A PROCLAMATION.

GEORGE P. R.

WHEREAS it has been represented that a considerable Number of disorderly Persons, chiefly composed of Stockingers, or Persons employed in the Stocking Manufactories, have, for some Time past, assembled themselves together in a riotous and tumultuous Manner in the Town and County of the Town of Nottingham, and likewise in several Parts of the Counties of Nottingham, Derby, and Leicester; and for the Purpose of compelling their Employers to comply with certain Regulations prescribed by themselves with respect to Work, and the Wages to be paid for the same, have had Recourse to Measures of Force and Violence, and have actually committed various Acts of Outrage in different Parts of the Counties above-mentioned, whereby the Property of many of His Majesty's good Subjects has in several Instances been wholly destroyed, and their Lives and Properties are still greatly endangered; We therefore, acting in the Name and on the Behalf of His Majesty, being duly sensible of the mischievous Consequences which must inevitably ensue, as well to the Peace of the Kingdom as to the Lives and Properties of His Majesty's Subjects, from such wicked and illegal Practices, if they go unpunished, and being firmly resolved to cause the Laws to be put in Execution for the Punishment of such Offenders, have thought fit, by the Advice of His Majesty's Privy Council, to issue this Proclamation, hereby strictly commanding all Justices of the Peace, Sheriffs, Under Sheriffs, and all other Civil Officers whatsoever, within the said Town and County of the Town of Nottingham, and the said Counties of Nottingham, Derby, and Leicester, respectively, that they do use their utmost Endeavours to discover, apprehend, and bring to Justice the Persons concerned in the riotous Proceedings above-mentioned: And, as a further Inducement to discover the said Offenders, We do hereby, acting as aforesaid, promise and declare that any Person or Persons who shall discover and apprehend, or cause to

be discovered and apprehended, the Authors, Abettors or Perpetrators of any of the Outrages above-mentioned, so that they or any of them may be duly convicted thereof, shall be entitled to the Sum of FIFTY POUNDS for each and every Person who shall be so convicted, and shall also receive His Majesty's most gracious Pardon for the said Offence, in case the Person making such Discovery as aforesaid shall be liable to be prosecuted for the same: And the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury are hereby required to make Payment accordingly of the said Reward.

Given at the Court at York House, the Eighteenth Day of December One thousand eight hundred and eleven, in the Fifty-second Year of His Majesty's Reign.

Extracts of Two Letters from Captain Sir George Ralph Collier, of His Majesty's Ship the Surveillante, addressed to Admiral Sir Charles Cotton, Bart. and transmitted by the latter to John Wilson Croker, Esq.

His Majesty's Ship Surveillante, at Corunna, November 14, 1811.

I HAVE the Satisfaction to add, that every Thing English got out of Gijon, and that I learn all the Ammunition and Military Stores, not embarked, with the Exception of the Cannon before alluded to, were destroyed.

His Majesty's Ship Surveillante, at Corunna, November 16, 1811.

THE Wind blowing hard from the N. N. W. has prevented the Lyra with her Convoy from sailing for England, and this Day His Majesty's Ship Iris arrived; and from an Inclosure to Captain Christian I received your Letter No. 5.



I have the Honour to inclose Captain Christian's Report of his Proceedings since my parting with him off Berneo, by which you will perceive how seriously the Guerillas annoy the Enemy in the Province of Biscay and Guipuscoa. It appears that, with the Assistance of the Iris, Don Gaspar, after effecting his Landing, completely blocked up the Garrison of Deba in their fortified House, which, not being able to resist the Fire from the Launch, surrendered, amounting to Fifty-four Men.

From hence Gaspar immediately proceeded to the neighbouring Town of Motrico, where, by the united Exertions of Captain Christian; the same Number of the Enemy were obliged to an unconditional surrender. In this Service Two of the Enemy's Launches were taken, and whatever French public Property was found was taken or destroyed.

In the Iris have also arrived upwards of Three Hundred French Prisoners, with a Proportion of French Officers; among which Number it is said is an Aid-du-Camp of Buonaparte, Colonel Cenopieri. They form a Part of the Remains of the last Corps which was so entirely defeated by the indefatigable Guerilla, Mina; Five Hundred of the Enemy were killed or wounded, and the Remainder, Six Hundred, made Prisoners.

Captain Christian speaks in very favourable Terms of the Activity and Zeal of his First Lieutenant, Mr. Collingwood, on the late Service; and I have Pleasure in adding my Testimony to the same on former Occasions.

His Royal Highness, for the better apprehending and bringing to Justice the Persons concerned in the said atrocious Murders, is hereby pleased, in the Name and on the Behalf of His Majesty, to promise His Majesty's most gracious Pardon to any one of them (except the Person or Persons who actually perpetrated the said Murders) who shall discover his or their Accomplice or Accomplices therein, so that he, she, or they may be apprehended and convicted thereof.

And, as a further Encouragement, a Reward of FIVE HUNDRED POUNDS is hereby offered to any Person making such Discovery as aforesaid (except as is before excepted); to be paid on the Conviction of any one or more of the Offenders by the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury. LEGACY DUTY.

Stamp-Office, London, December 16, 1811.

IT having been deemed expedient to form a new Establishment, under the Commissioners or Stamps, for the better Collection of the Duties on Legacies, and on Residues of personal Estate passing by Wills, and devolving upon Intestacies; Notice is hereby given, that the Office appropriated for that Purpose is the late Hawkers and Pedlars' Office, adjoining the Royal Academy, in Somerset-Place, which will be opened on the First Day of January next; and that the Duties arising under all Wills and Letters of Administration proved in and granted by any Ecclesiastical Court, upon and after the said First Day of January next, are to be assessed and paid at that Office; and that the Duties arising under all Wills and Letters of Administration proved and granted prior to that Day, are to be assessed and paid at the old Office as heretofore.

They are also desired to observe, that in filling up the Receipts it will be indispensably necessary to specify the Time when the Testator or Intestate died, and the Court where the Will was proved, or Letters of Administration granted; and also to state the Degree of Relationship of the Legatee or next of Kin, according to the Words of the Act of Parliament, which are printed for the Guidance of Ex-

ecutors and Administrators on the Back of the Receipts.

The Duties are to be paid within Twenty-one Days after the Date of the Receipts for Legacies and Residues, and the Receipts are to be dated on the Day of signing the same. Executors and Administrators paying Legacies and Residues without taking proper Receipts, and paying the Duties within the Time prescribed, and Legatees and next of Kin receiving Legacies and Residues without giving proper Receipts for the same, and allowing a Deduction of the Duties, will be respectively liable to Penalties of Ten per Cent. on the Amount of such Legacies or Residues.

And as the Commissioners are regularly furnished by the Ecclesiastical Courts with Copies of all Wills, and an Account of all Letters of Administration, they will know on whom to call for Payment of the Duties; and they will enforce the Payment thereof by Suit in the Court of Exchequer, if not paid in due Time.

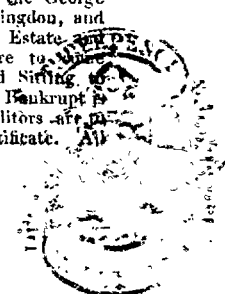
