WHEREAS by an Act passed in the Forty-fifth Year of His Majesty's Reign, intituled "An Act for making further Provision for the effectual Performance of Quarantine;" it is among other Things enacted, that it shall and may be lawful for the Lords and others of His Majesty's Privy Council, or any Three or more of them, to make such Order as they shall see necessary and expedient, upon any unforeseen Emergency, or in any particular Case or Cases with respect to any Ship or Ships, Vessel or Vessels arriving, and having any infectious Disease or Distemper on board, or on board of which any infectious Disease or Distemper may have appeared in the Course of the last Voyage, or arriving under any other alarming or suspicious Circumstances, as to Infection; although such Ship or Ships, Vessel or Vessels shall not have come from any Place or Places from which His Majesty, His Heirs or Successors, by and with the Advice of His or Their Privy Council, may have adjudged and declared it probable that the Plague or any such infectious Disease or Distemper may be brought; and also with respect to the Persons, Goods, Wares, and Merchandize on board the same; and all such Orders so made by the Lords or others of the Privy Council, or any Three or more of them as aforesaid, shall be as good, valid, and effectual to all Intents and Purposes (as well with respect to the Commander, Master, or other Person having the Charge of any such Ship or Vessel, and all other Persons on board the same, as with respect to any other Persons having any Intercourse or Communication with them, and to the Penalties, Forfeitures, and Punishments to which they may respectively become liable,) as any Order or Orders made by His Majesty, His

Heirs or Successors, by and with the Advice of His or Their Privy Council concerning Quarantine, and the Prevention of Infection as aforesaid, and notified by Proclamation, or published in the London Gazette.

And whereas Advices have been received that the Yellow Fever has raged with great Malignity at the Havannah, and has proved fatal in many Instances, and that several trading Vessels from thence have been detained in the Quarantine Ground in the River Delaware, within the United States of America, being in a sickly Condition, or having lost some of their Passengers or Crew on their Passage thither: It is hereby ordered in Council, that all Ships and Vessels coming directly or circuitously from, or having touched at the Havannah, or any other Port in the Island of Cuba, or having received any Person or Persons, Goods, Wares, or Merchandize, Packets, Baggage, Wearing Apparel, Books, Letters, or any other Articles whatever, from out of any such Ship or Vessel, shall, on their Arrival on the Coasts of this Kingdom, or of the Isles of Guernsey, Jersey, Alderney, Sark, and Man, come to Anchor at such Place or Places as have been or shall be appointed by the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs, within or without the Port to which such Ships or Vessels shall be bound, in order that the State of Health of the Crew and Persons on board may be duly examined into and ascertained, prior to such Ships and Vessels being permitted to enter the Port of their Destination; and that in the meantime no Intercourse with any other Ship or Vessel, or Boat, or with the Shore, shall be permitted, nor any of the Crew or Persons on board such Ships or Vessels be suffered to come or be brought on Shore.

And the Right Honourable the Lords, Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, the Master General and the rest of the Principal Officers of the Ordnance, His Majesty's

Secretary at War, and the Governors and Commanders in Chief for the Time being of the said Isles of Guernsey, Jersey, Alderney, Sark, and Man, are to give the necessary Directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain. *W. Fawkener.*

A DISPATCH, of which the following is a Copy, was received, on the 4th Instant, at the Earl of Liverpool's Office, addressed to his Lordship by Lieutenant-General Viscount Wellington, K. B. dated Gouvea, 5th September 1810.

My Lord, *Gouvea, Sept. 5, 1810.*

I INCLOSE a Letter from Colonel Cox, late Governor of Almeida, to Marshal Beresford, containing a Copy of the Capitulation of Almeida, and an Account of the Circumstances which occasioned the early Surrender of that Place.

It was impossible to expect that Colonel Cox should continue the Defence of the Place after the unfortunate Occurrence which he mentions; and I am happy to add, that all the Accounts which I have received from Officers and Soldiers of the Militia, who have come into the Interior under the Capitulation, concur in applauding the Conduct of the Governor throughout the Siege, and in the unfortunate Situation in which he was placed towards its Close. It is certain that till the Explosion of the Magazine of the Place, the Garrison had sustained but little Loss, and were in the highest Spirits, and, encouraged by the Example of the Governor, and the Confidence they had in him, were determined to hold out till the last Moment.

I have the Honour to inclose the Copy of a Letter, which I received from Marshal Beresford, in which he inclosed the Letter from Colonel Cox; to which I have to add, that the Two Officers mentioned in that Letter, the Tenente del Rey, and the Major of the Artillery, have entered the Service of France, and that the latter has been promoted to the Rank of Colonel.—I am also informed that when sent out by the Governor into the Enemy's Lines to negotiate the Capitulation; and after he had informed the Enemy of the unfortunate Situation of the Garrison, he did not return to the Place when Hostilities recommenced; but continued in the Enemy's Lines.

Extract of a Letter from Marshal Beresford to Viscount Wellington, dated Moimenta da Serra, 4th September 1810.

I HAVE the Honour to transmit to your Lordship a Copy of a Letter I have received from Colonel Cox, late Governor of Almeida, and a Copy of the Capitulation of that Place.

With whatever Regret it was we witnessed the unexpected Fall of that Place, uninformed as we then were of the Cause, I think the Circumstance related in the Governor's Letter of the unfortunate Loss of his entire Ammunition, and the Injury sustained by the Town and Works, and loss to the Garrison by the Effects of the Explosion, will prove sufficiently the Impracticability of a protracted De-

fence; and I regret to say the Conduct of the Lieutenant Governor (Tenente Rey) Francisco Bernardo da Costa e Almeida, and of Major, commanding the Artillery, Fortunato Joye Barreros, increased the Difficulties occasioned by the Explosion. The former had until the Commencement of the Enemy's Fire acted with much Zeal and Propriety, but on that commencing shut himself up in Bomb-proofs; and after the Explosion, from personal Fear and to avoid any further firing, took advantage of the Consternation and Confusion which must be ever attendant in such a Case, to counteract the Governor's Attempt to hold out at least some short Time longer. The Major of Artillery, it appears, had acted well during the Siege, but after the Explosion appears to have added Treachery to Cowardice, and, to gain favour with the Enemy, communicated to him the real State of the Garrison, and that it had no Ammunition whatever left, which caused Marshal Massena to refuse the Terms demanded by the Governor.

Until the unfortunate Accident of the Explosion of the Magazine, the Garrison appears to have been in the highest Spirits, and in the best possible Disposition and Resolution to defend the Town, and which they unanimously state their Governor's Conduct inspired them with, as every Officer and Man gives the highest Applause to his unremitting Zeal and Activity, encouraging all by his own Example.

Your Lordship will see that it was of very little Consequence what Capitulation the Garrison had got, as it is obvious the Enemy would not have observed it, where it was his Interest to break it, and which will be witnessed by his having detained by Force, and contrary to the Terms of the Capitulation, Seven Officers and Two Hundred Men from each of the Three Regiments of Militia that were in the Garrison, and this with the Object of forming them into a Pioneer Corps.

The Officers and Soldiers of the Militia Regiments, to a Man, continued to refuse to enter voluntarily into the Service of the Enemy, and the Seven Officers and Two Hundred Men of each Regiment were detained forcibly. Such are the Circumstances which have come to my Knowledge of the Conduct of the Garrison of Almeida, and which I think it necessary to communicate to your Lordship.

Alda del Obispo, Aug. 30, 1810.

THE painful Task has fallen to my Lot of acquainting your Excellency, that I was reduced to the Necessity of surrendering the Fortrefs of Almeida, which I had the Honour to command, on the 27th Instant, at Ten o'Clock at Night, in consequence of the unfortunate Explosion of the great Magazine of Powder in the Cattle, and the small Magazines contiguous to it, by which dreadful Accident I was deprived of the Whole of my Artillery and Musket Ammunition, with the Exception of a few made-up Cartridges which remained in some of the Expence Magazines on the Ramparts, and Thirty-nine Barrels of Powder which were deposited in the Laboratory.

Upwards of Half of the Detachment of Artillery, and a great Number of Infantry Soldiers, besides several of the Inhabitants, were destroyed by the

Effect of this terrible Explosion. Many of the Guns were dismounted upon the Ramparts, the Works were materially injured, and a general Dismay spread amongst the Troops and Inhabitants of the Place.

In this distressing Situation I received a Letter from the Commander in Chief of the French Army of Portugal, proposing to me that I should surrender the Place to the French Army under his Command upon honourable Terms, which, he said, he was ready to grant; I answered, that I wished to know the Terms which he proposed; upon which the Articles, of which I have the Honour to send your Excellency a Copy, were transmitted to me, and which, after using every Effort in my Power to obtain more favourable Terms, I accepted, with an Exception in favour of the Militia Regiments. I hope my Conduct on this trying Occasion will meet your Excellency's Approbation, and that I shall remain justified by the Circumstances in the Eyes of my Country.

The Prince of Essling has been good enough to allow me to return to England on my Parole, accompanied by Major Hewitt and Captain Foley, of the 24th Regiment, and we are now on our way to France, to embark from thence for a British Port.

CAPITULATION for the Surrender of the Fortress of Almeida.

Art. I. The Garrison shall be Prisoners of War, with the Honours of War, that is to say, they shall march out with their Arms, which they shall deposit on the Glacis of the Place.

Answer—Accepted; except that the Militia, being only few, shall return to their Homes after having deposited their Arms; they are not to serve during the present War against France or her Allies.

Art. II. The Officers of every Description, and the Soldiers, shall retain, the former their Swords and Baggage, and the latter their Baggage only.

Art. III. The Inhabitants shall retain their Property, and shall not be disturbed for their Opinions.

Art. IV. The Military Stores and Artillery shall remain at the Disposal of the French Army, and shall be given up to the Commander of Artillery.

Art. V. The Magazines, Chests, &c. shall be given up to French Commissaries appointed for that Effect.

Art. VI. The Plans and Memorials of the Forts shall be given up to the Commandant of Engineers, of the French Army.

Art. VII. The Sick of the English and of the Portuguese Army shall be taken care of and maintained at the Expence of the French Army, and on their Recovery shall follow the Destination of the Garrison.

Copy of a Letter from Captain Selby, of His Majesty's Ship the Owen Glendower, to John Wilson Croker, Esq; dated off the Lisard, the 1st Instant.

S I R,

I HAVE to acquaint you, for the Information of my Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, that this Morning, being in a thick Fog, at Nine o'Clock, I heard a firing, and soon after was boarded by the Master and Crew of one of the Ships in my Convoy, who informed me he had been captured by a French Cutter Privateer, and it soon after clearing up a little; we had the good Fortune to discover him at no great Distance, and after receiving a great Number of Shot, and having his Sails and Yards shot away, and several Men wounded, struck to His Majesty's Ship, and proved to be the Indomptable Privateer, belonging to Roscoff, out One Day, and had made only One Capture out of my Convoy, which we had also the good Fortune to recapture. I feel particular Satisfaction in having to announce to their Lordships the above Capture, as there can be no Doubt she would have done much Mischief to our Trade in the Situation where we found her. She mounts Eighteen Guns, and had on board a Crew consisting of One Hundred and Twenty Men.

The Lord Chancellor has appointed George Hoper, of Lewes, in the County of Sussex, Gent. to be a Master Extraordinary in the High Court of Chancery.

As several Artificers and Manufacturers, Subjects of Great Britain, have, from Time to Time, gone into Foreign Countries to exercise their several Callings, contrary to the Laws of these Kingdoms, the following Abstracts of Acts of Parliament of Their late Majesties King George the First and Second, and of His present Majesty, for preventing such Practices, are published, for the Information of all Persons who may be ignorant of the Penalties they may incur by Disobedience to them: And it will be observed, that such Penalties likewise extend to those who are any ways concerned or instrumental in the Sending or Enticing Artificers or Manufacturers out of these Kingdoms, or in the Exportation of the Tools and Instruments used by them, as well as to the Artificers or Manufacturers themselves.

Statute 5 George I. Chap. 27.

IF any Person shall contract with, entice, or solicit, any Artificer in Wool, Iron, Steel, Brals, or other Metal, Clock-maker, Watch-maker, or any other Artificer of Great Britain, to go into Foreign Countries out of the King's Dominions, and shall be convicted thereof, upon Indictment or Information in any of the Courts at Westminster, or at the Assizes or Quarter Sessions, he shall be fined any Sum not exceeding **ONE HUNDRED POUNDS** for the first Offence, and shall be imprisoned Three Months, and till the Fine be paid. And if any Person having been once convicted shall offend again, he shall be fined at the Discretion of the Court, and imprisoned Twelve Months, and till the Fine be paid.

If any of the King's Subjects, being such Artificers, shall go into any Country out of His Majesty's Dominions, to exercise or teach the said Trades to Foreigners; and if any of the King's Subjects in any such Foreign Country, exercising any of the said Trades, shall not return into this Realm within Six Months after Warning given by the Ambassador, Minister, or Consul of Great Britain, in the Country where such Artificers shall be, or by any Person authorized by such Ambassador, &c. or by one of the Secretaries of State, and from henceforth inhabit within this Realm; such Persons shall be incapable of taking any Legacy, or of being an Executor or Administrator, or of taking any Lands, &c. within this Kingdom, by Descent, Devise, or Purchase, and shall forfeit all Lands, Goods, &c. within this Kingdom, to His Majesty's Use, and shall be deemed Alien, and out of His Majesty's Protection.

Upon Complaint made, upon Oath, before any Justice of Peace, that any Person is endeavouring to seduce any such Artificer, or that any such Artificer hath contracted or is preparing to go out of His Majesty's Dominions, for the Purposes aforesaid, such Justice may send his Warrant to bring the Person complained of before him, or before some other Justice; and if it shall appear by the Oath of One Witness, or by Confession, that he was guilty of any of the said Offences, such Justice may bind him to appear at the next Assizes or Quarter Sessions: And if such Person shall refuse to give Security, the Justice may commit him to Gaol till the next Assizes or Quarter Sessions, and until he shall be delivered by due Course of Law. And if any such Artificer shall be convicted, upon Indictment, of any such Promise, Contract, or Preparation to go

beyond the Seas, for the Purpose aforesaid, he shall give such Security to the King not to depart out of His Majesty's Dominions, as such Court shall think reasonable, and shall be imprisoned till Security given.

If any of the above Offences shall be committed in Scotland, the same shall be prosecuted in the Court of Justiciary or the Circuits there.

Statute 23 George II. Chap. 13.

IF any Person shall contract with, or endeavour to seduce any Artificer in Wool, Mohair, Cotton, or Silk, or in Iron, Steel, Brals, or other Metal, or any Clock-maker, Watch-maker, or any other Artificer in any other of the Manufactures of Great Britain or Ireland, to go out of this Kingdom or Ireland into any Foreign Country not within the Dominions of the Crown of Great Britain, and shall be convicted, upon Indictment or Information, in the King's Bench at Westminster, or by Indictment at the Assizes or General Gaol Delivery for the County, &c. wherein such Offence shall be committed in England, or by Indictment in the Court of Justiciary or any of the Circuit Courts in Scotland, or by Indictment or Information in the King's Bench at Dublin, if such Offence be committed in Ireland; the Person so convicted shall, for every Artificer contracted with or seduced, forfeit **FIVE HUNDRED POUNDS**, and shall suffer Imprisonment in the Common Gaol of the County or Stewartry wherein such Offender shall be convicted for Twelve Calendar Months, and until Forfeiture be paid: And in case of a subsequent Offence of the same Kind, the Persons so again offending shall forfeit, for every Person contracted with or seduced, **ONE THOUSAND POUNDS**, and shall suffer Imprisonment in the Common Gaol of the County or Stewartry wherein such Offender shall be convicted, for Two Years, and until such Forfeiture be paid.

If any Person in Great Britain or Ireland shall put on board any Ship or Boat, not bound directly to some Port in Great Britain or Ireland, or to some other of the Dominions of the Crown of Great Britain, any such Tools or Utensils as are commonly used in, or proper for the Preparing, Working up, or Finishing of the Woollen or Silk Manufactures, or any Part of such Tools, he shall, for every Offence, forfeit all such Tools, or Parts thereof, put on board, and **TWO HUNDRED POUNDS**, to be recovered by Action of Debt, &c. in any Court of Record at Westminster, or in the Court of Session in Scotland, or at any of the Four Courts in Dublin respectively, wherein no Essoin, &c. shall be allowed.

It shall be lawful for any Officer of the Customs in Great Britain, or for any Officer of the Revenue in Ireland, to seize and secure, in some of His Majesty's Warehouses, all such Tools or Utensils prohibited to be exported, as such Officer shall find on board any Vessel not bound directly to some Port in Great Britain or Ireland, or to some other of the Dominions of the Crown of Great Britain; and all Tools so seized shall, after Condemnation, be publicly sold to the best Bidder; and one Moiety of the Produce shall be to the Use of His Majesty, and the other Moiety to the Officer who shall seize and secure the same.

If the Captain of any Vessel in Great Britain or

Ireland knowingly permit any of the said Tools, prohibited to be exported, to be put on board his Vessel, he shall, for every such Offence, forfeit ONE HUNDRED POUNDS, to be recovered as the Penalties inflicted upon Persons exporting the Tools; and, if the Vessel belongs to His Majesty, the Captain shall not only forfeit ONE HUNDRED POUNDS, but shall also forfeit his Employment, and be incapable of any Employment under His Majesty.

If any Officer of the Customs in Great Britain or of the Revenue in Ireland, take, or knowingly suffer to be taken, any Entry outward, or sign any Cocket or Sufferance for the Shipping or Exporting of any of the said Tools, or knowingly suffer the same to be done, he shall forfeit ONE HUNDRED POUNDS, to be recovered as aforesaid, and also forfeit his Office, and be incapable of any Office under His Majesty.

One Moiety of the Forfeitures shall be applied to the Use of His Majesty, and the other Moiety to the Use of the Person who shall sue for the same.

Statutes 14, 21, 25, and 26 of His present Majesty.

BY these Statutes the like Penalties and Forfeitures as above-mentioned are extended to Persons packing or putting on board any Vessel, not bound directly for some Port in Great Britain or Ireland, any Machine, Engine, Tool, Press, Paper, Utensil, or Implement whatsoever, used in or proper for the working or finishing of the Cotton, Steel, or Iron Manufactures of this Kingdom, or any Part or Parts of such Machines or Implements, or any Models or Plans thereof; and all Captains of Ships and other Persons receiving or being in Possession of any such Articles, with an Intent to export the same to Foreign Parts, and all Custom-house Officers suffering an Entry to be made thereof, are respectively liable to the like Penalties as are above-mentioned, in the case of Tools and Utensils used in the Woollen and Silk Manufactures.

LONDON DOCKS.

BY THE LORDS COMMISSIONERS OF HIS MAJESTY'S TREASURY.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the Forty-third Year of His present Majesty's Reign, intituled; "An Act for permitting certain Goods imported into Great Britain, to be secured in Warehouses without Payment of Duty," It is enacted, That it should be lawful for the Importer or Importers, Proprietor or Proprietors, Consignee or Consignees of any of the Goods, Wares or Merchandize, enumerated or described in the Table thereunto annexed, marked (B.), and which shall be legally imported and brought into the Port of London, to lodge and secure the same under the joint Locks of the Crown and the London Dock Company, in any Warehouse or Warehouses, erected or to be erected, situate within the Premises belonging to the London Dock Company, without Payment at the Time of the first Entry of such Goods, Wares and Merchandizes of the Duties of Customs or Excise due on the Importation thereof, subject nevertheless to the Rules, Regulations, and Restrictions therein contained: Provided that no such Goods, Wares or Merchandize should be so lodged or se-

cured unless and until such Warehouses or other Works belonging or to belong thereto, should be so far completed, that in the Judgement of the Lord High Treasurer or the Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury for the Time being, or any Three or more of them, the same shall be fit and proper in every respect for the Reception of such Goods, Wares and Merchandize, and wherein the same might respectively be safely and securely deposited, and remain under the Regulations and Directions in the said Act contained; and the said Lord High Treasurer or Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury for the Time being, or any Three or more of them, were thereby authorized and empowered, in Writing under his or their Hand or Hands, to certify and make known his or their Approbation of such Warehouses, which Certificate should be published Three Times at least in the London Gazette, and in Two or more public Morning Newspapers usually circulated in London: And whereas the Table marked (B.), above referred to, is in the Words following, viz.

And whereas certain Vaults for Wine and Spirits, and Warehouses for other Articles of Merchandize, and other Parts of the said Works, have been approved by the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, and are now in Use: And whereas the Vaults hereinafter mentioned, Part of the said Works, have since been completed.

We, being Three of the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, do certify that in our Judgement the Vaults marked A. B. and C. on the South Side of the Dock, are so far completed as to be fit and ready in every respect for the Reception of Wine, Brandy, Geneva, and other Spirits.

WHEREAS it has been humbly represented to the King, that, on the Night of the 23d Instant, Private Hugh Fox, of the 74th Regiment, who was waiting at Liverpool for the Purpose of being forwarded to his Regiment, was maliciously shot at as he was returning to his Quarters by some Person or Persons unknown; by which Shot one of his Legs was so dreadfully shattered, that he was obliged to undergo immediate Amputation; and whereas there is Reason to suspect that the said Private Hugh Fox was shot at as above-mentioned, in consequence of his having given Information of a Deserter from the Royal Marines; His Majesty, for the better apprehending and bringing to Justice the Persons concerned in the above Felony,

is hereby pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any one of them (except the Person who actually shot the said Hugh Fox) who shall discover his, her, or their Accomplice or Accomplices therein, so that he, she, or they may be apprehended and convicted thereof.

2d. The first Four Rules of Arithmetic, and the Rule of Three in whole Numbers, and also in Vulgar and Decimal Fractions.

3d. The first Three Books of Euclid's Elements by R. Simson, with the Exception of Propositions 42, 44, 45, Book I. and of Propositions 8, 9, 10, 11, 14, Book II. In this Part of the Examinations, besides giving the most precise Demonstrations, the Candidates will be expected to make the Constructions in a practical Manner with Compasses and a Ruler.

4th. The French Language, a Knowledge of which, although not absolutely required in the Candidates who may present themselves at the first Examination which is to be held, will nevertheless give a Preference to those, who are in all other Respects equally qualified; at all subsequent Examinations, however, the Candidates will be required to read and translate French with Facility.

After Admission into the Superior Class, the Apprentices shall attend at the Royal Naval College Three or Four Hours on the Mornings of every Day in the Week, except Sunday and the established Holidays, where they shall be instructed in such Parts of the following Subjects as shall appear to the Professor of the College to be best adapted to the Object of the Establishment, viz. the Formation of able and useful Ship Builders:

Geometry	Fluxions
Algebra	Theory of Naval
Plane Trigonometry	Architecture
Mechanics	Drawing
Hydrostatics	The French Language.

On Mondays, Tuesdays, and Wednesdays, the Apprentices shall be employed at the College during the Hours above-mentioned, in the Study of Mathematics, under the Professor or the Instructor; on Thursday and Friday Mornings in Drawing, under

the Drawing Master, the Art of Perspective being most particularly applied in drawing the different Parts of a Ship; and the Morning of Saturday shall be appropriated to the Study of such Books and Exercises in the French Language; under the French Master, as may perfect them therein, and at the same Time advance their professional Knowledge. This Division of Time allotted for their Studies, is, however, to be subject to such Alterations as shall appear to the Professor best calculated for promoting the Object of the Institution.

In the remaining Part of the Day, when not attending at the College, they shall be employed under the Master Shipwright or Instructor of Naval Architecture, in the Mould Loft, in the various Kinds of manual Labour connected with Ship-building; in the Acquisition of a complete Knowledge of the different Parts of a Ship, and of the Method of constructing and fastening the same, as well as in discriminating her different Properties deducible from theoretical Calculations; also in the Management and Conversion of Timber, and generally, in such other Manner as the Master Shipwright may consider as best adapted to make them fully acquainted with all the Detail of the Duties of a practical Shipwright.

The last Year of their Apprenticeship, or such Part thereof as the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty may think proper, shall be served at Sea, in such of His Majesty's Ships as their Lordships shall direct, with a view of obtaining some practical Knowledge in the steering, sailing, trimming, and ballasting of a Ship, in making Remarks on the Motion and working of a Ship, in all her Parts, in bad Weather, and on a high Sea, the standing and straining of the Masts and Yards under such Circumstances, the placing of the fixed Blocks, with a view to the proper leading of Ropes, &c. and, generally, in obtaining such Information, as the Captain, Carpenter, and other Officers of the Ship may, by their Experience, communicate, and such as their own Observations may suggest.

Journal of his Remarks and Observations, arranged under distinct Heads, noting such Improvements in any Part of the Ship, or any Thing connected therewith, as may suggest themselves to him, from a minute Attention to the Circumstances by which a Ship is affected at Sea; a Copy of which Journal is to be transmitted to the Admiralty.

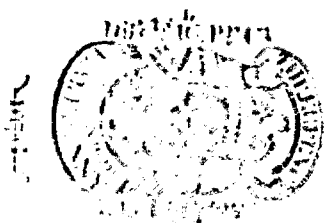
