

Whitehall, March 21, 1812.

His Royal Highness the Prince Regent hath been graciously pleased, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, to give and grant unto Joseph Budworth, of Oxford-Street, in the Parish of Saint Mary-le-Bone, in the County of Middlesex, Esq; and Elizabeth his wife, the only surviving daughter of Francis Palmer, late of Palmerstown, in the County of Mayo, in Ireland, Esq; deceased, and sister of Roger Palmer, late of Rush-House, and of Palmerstown, in the aforesaid County of Mayo, Esq; also deceased, His Majesty's royal licence and authority, that they and their issue may take and use the surname of Palmer, in lieu of that of Budworth, and that the arms of Palmer may be borne by him, the said Joseph Budworth, and his issue by his present wife; such armorial ensigns being first duly exemplified according to the laws of arms, and recorded in the Herald's Office, otherwise His Majesty's said licence and permission to be void and of none effect:

And also to command, that the said royal concession and declaration be registered in His Majesty's College of Arms.

Whereas it hath been humbly represented to His Royal Highness the Prince Regent, that, on Sunday morning the 23d February last, the workshops of Mr. Joseph Hirst, of Marsh, and Mr. James Balderstone, of Crosland, woollen-cloth-dressers, in the neighbourhood of Huddersfield, in the county of York, were broken into by a large number of armed people (with their persons disguised) who destroyed the frames and sheers of the dressing machines therein, and committed other damage to the premises; likewise early on

Thursday morning the 27th of February, similar outrages were committed upon the premises of William Hinchliff, of Ley Moor; also on Friday morning the 6th instant, the same violent depre-dations were committed upon the premises of Samuel Swallow, John Swallow, William Colton, and John Sykes, in the township of Linfils; likewise on Thursday the 12th instant, similar atrocities were committed on the premises of Clement Dyson, of Dungeon Wood; George Roberts, of Crosland; and John Garnar, of Honley, in the neighbourhood of Huddersfield;

His Royal Highness, for the better apprehending and bringing to justice the persons concerned in the outrages above-mentioned, is hereby pleased, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, to promise His Majesty's most gracious pardon to any one of them who shall discover his or their accomplice or accomplices therein, so that he, she, or they may be apprehended and convicted thereof.

NEW ESTABLISHMENT OF PAY AND HALF-PAY FOR NAVY CHAPLAINS.

Admiralty-Office, March 9, 1812.

THE Lords Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of the United Kingdoms of Great Britain and Ireland, do hereby give notice, that His Royal Highness the Prince Regent has been graciously pleased, by His Order in Council of the 4th instant, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, to direct, that the following regulations, in respect to the half-pay or pension to be allowed to Chaplains of His Majesty's Fleet, after long and meritorious service, as well as the pay and allowances during the period of such servitude, shall be established in future, viz.

- First.—“That every ship in His Majesty's Navy, from a first to a fifth rate inclusive, shall be allowed a Chaplain on her establishment.”
 Secondly.—“That every Chaplain after eight years of actual sea service, (or if in a guard-ship, ten years,) during which period he shall not have been absent from his duty six weeks at any one time, except by special leave from the Board of Admiralty, and who shall produce certificates of good conduct and moral behaviour from the Captains he may have served under, shall be entitled to a pension in the nature of half-pay; but no Chaplain to be entitled to half-pay or pension if he shall accept any preferment with cure of souls during the term of his required service at sea.”
 Thirdly.—“That the amount of this pension or half-pay to each Chaplain shall be five shillings per day.”
 Fourthly.—“That if in the event of a peace, or from other circumstances not depending on himself, a Chaplain shall not have been able to complete the full servitude of eight years, a pension may be conferred by the Board of Admiralty, ac-
