

Whitehall, December 15, 1810.

The Lord Chancellor has appointed Charles Adams, of Wednesbury, in the County of Stafford, Gent. to be a Master Extraordinary in the High Court of Chancery.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the Forty-third Year of His present Majesty's Reign, intituled, "An Act for permitting certain Goods, imported into Great Britain, to be secured in Warehouses, without Payment of Duty," it is amongst other things enacted, That it shall and may be lawful for the Importer or Importers, Proprietor or Proprietors, Consignee or Consignees, of any of the Goods, Wares, or Merchandizes enumerated or described in the Table thereunto annexed, marked (E); and which shall have been legally imported or brought into the Port of London, to lodge and secure in a Warehouse or Warehouses to be provided for that Purpose any such Goods, Wares, and Merchandize, under the joint Locks of the Crown and the Merchant, without Payment, at the Time of the first Entry, of the Duties of Customs due on the Importation thereof: Provided always, and it is thereby further enacted, that no Goods, Wares, or Merchandize so enumerated or described in the said Table marked (E), shall be permitted to be so lodged or secured, unless and until it shall have been made appear to the Satisfaction of the Lord High Treasurer, or the Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury for the Time being, or any Three or more of them, that the said Warehouse or Warehouses are complete, fit, and proper, in every respect, for the Reception of such Goods, Wares, or Merchandize, and wherein the same may be safely and securely deposited; and such Goods, Wares, and Merchandize so lodged and secured in such Warehouses, shall, in all other respects, be subject and liable to the Rules, Regulations, and Restrictions in that Act contained:

Provided always, and it is thereby enacted, that if the Lord High Treasurer, or the Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury for the Time being, or any Three or more of them, shall deem it expedient that the Provisions of the said Act shall be extended to any Goods, Wares, and Merchandize not enumerated or described in either of the Tables thereto annexed, and shall cause a List of such Goods, Wares, and Merchandize to be published in the London Gazette, then and from thenceforth all and every the Provisions, Regulations, and Restrictions of the said Act shall extend and be construed to extend to such Goods, Wares, and Merchandize in every respect, in as full and ample a Manner as if the same had been inserted and enumerated in the said Tables respectively at the Time of passing this Act.

We the undersigned Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, pursuant to and in Execution of the Powers vested in us, in and by the said Act, do hereby declare that it appears to us to be expedient that the Provisions of the said Act should be extended to Gum Copal, legally imported or brought into the Port of London, (not being imported by the United Company of Merchants of England, trading to the East Indies, or not being imported from the West Indies), and that such Gum Copal should be added to the List of Goods, Wares, and Merchandize

enumerated and described in the said Table annexed to the said recited Act, marked (E), and that such Gum Copal should be lodged and secured under the joint Locks of the Crown and the Merchant in such Warehouse or Warehouses as aforesaid, under the Regulations and Directions of the said Act: And we do further declare, that from and after the Publication of this our Certificate in the London Gazette, conformable to the Directions of the said Act, all and every the Provisions, Regulations, and Restrictions of the said Act, shall extend, and be construed to extend to all such Gum Copal in every respect, in as full and ample Manner as if the same had been inserted and enumerated in Table (E) annexed to the said Act, at the Time of the passing the same Act.

WHEREAS by an Act of Parliament, made and passed in the Fortieth Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, intituled, "An Act for making Wet Docks, Basons, Cuts, and other Works, for the greater Accommodation and Security of Shipping, Commerce, and Revenue, within the Port of London," it was enacted, that it should and might be lawful for the Directors of the London Dock Company, or any Thirteen or more of them; from Time to Time, either absolutely to sell and dispose of, or to let out and demise on Lease, or at Rack Rent, or in any other Manner that should be thought advisable, all or any of the Freehold or Leasehold Estates, Lands, Houses, Wharfs, Docks, Works, Hereditaments, and Premises, thereby vested in the said Directors, and which should thereafter be conveyed to them in pursuance of that Act, in such Manner and upon such Terms, and for such Considerations, as the said Directors as aforesaid should from Time to Time judge proper, and think most advantageous to the Interest of the said Company, provided that the said Freehold and Leasehold Estates, Lands, Houses, Wharfs, Docks, Works, Hereditaments, and Premises, were first offered for such Sale, letting or demising, to the respective Person or Persons, upon the Terms and Conditions aforesaid, of or from whom the Premises respectively were purchased, by or on Behalf of the said Company: And whereas by an Act made and passed in the Forty-ninth Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, intituled, "An Act to alter and amend several Acts passed in the Fortieth, Forty-fourth, Forty-fifth, Forty-sixth, and Forty-seventh Years of His present Majesty, for making Wet Docks, Basons, Cuts, and other Works, for the greater Accommodation and Security of Shipping, Commerce, and Revenue within the Port of London, and for other the Purposes therein mentioned relating thereto, and to enlarge the Powers and Authorities by the said Acts granted to the London Dock Company;" after reciting (inter alia) to the Effect above recited, and also reciting that by reason of the great Alteration, occasioned by the taking of Streets and taking down Houses and other Buildings within the Limits of the said first recited Act, and the Length of Time which had elapsed since the passing of the
