IN pursuance of an Order of the Honourable the House of Commons, made on the 8th Day of April instant, Notice is hereby given, that Application has been made to and is now depending in the Honourable the House of Commons, that in the Bill now depending in the said House of Commons for making and maintaining a Navigable Canal from the River Medway, near Brandbridges, in the Parish of East Peckham, in the County of Kent, to extend to and unite with the River Rother, in the Parish of Iden, in the County of Suffex, and also certain navigable Branches and Railways from the said intended Canal, Provision may be inserted for making a Deviation in the Line of the said intended Canal, commencing near a Place called Reading-Street, in the Parish of Ebony, in the said County of Kent, and passing through Parts of the Parishes of Ebony and Appledore, in the same County, to communicate with and terminate in the Royal Military Canal at the Angle, about Three Furlongs below Appledore Bridge, in the said Parish of Appledore, instead of the Line originally proposed from the Commencement of the said Deviation, near Reading-Street aforesaid, to the Southern Termination of such original Line in the River Rother, in the Parish of Iden aforesaid.
