The Lord Chancellor has appointed Charles Adams, of Wednefbury, in the County of Stafford, Gent. to be a Maller Extraordinary in the High Court of Chancery.

TAT HEREAS by an Act passed in the Forty-third Year of His prefent Majesty's Reign, intituled, "An Act for permitting certain Goods, imported into Great Britain, to be fecured in Warehouses, without Payment of Duty," it is amongst other things enacted, That it shall and may be lawful for the Importer or Importers, Proprietor or Proprietors, Confignee or Confignees, of any of the Goods, Wares, or Merchandizcs enumerated or deferibed in the Table thereunto annexed, marked (E); and which shall have been legally imported or brought into the Port of London, to lodge and fecure in a Warehoufe or Warehoufes to be provided for that Purpole any fuch Goods, Wares, and Merchandize, under the joint Locks of the Crown and the Merchant, without Payment, at the Time of the first Entry, of the Duties of Customs due on the Importation thereof: Provided always, and it is thereby further enacted, that no Goods, Wares, or Merchandize to enumerated or defcribed in the faid Table marked (E), shall be permitted to be fo lodged or fecured, unlefs and until it shall have been made appear to the Satisfaction of the Lord High Treasurer, or the Commissioners of His Majelly's Treasury for the Time being, or any Three or more of them, that the faid Warehouse or Warehouses or them, that the land reaction are complete, fit, and proper, in every refpect, for the Reception of fuch Goods, Wares, or Merchandize, and wherein the fame may be fafely and fecurely deposited; and such Goods, Wares, and Merchandize to lodged and secured in such Warehouses, shall, in all other respects, be subject and liable to the Rules, Regulations, and Restrictions in that Act contained :

Provided always, and it is thereby enacted, that if the Lord High Treasurer, or the Commiffioners of His Majelty's Treasury for the Time being, or any Three or more of them, shall deem it expedient that the Provisions of the faid Act shall be extended to any Goods, Wares, and Merchandize not enumerated or deferibed in either of the Tables thereto anuexed, and shall cause a Lift of fuch Goods, Wares, and Merchandize to be published in the London Gazette, then and from thenceforth all and every the Provisions, Regulations, and Reftrictions of the faid Act shall extend and be construed to extend to fuch Goods, Wares, and Merchandize in every respect, in as full and ample a Manner as if the fame had been inferted and enumerated in the faid Tables respectively at the Time of passing this Aa.

We the underfigned Lords Commissioners of His Majefty's Treasury, purfuant to and in Execution of the Powers verted in us, in and by the faid Act, do hereby declare that it appears to us to be expedient that the Provisions of the faid Act should be extended 'to Gum Copal, legally imported or brought into the Port of London, (not being imported by the United Company of Merchants of England, trading to the East Indies, or not being imported from the West Indies), and that such Gum Copal should be added to the Lift of Goods, Wares, and Merchandize

enumerated and defcribed in the faid Table annexed to the faid recited Act, marked (E), and that luck Gum Copal fhould be lodged and fecured under the joint Locks of the Crown and the Merchant in fuch Warehouse or Warehouses as aforefaid, under the Regulations and Directions of the faid ACH: And we do further declare, that from and after the Publication of this our Certificate in the London Gazette, conformable to the Directions of the faid AC, all and every the Provisions, Regulations, and Reffrictions of the faid Act, shall extend, and be construed to extend to all fuch Gum Copal in every respect, in as full and ample Manner as if the fame had been inferted and enumerated in Table (E) annexed to the faid Act, at the Time of the paffing the fame A&.

WHEREAS by an Act of Parliament, made and passed in the Fortieth Year of the Reign of His pretent Majefty, initialed, "An A& for making Wet Docks, Balons, Cuts, and other Works, for the greater Accommodation and Security of Shipping, Commerce, and Revenue, within the Port of London," it was enacted, that it ficuld and might be lawful for the Directors of the Lon-don Bock Company, or any Thirteen or more of them, from Time to Time, either abfolutely to fell and dispose of, or to let out and demise on Lesse, or at Rack Rent, or in any other Manner that should be thought advilcable, all or any of the Freehold or. Leafehold Eflates, Lands, Houfes, Wharfs, Docks, Works, Hereditaments, and Premifes, thereby vefted in the faid Directors, and which should thereafter be conveyed to them in purfuance of that Act, in luch Manner and upon fuch Terms, and for fuch Confiderations, as the faid Directors as aforefaid should from Time to Time judge proper, and think molt advantageous to the Interest of the faid Company, provided that the faid Freehold and Leafehold Eftates, Lands, Houses, Wharfs, Docks, Works, Hereditaments, and Premifes, were first offered for fuch Sale, letting or demifing, to the refpective Per-fon or Perfons, upon the Terms and Conditiona aforefaid, of or from whom the Premifes refpectively were purchased, by or on Behalf of the faid Company : And whereas by an Act made and palled in the Forty-ninth Year of the Reign of His prefent Majesty, intituled, "An Act to alter and amend feveral Acts passed in the Fortieth, Forty-fourth, Forty-fifth, Forty-fixth, and Forty-feventh Years of His prefent Majelty, for making Wet Docks, Basons, Cuts, and other Works, for the greater Accommodation and Security of Shipping, Commerce, and Revenue within the Port of London, and for other the Purpofes therein mentioned relating thereto, and to enlarge the Powers and Authorities by the faid Acts granted to the London Dock Company;" after reciting (inter alia) to the Effect above rccited, and alfo reciting that by reafon of the great Alteration, occafioned by the taking of Streets and taking down Houfes and other Buildings within the Limits of the faid first recited Act, and the Length of Time which had elapfed fince the paffing of the
