AT a Council of His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales, held at Carlton-House on the 29th day of January 1812, John Vivian, of Pencalenneck, in the county of Cornwall, Esq; was appointed Sheriff of the county of Cornwall for the year 1812, by His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales in Council.

His Royal Highness the Prince Regent has been graciously pleased, by warrant under His Majesty's Royal Signet, and the Sign Manual of His Royal Highness, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, bearing date the 7th day of January last, to give and grant unto George Rawling, of the town and county of Newcastle-upon-Tyne, Esq; second son of Thomas Rawling, late of Watergate, in the county-palatine of Durham, deceased, by Elizabeth his wife, only daughter of Ralph Maddison, of Bishop Wearmouth, in the said county-palatine of Durham, and sister and heir to Thomas Maddison, of Birtley, in the parish of Chester-le-Street, in the said county-palatine of Durham, Gentleman, deceased, His Majesty's royal licence and authority that he and his issue may, in compliance with a clause in the last will and testament of his maternal uncle, the said Thomas Maddison, assume and take the surname of Maddison only, and also bear the Arms of Maddison; such arms being first duly exemplified according to the laws of arms, and recorded in the Herald's Office:

And also to order, that the said royal concession and declaration be recorded in His Majesty's College of Arms.
