ralty the accompanying detailed Account of the gallant and judicious Proceedings of Captain Edward Tucker, of His Majetty Ship the Dover, whole great Exertions for the perfect Security of the Moluccas, (by poffeffing himfelf of Ternate, one of the itrongeft Islands in the Molucca Seas, which he accomplished in the most gallant Manner,) and every Dependency on the Celebes, the Refources of which he has turned to the Supply of the Moluccas, claim my highest Commendation.

His Majefty's Ship Dover, at Sea, off

SIR, Gorontello, June 16, 1810. IN profecution of Your Excellency's Orders to diftrefs the Enemy as much as poffible in the Molucca Sca, I beg Leave to inform you that, after having fent all the Dutch Officers and Troops from Amboyna to Java, I proceeded to the Dutch Port of Gorontello, in the Bay of Tommine, on the North-Eail Part of the Island of Celebes, where I found the Colours of the King of Holland flying on the Fort, and on the Three Batteries at the Entrance of the Harbour.

Finding, however, that no Dutch Officer had Charge of these Posts, but that the whole Settlement was vetled in the Hands of the Sultan and his Two Sons (who bore Dutch Commissions) for the Dutch Company, I therefore, initead of making a Defcent. landed and waited upon His Majelly, to whom 'I addreffed the Letter, a Copy of which I have the Honour to inclose.

The Propofals contained in this Letter having been duly confidered by His Majefty and the Nobles in Council, were acceded to with much Satisfaction. The Dutch Colours were hauled down, and the British supplied their Place in Fort Nassau, under every Demonstrance of their Attachment to the English Government.

Having thus opened a large Proportion of this Part of the Celebes to the English Trade, from whence alfo various Kinds of Supplies can be con-flantly thrown into our Poffeffions in the Moluccas, it is my Intention to proceed to Manado, where there is a very good Fort with a heavy Battery in front close to the Sea, and the Fort again commanded by a Battery on a Hill immediately over it, and from whence Mufketry can play into the Fort; but as the Ship can be brought to bear on the latter and lower Battery, and Sixty picked Men under Lieutenants Incledon and Higginfon are ready to ftorm the Battery on the Hill, I have no Doubt but the Attack will be fuccelsful.

His Majefly's Ship Dover, Manado Roads, June 2;, 1810.

SIR. CONFORMABLY to my Intentions as expressed in a former Letter to Your Excellency, dated the 16th inftant, off Gorontello, I proceeded to Manado, where I arrived Yesterday at Two P. M., and having taken up a Station in His Majesty's Ship under my Command, to the Right of Fort Amfterdam, and well reconnoitered their other Pofitions, 1 instantly fent a Flag of Truce on shore, with a Summons to the Governor, a Copy of which I herewith inclose.

The Enemy having thought proper to accede to the Terms proposed, the Marines were landed under the Command of Lieutenant Higginson, affilted by Lieutenant Fireworker Nelfon, of the Honourable Company's Coalt Artillery, and Thirty of the Am-boynese Troops, embarked in the Dover, for the Purpose of garrifoning it, after its Capture, who immediately took Pollefion for His Majetty.

Had the Enemy chofen the other Alternative, I am well convinced from the Experience I have repeatedly had, that the Officers and Men I have the Honour to command would have added to the Credit which they have already fo well earned, particularly in the Attack on Amboyna. The Dependencies which have fullen with Manado

are very extentive, being the Ports of Kemar. Le Co-pang, Amerang, and Tawangwoo; the Capture thereof, as well as Gorontello, has been very opportune, as large Supplies were preparing at all these Places, and ready to be shipped for the Ises of Ternate and Banda.

I have the Honour to transmit Returns of the Garrison found here, and of the Ordnance in Fort Amsterdam, and the adjacent Batteries.

To Marinus Balfour Efq; Prefet at Manado. SIR.

IT has, no doubt, ere this, been made known to you, that the English are in confiderable Force in thefe Seas, and that the Island of Amboyna, with all its Dependencies, are already in their Poffeffion.

You now see, before your Fort and Batteries, an English Frigate, ready to open her Fire, and Volunteers in her Boats, only waiting the Order to land, and ftorm your Position. It remains for you to decide on this Point.

Being perfectly acquainted with the exact Strength of your Garrifon, and all your Means of Defence, I am enabled to judge with what Probability of Sucefs you can oppole me.

I therefore lummon you to furrender the Fort of Amfterdam, with all the Dependencies thereunto belonging.

On condition of your inftantly complying and delivering up all Public Property, I promife Protection to the Perfons and Private Property of the Inhabitants; that the Dutch Civil Servants shall be at Liberty to return to Java. The Military, being Pri-foners of War, may likewife return there, on their Parole of Honour.

The Officer in charge of this has Instructions to wait Half an Hour for your Determination, which, should it be in the Affirmative, be pleafed to notify by firiking the Colours of the Fort, if in the Nega-tive, by hauking down the Elag of Truce. I am, Siry &c. &c. &c. (Signed) EDWARD TUCKER.
