And also to command, that the faid Royal Conceffion and Declaration be registered in His Majefty's College of Arms, otherwife to be void and of none Effect.

Protected during his long and equitable Reign in the Enjoyment of civil and religious Liberty, and diftinguished by many Marks of his Royal Favour, we feel impelled, by the united Sense of Duty and of Gratitude, to offer our earnest Prayers to the Supreme Disposer of all Events for his speedy and complete Recovery.

We entreat Your Royal Highness to accept the Affurance of our dutiful Attachment to Your Royal Highnefs's Perfon, and of our humble Acknow-ledgements for those liberal, dignified, and conftitutional Sentiments which Your Royal Highnefs has taken Occafion to express, and which cannot fail to infpire all Claffes of His Majefty's loyal Sub-jects with an entire Reliance on the Wifdom of Your Royal Highness's Councils, in the Adminis-tration of the Government of this United Kingdom, during the Indifposition of Your Royal Father.
