Admiralty-Office, September 10, 1811. Copy of a Letter from Captain Ferris, of His Ma-jefty's Ship Diana, addreffed to Rear-Admiral Sir Thomas Williams, and transmitted by Admiral Sir Charles Cotton to John Wilfon Croker Efq.

SIR HAVE the Honour to inform you, that while I standing towards the Cordovan Light-House, in Company with His Majefty's Ship Semiramis, in the Afternoon of the 24th Inftant, I differend Four Sail infide of the Shoals at the Mouth of the River Gironde, under Efcort of a National Brig of Wardin I meditated either their Capture or Deftruction, which could only be accomplished by Artifice and Promptitude, without the Sacrifice of many Lives. Stratagem was used, which had the defired Effect, as they fent a Veffel with Pilots to our Affiltance, and I anchored after Dark the Two Ships midway between the Cordovan and Royan, under whole Guns the Brig had taken Refuge, and close to the Brig stationed for the Protection of the feveral Convoys passing either way. I dispatched Three Boats under the Orders of Lieutenant Sparrow (Second), Lieutenant Roper (Third), and Mr. Holmes Mafter's Mate, from this Ship, feconded by Four Boats under the Orders of Lieu-tenants Gardner, Grace, and Nicholson, and Mr. Reneau Mafter's Mate, from the Semiramis, to capture or deltroy the Convoy then anchored up the River, about Four Miles diltant, but the Tide prevented their accomplifting it until late in the Night, and at Day-light, finding the captured Vef-fels with the Boats far up the River beyond the Two Brigs, I determined to attack them with the Ship, but not without using the same Artifice as the preceding Night to prevent Suspicion; and fo convinced were they of our being Friends that the Captain of the Port, Monfieur Michel Auguste Dubourg, Capitaine de Frégate, and commanding the in-shore Brig, came on board to offer his Services, and was not undeceived until he had afcended the Quarter-Deck. The Diana laid the outer The Diana laid the outer Brig on board, and Lieutenant Robert W. Parlons (First Lagutenant), Lieutenant Madden, First of the Royal Marines, and Mr. Mark G. Noble Boatfurain, headed about Thirty Seamen and Marines, (as many as could be fpared by the Abfence of the Boats), and fucceeded in gaining Polleflion of His Majefty's late Gun-Brig Teazer, mounting Twelve Eighteen Pound Carronades, and Two Long Eighteen-Pounder Guns, commanded by Monfieur Alex. Papineau, Lieutenant de Vaiffeau, with a Complement of Eighty-five Men, and without Lofs on either Side. It adds to the Luftre these Officers and Men atchieved, the Hu-manity, they dilplayed to the overpowered Captives in putting them below without the Force of Arms and an unneceffary Effusion of Blood. It was at this Time that Alarm was given and the Batteries opened thein Fire upon the Ships, when Captain Richardson in the Semiramis, in a Manner which characterifes the Officer and Seaman, purfued, drove on flore, and burnt, under the Guns of the Batteries, the French National Brig Le Pluvier, mounting Sixteen Guns and One Hundred and Thirty-fix Men, whole Captain, I have before spoken of, was decoyed on board.

Having obtained to the utmost the Object in View, 1 anchored in the Gironde, out of Gun-Shot, to repair the Damages fustained by the different

Veffels, when I was rejoined by the Boats and the captured Convoy, a Lift of which I have the Ho-nour to enclose. The Services I received from Captain Richardson, the Officers and Ship's Company of the Semiramis, merit my warmest Acknowledgements, and I should be committing a great Injustice to the Officers and Ship's Company I command, were I not to fpeak in Terms of the higheft Ad-miration for their Steadiness and Zeal throughout the whole Affair. And could I add fironger Encomiums to one than another, it would be from the great Affiftance I received from Lieutenant R. W. Parlons and Mr. David Bevans the Matter, whole unremitted Attention in piloting the Ship in the most intricate Navigation greatly tended to infure the Object of Pursuit. I also enclose you a Letter I.received from Captain Charles Richardson, narrating his Atttack upon the Brig, and enclosing a Lift of wounded in the Affray; and I regret to add that I loft One Man overboard, after the Brig was in our full Possession.

His Majefly's Ship Semiramis, Royan Roads, August 25, 1811.

SIR. I HAVE the Honour to report to you, that as foon as the Diana ran on board the Enemy's outfide Brig, her Confort, at anchor in-fhore of her, im-mediately cut her Cable and made fail for the Beach near the Battery of Royan, where the I followed in to Five Fathoms, anchorgrounded. ing with a Spring; the Broadfide was brought to bear on the Enemy's Brig, and Bow Guns on the Battery, within Grape-Shot of both.

After engaging fome Time, I found the Guns of the Enemy's Veffel almost filenced, and perceived the Boats haul up to quit her.

At this Time the Barge, Pinnace, and Cutter rejoined me : I ordered Lieutenant Gardner with thefe Boats immediately to board the Enemy, which was gallantly effected after receiving his Broadfide. She proved to be the French National Brig Pluvier, of Sixteen Guns and One Hundred and Thirty-fix Men, commanded, pro tempore, by Lieutenant Page de St. Waalt.

The Prize being falt on shore, the Ebb Tide running molt rapidly, and my own Ship in only Twenty Feet Water, I found it necessary to take the Remainder of her People out and burg her, which, when completely effected, I made all fail to-

join you. I have but to add in this little Affair, my Officers and Ship's Company behaved entirely to my Satisfaction; and I feel much indebted to my First Lieu-tenant Gardner, Second Lieutenant Grace, and Mr. Reneau Master's Mate, commanding the Boats, for the handfome Manner in which they ran alongfide the Enemy.

Lieutenant Taylor of the Marines, and Mr. Brickwood Purfer, being the only Officers on board, were of the greateft Ule, the former commanding the Main-Deck, the latter the Quarter-Deck Guns.
