Bulwark against Popery) may for ever Flourish under your Majesty, and your most Lawful Heirs and Successors, the Great and Glorious Defender of it. So shall ever Pray, Your Majesties most Dutiful and Loyal Subjects.

Most Dread Sovereign,

Though we your Majesties most Humble and Obedient Subjects, the Mayor, Aldermen, and Burgeses of Your Majesties Burrough-Town of Newport, in Your County of Monmouth, do appear before your Sacred Majesty one of the last and least of your Majesties Corporations, and do from the very bottom of our Hearts, acknowledge your Majesties Royal Grace and Goodness in your late Declaration, touching the Dissolving of the two last Parliaments: And although your Majesties Gracious Reign over us since your Majesties Restauration, might be a sufficient Evidence and Testimony of your Integrity to the Protestant Religion, and of your Governing according to the known and established Laws of this Nation, and might be motives sufficient to reduce the most refractory to their just Duties and Obedience: Yet the Reasons your Majesty was pleased to give in your said Gracious Declaration, and your Resolution to maintain the Protestant Religion by Law established, and the continuance of your Government, as hitherto You have done, was a thing that could not be expected by us, nor the reality thereof suspected by the worst of Men; We will therefore henceforth study to undeceive those that have been led astray: And we do hereby protest and declare from our very Souls, that we will stick to your Majesty, your just Rigbts, and Royal Prerogatives, and the Lineal Succession in the Royal Line, to the last drop of Blood in our Bodies, against all Opposers whatsoever; and that we will hazard all that's good and dear to us to support your Majesty, your Heirs, and Lawful Successors, against the Male-contented of the Time, being assured that nothing in this World can absolve us from our Oaths of Supremacy and Allegiance, which we acknowledge we have all taken by good and lawful Authority: So beseeching God to preserve your Majesty from all dangers, we desire no longer to Live than to be esteemed,
