Protected during his long and equitable Reign in the Enjoyment of civil and religious Liberty, and distinguished by many Marks of his Royal Favour, we feel impelled, by the united Sense of Duty and of Gratitude, to offer our earnest Prayers to the Supreme Disposer of all Events for his speedy and complete Recovery.

We entreat Your Royal Highness to accept the Assurance of our dutiful Attachment to Your Royal Highness's Person, and of our humble Acknowledgements for those liberal, dignified, and constitutional Sentiments which Your Royal Highness has taken Occasion to express, and which cannot fail to inspire all Classes of His Majesty's loyal Subjects with an entire Reliance on the Wisdom of Your Royal Highness's Councils, in the Administration of the Government of this United Kingdom, during the Indisposition of Your Royal Father.

The humble Address of the Mayor, Sheriffs, and Commonalty, of the City of Cork, in their Court of Doyer Hundred assembled.

**W**E, the Mayor, Sheriffs, and Commonalty of the City of Cork, beg Leave to return our sincerest Thanks to Your Royal Highness for the Re-appointment of the Duke of York to the Situation of Commander in Chief of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland.

In the Distribution of the Honours, the Graces, and the Distinctions of the State, no Instance has ever occurred more grateful to the loyal Subjects of these Realms, than the placing His Royal Highness again at the Head of the British Army ; it was due to the Remembrance of his Merits in the high Situation which he formerly filled, and to the recent Persecution which he has endured in his individual Capacity.

The Services of the Duke of York, whilst in Power, rest no longer in Conjecture ; they are evidenced by the brilliant Successes of the British Arms, and written in the unfading Characters of Victory. If Wellington and Beresford have triumphed on the Plains of Portugal and Spain, it was the Wisdom of his Regulations that laid the Foundation of their Glories ; it was he that formed the gallant Armies which they led to Conquest.

Personal Enmity and Faction have for a long Time been too successful in obscuring the Merits of His Royal Highness ; but the Spirit of British Justice has finally prevailed.

Accept, most gracious Prince, our humble and grateful Thanks for the Appointment which it has pleased you to make ; we hail it, as an Omen of your future Government ; and recognize, in this Act of Wisdom and Equity, the Characteristics of the Reign of our beloved and suffering Sovereign.
