

West-India Dock Company, situated at the Isle of Dogs, were certified to be fit and proper in every respect for the Reception of such Goods, Wares, and Merchandizes as are enumerated and described in the said Table, annexed to the said Act of Parliament marked (A): And whereas, by the ninth Section of the said Act it is further enacted and provided as follows: That if the Lord High Treasurer, or the Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury for the Time being, or any Three or more of them, shall deem it expedient, that the Provisions of this Act shall be extended to any Goods, Wares, and Merchandize, not enumerated or described in either of the Tables to this Act annexed, and shall cause a List of such Goods, Wares and Merchandizes to be published in the London Gazette, then, and from thenceforth, all and every the Provisions, Regulations, and Restrictions of this Act shall extend, and be construed to extend to such Goods, Wares, and Merchandize, in every respect, in as full and ample a Manner, as if the same had been enumerated and inserted in the said Tables respectively, at the Time of passing this Act:

And whereas by a Certificate, under the Hands of Three of the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, bearing Date the 26th Day of March, 1805, the said Lords Commissioners, in pursuance and in execution of the Powers vested in them, in and by the said Act, did thereby declare, that it appeared to them to be expedient that the Provisions of the said Act should be extended to Wines, imported in Ships arriving from the West Indies, (excepted in Table (B), annexed to the said Act,) and that all Wines imported in Ships arriving from the West Indies, whether the same should have been shipped on board such Vessels in the West Indies or elsewhere, might respectively be safely and securely deposited in all or any of the Warehouses described in the above recited Certificate, and remain therein under the Regulations and Directions of the said Act:

And whereas by Three other Certificates under the Hands of Three of the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury for the Time being, bearing Date respectively the 5th Day of July 1805, the 3d Day of November 1806, and the 21st Day of October 1808, certain other Warehouses therein specified belonging to the said Company, situated at the Isle of Dogs aforesaid, were in like Manner certified to be fit and proper in every respect for the Reception of such Goods, Wares and Merchandize as are enumerated and described in the said Table annexed to the said Act of Parliament marked (A), and also for the Reception of Wines imported in Ships arriving from the West Indies, and authorized to be warehoused by the said recited Certificate of the 26th Day of March 1805, issued in pursuance of the 9th Section of the said Act:

And whereas an additional Warehouse hereinafter described, having since been erected by the said Company for the further Accommodation of the West-India Trade; We, the undersigned Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury do, in pursuance of the said Act of Parliament, further certify and make known, that the large Warehouse made and erected by the said West-India Dock Company, situate on the East End of the Import Dock of the said Company, at the Isle of Dogs aforesaid, is so far

completed, that in our Judgment the same is fit and proper in every respect for the Reception of such Goods, Wares, and Merchandizes as are enumerated and described in the said Table annexed to the said Act of Parliament marked (A); and also for the Reception of Wines imported in Ships or Vessels arriving from the West Indies, whether the same shall have been shipped on board such Ships or Vessels in the West Indies or elsewhere, in like Manner as if the same had been inserted and enumerated in the said Table (A), as expressed in the said Certificate of the 26th Day of March 1805, and in which said Warehouse such Goods, Wares, and Merchandize, including Wines as aforesaid, may respectively be safely and securely deposited and remain under the Regulations and Directions of the said Act; and we do hereby declare our Approbation of the said Warehouse accordingly.

THE Principal Officers and Commissioners of His Majesty's Navy hereby give Notice, that a Plan of Education has been established, at the Royal Naval College at His Majesty's Dock-Yard at Portsmouth, for a Superior Class of Apprentices to Shipwrights.

That the Number of Students in the Superior Class of Shipwrights' Apprentices shall, in the first Instance, be limited to Twelve, but will gradually be encreased to Twenty-five. The period of Apprenticeship shall be Seven Years, but for a Student who may have previously served in the Inferior Class of Apprentices in His Majesty's Yards for the Space of Two Years, it shall be only Six Years, and only Five Years for a Student who may have previously served in the said Class for the Space of Three Years.
