Sale by Execution.—First Proclamation.

By authority obtained from His Excellency Robert Gortchdon, Governor-General in and over the Colony of Barbice and its Dependencies, Vice-Admiral and President in all Courts and Colleges within the same, &c. &c. &c. granted upon a petition presented by Douglas, Reid, and Co. inhabitants of this colony, under date of 10th October 1811, versus Murdoch Dallas, proprietor of plantation Letterkenny, situated on the Correntine Coast of this colony.
