

Whitehall, April 6, 1811.

His Royal Highness the Prince Regent has been graciously pleased, in the Name and on the Behalf of His Majesty, to give and grant unto Sir Isaac Coffin, Baronet, Vice Admiral of the White Squadron of the Fleet. His Majesty's Royal Licence and Authority, that from and after the Solemnization of his Marriage with Elizabeth Brown Greenly, only Child and Heir Expectant of William Greenly, of Titley Court, in the County of Hereford, Esq; by Elizabeth his Wife, Daughter and sole Heir of John Brown, late of Leinthall Earls, in the said County, Esq; deceased, he the said Sir Isaac Coffin, and the Issue of such Marriage, may assume and use the Surname and bear the Arms of Greenly, in addition to the Surname and Arms of Coffin; such Arms being first duly exemplified according to the Laws of Arms, and recorded in the Herald's Office:

And also to order, that the said Royal Concession and Declaration be registered in His Majesty's College of Arms.

#### TREASURY CHAMBERS, WHITEHALL.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the Forty-third Year of His present Majesty's Reign, intituled, "An Act for permitting certain Goods, imported into Great Britain, to be secured in Warehouses, without Payment of Duty," it is amongst other things enacted, That it shall and may be lawful for the Importer or Importers, Proprietor or Proprietors, Consignee or Consignees, of any of the Goods, Wares, or Merchandize enumerated or described in the Table therunto annexed, marked (A); and which shall have been legally imported or brought into the Port of London, to lodge and secure the same under the joint Locks of the Crown and the Merchant, in any Warehouse or Warehouses, situated at the Isle of Dogs, and belonging to the West India Dock Company, without Payment, at the Time of the first Entry, of the Duties of Customs or Excise, due on the Importation thereof, subject nevertheless to the Rules, Regulations, and Restrictions directed by the said Act.

Provided always, and it is thereby enacted, that if the Lord High Treasurer, or the Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury for the Time being, or any Three or more of them, shall deem it expedient that the Provisions of the said Act shall be extended to any Goods, Wares, and Merchandize not enumerated or described in either of the Tables thereto annexed, and shall cause a List of such Goods, Wares, and Merchandize to be published in the London Gazette, then and from thenceforth all and every the Provisions, Regulations, and Restrictions of the said Act shall extend and be construed to extend to such Goods, Wares, and Merchandize in every respect, in as full and ample a Manner as if the same had been inserted and enumerated in the said Tables respectively at the Time of passing this Act.

We the undersigned Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, pursuant to and in Execution of the Powers vested in us, in and by the said Act, do hereby declare that it appears to us to be expedient that the Provisions of the said Act should be extended to Cassia Fistula, legally imported or brought into the Port of London, (not being imported by the United

Company of Merchants of England, trading to the East Indies,) and that such Cassia Fistula should be added to the List of Goods, Wares, and Merchandize enumerated and described in the said Table annexed to the said recited Act, marked (A), and that such Cassia Fistula should be lodged and secured under the joint Locks of the Crown and the Merchant in such Warehouse or Warehouses as aforesaid, under the Regulations and Directions of the said Act: And we do further declare, that from and after the Publication of this our Certificate in the London Gazette, conformable to the Directions of the said Act, all and every the Provisions, Regulations, and Restrictions of the said Act, shall extend, and be construed to extend to all such Cassia Fistula in every respect, in as full and ample Manner as if the same had been inserted and enumerated in Table (A) annexed to the said Act, at the Time of the passing the same Act.

WHEREAS it hath been humbly represented to His Royal Highness the Prince Regent, that in the Night of Monday the 25th Ultimo, about Twelve o'Clock, the Dwelling-House of William Church Norcop, Esq; at Beiton, in the Parish of Drayton in Hales, in the County of Salop, was entered by Three Men, dressed in short Smock Frocks, who came into Mr. Norcop's Bed-Room with a lighted Candle, two of them came to his Bed-side, and one of them, holding a large Pistol over him, demanded the immediate Delivery of his Money and Keys, but not permitting him to rise; one of them took his Breeches, which lay on a Chair near the Bed, and rifled the Pockets, taking thereout Two Guineas and some Silver, and also a small Key, with which they attempted to open a Desk in the Room, but not succeeding in unlocking it, two of them wrenched it open, while the third stood over Mr. Norcop, keeping him in Awe in the Bed. They took from the said Desk one Bank of England Bill, Value 50l.; one Bank Post Bill, Value 32l. 18s.; and one other Bank Post Bill, Value 20l. which said two last-mentioned Bills were dated the 15th Day of January last, and made payable to William C. Norcop, Value received of Messrs. Hutton and Co.; they also took several small Bank Notes, amounting to about 10l., and about 30l. in Cash;

His Royal Highness, for the better apprehending and bringing to Justice the Persons concerned in such daring Outrage, is hereby pleased, in the Name and on the Behalf of His Majesty, to promise His most gracious Pardon to any one of them (except the Person who actually held the Pistol over Mr. Norcop) who shall discover his or their Accomplice or Accomplices therein, so that he or they may be apprehended and convicted thereof.
