

four finish'd, for that as we are told, Monsieur de Vauban, the famous Ingenier, has long since made the plan of it; and that they have been cutting trenches, and providing other Materials for this Work at *Hunningen*; the King will go to visit *Brissac* and other places in *Alsace*, and having done that, return hither. There is a report that Monsieur and Madam being so near the Palatinate, will make a visit to the Elector Palatine their Brother. The Kings Troops are now actually in *Cazal*, as we had an account by an Express that arrived some days since, who said, That they entered the place the 4th Instant; The Princes of *Italy* are not a little allarm'd thereat, and particularly the Republick of *Genova*, fearing that a Chamber of Dependencies will be set up there, as has been done at *Verona*. There are Letters from *Rome*, which say, that there begins to appear in the Pope's disposition to accommodate the Matters in difference between him and our King. Great numbers of distressed Protestants leave this Kingdom daily.

Newmarket, Dec. 6. THe Honour and Trust your Majesty hath now confer'd upon us in your late Commissions, have not only created in us a fresh sense of the Duty and humble Gratitude we owe your Sacred Majesty; but inspir'd us with joy at this new opportunity we have to Declare them; May it therefore please you S I R, That with all due Submission we offer at your Majesties Feet, the disposal of that Power you have entrust'd us with; as also this unanimous assurance, that we shall never make use of it but for your Majesties Service, the Defence of Your Sacred Person, and the maintaining you in the Lustre and Possession of all those Prerogatives, which we ever believed (but by the bold and criminal Attempts of ill Men, hath been since confirm'd) a due and just your Majesties Right, then the security of your enjoy'd Church, and the safety of our Kingdoms; nor can we with less than extraordinary satisfaction, think upon the prospect we have of this Power through the Nation, which with your Majesties favourable Eye upon it, may be both Your Glory and Support; since surely none can receive those marks of your Grace, that will not equally engage in the Defence of Your Rights for their Great S I R, For the preservation of the Protestant Religion, and for maintaining the Succession in its due course, we humbly offer you those Lives, and those Estates we can never hope quietly to enjoy, without the firm establishment of the other; and in opposition to all those, who would divide Your Majesty of your Power, to make You a Glorious Prince, and our Church of its Discipline, to exalt its pretended Purity; We prostrate our Thanks, Great S I R, for the Condescension of Your Gracious Declaration, which hath equally rescued the Justice of Your Majesties Proceedings from Malice and Ignorance; That your days may be long and happy. Your Line as ancient as Government, and your Eternity joyful, are the Prayers of

The humble Address of the Artillery Company of the City and County of *Exon*.
