That the Number of Students in the Superior Clais of Shipwrights' Apprentices shall, in the first Instance, be limited to Twelve, but will gradually be encreafed to Twenty-five. The French Language, a Knowledge of which, although not abfolutely required in the Candidates who may present themselves at the first Examination which is to be held, will nevertheless give a Preference to those, who are in all other Respects equally qualified; at all subsequent Examinations, however, the Candidates will be required to read and translate French with Facility.
