If our Grief on the unhappy Occasion which has thus called upon Your Royal Highness be not more poignant, it arises from the consolatory Resection, that, in the sudden Calamity which has befallen us, the Eyes and Hearts of the Nation have been fixed on Your Royal Highnels, as the Means of continuing to our favoured Country that mild and benignant Rule, which it has experienced from the Princes of the illustrious House of Brunswick.

We are fully sensible of the Difficulties of the Period in which Your Royal Highness is called to the Exercise of the executive Power of the State, and of the Inconveniences attached to the representative Office which Your Royal Highness has been pleased most graciously to accept; but in proportion to the Embarrassments in the Execution of the Trult, it will be the cheerful Duty of all good Subjects, as it is the fincere Determination of us your faithful Servants, that, by a correspondent Promptitude and Zeal to forward the Views of Your Royal Highness, we may lessen, by the Firmness of our Attachment, Loyalty, and Duty, any Difficulties in the Execution of the Office entrulted to Your Royal Highness, for the Maintenance of the Royal Authority, and for the Attainment of the public Good.
