IN laying before Your Royal Highness the most solemn Assurances of our firm Attachment to the Person and Family of Your Royal Father, we must beg Leave to testify our steady Adherence to those Principles which, so intimately connecting the Interests of the Crown with the Safety of the People, form the grand Basis of a Constitution reciprocally the Birthright of Your Royal Highness and ourselves, while it provides for the Liberty of the Subject it stands the best possible Security for the Sovereign.

When we reflect on the amiable Qualities of Your Royal Father, so eminently displayed in the Mildness of his Government, we cannot help feeling most severely that awful Calamity with which it has pleased the Almighty to visit us; yet at the Time when we suppress that Joy we should otherwise most sincerely feel at Your Royal Highness being placed at the Head of the Government, we cannot refrain from laying before you the fullest Expressions of our Duty; we owe it in Loyalty to Your Father, to Your Family, and to Yourself.

The noble Mind of a Prince never shone more conspicuously great, than when, sacrificing your own personal Feelings to the national Good, you so readily consented to accept a restricted Regency; while it throws the brightest Splendour round the Throne you were born to inherit, it becomes the surest Pledge of your Exertions to extricate the Nation from the Dangers of the present Moment, Exertions the more confidently looked up to from Your Royal Highness's well known Patriotism and Abilities.

With your firm Attachment to those Principles which placed the House of Brunswick on the Throne, you cannot fail, in an Undertaking so arduous, to receive the steadfast Support of every real Friend of the Constitution, or to find a Resource in the Energy of Public Opinion.

Surrounded by a faithful and loyal People, other Nations beholding the Contrast will look up to you with Veneration; nor can they long fail to greet you

as the Bulwark of Europe against Despotism and Oppression.

May the military and political Operations of this Country be productive of the happiest Results, and may Your Royal Highness, under the Hands of Divine Providence, be the Instrument of procuring for this Country a secure and honourable Peace.
