While we deplore the great national Calamity with which the Hand of Providence has visited these Kingdoms, we are at a loss for Terms to express our Admiration of the Line of Conduct adopted by Your Royal Highness fince its Commencement, a Conduct which unites all the filial Delicacy due to the best of Sovereigns and of Fathers with the inviolable Adherence to the Principles of our glorious Constitution, so essential to the Prosperity of this

mighty Empire.
We beg to offer our fincere Acknowledgements to Your Royal Highness for the Re-appointment of His Royal Highness the Duke of York to the important Office of Commander in Chief of His Majesty's Army; an Event called for with the same Unanimity by the ardent Wishes of the People, as by the Prayers of those gallant Soldiers who, under his Auspices, have entitled themselves to the Gratitude of their Country, and excited the Ad-
