That a General Court of the said Company will be held at their House in Lendenhall-Street, on Friday the 17th January next, from Eleven o'Clock in the Forenoon until Six in the Evening, to ballot on the following Question:

“ That this Court approve the unanimous Resolution of the Court of Directors of the 27th Ultimo, wherein they state, that they have Reason to believe that all the Persons who were on-board the Ship Ocean at the Time she is supposed to have been lost have perished, and as the Occasion and Circumstances relating to her Loss are wholly unknown, there is an Impossibility of inquiring satisfactorily into the Loss of the said Ship; that this Court are fully satisfied that the Ship was stored in a sufficient Manner at her Outfit for her Voyage, and that consequently no Blame can attach to the Owners; and that from the Experience and Ability of the Commander and Officers, it is reasonably to be inferred that no Blame attaches to them.”

And the Court of Directors, having, on the 27th Ultimo, consented, by Ballot, to restore Mr. William Henry Merriman, late Chief Mate of the extra Ship Tottenham, to the Company's Service, conformably to the Act of the Thirtieth of His present Majesty, for establishing certain Regulations for the said Company, and the said Consent of the Court of Directors having been laid before and considered at a General Court of the said Company held this Day, pursuant to Fourteen Days Notice given for that Purpose; Notice is hereby given, that at the said General Court, the following Question will also be put by the Ballot, viz.

“ That Mr. William Henry Merriman, late Chief Mate of the extra Ship Tottenham, be restored to the Company's Service.”
