Copy of a Letter from Lieutenant Richard Barton, acting in the temporary Command of His Majesty's Ship the Blanche, addressed to Captain Flint of the Wilhelmina, and transmitted by Vice-Admiral Drury to John Wilson Croker, Esq.

His Majesty's Ship Blanche, Port Cornwallis, SIR, Prince of Wales's Island, Aug. 2, 1810.

I BEG Leave to acquaint you, for the Information of his Excellency the Commander in Chief, that on the 26th Ult. in Latitude 5° 20' North, Longitude 98° 22' East, I had the Satisfaction of falling in with, and after a chase of Eight Hours, captured La Confiance French Privateer, of Two long Six-Pounders and a Quantity of small Arms, having on board a Complement of Thirty Men. The Confiance sailed from the Isle of France in May last, and had made Two or Three Captures.

And also to order, that the said Royal Concession and Declaration be registered in His Majesty's College of Arms.

His Royal Highness the Prince Regent has been graciously pleased, in the Name and on the Behalf of His Majesty, to give and grant unto Robert Eden, of Windlestone, in the County Palatine of Durham, Esq; His Majesty's Royal Licence and Authority, that he and his Issue may, from grateful and affectionate Regard to the Memory, and in compliance with the Desire of his late maternal Grandmother, Dorothea, the Wife of Peter Johnson, late of the City of York, Esq; Barrister at Law, and Recorder of the said City, deceased, take and use the Surname of Johnson, in addition to and before that of Eden, and bear the Arms of Johnson quarterly with those of Eden, Eden in the first Quarter; such Arms being first duly exemplified

according to the Laws of Arms, and recorded in the Herald's Office, otherwise His Majesty's said Licence and Permission to be void and of none Effect:

And also to order, that the said Royal Concession and Declaration be registered in His Majesty's College of Arms.

WIDOWS' PENSIONS.

IT being intended to distribute to the poor Widows of Commissioned and Warrant Officers of the Royal Navy, whose Circumstances come within the Rules of the Charity established for their Relief, such Monies as may be due to them on account of their Pensions up to the 28th February instant; this is to give Notice, that any Widows who have not yet applied for the Pension, and intend to lay in their Claims, may do so as soon as possible, by Letter, addressed to the Secretary of the Admiralty: And that all such Widows whose Claims have been already allowed, must send or bring to this Office, between the 17th and 28th Instant, the Affidavits required by the Regulations of the Charity, in order to their being continued upon the Pension List, which will be immediately prepared, and paid in the Middle of April.
