In declaring our abhorrence of such an unprovoked crime, and in condoling with your Royal Highness on such an unparalleled violation of the law, allow us to assure you of our uniform and unshaken determination to support, on every emergency, that invaluable constitution, by which the lives, the liberties, and the happiness of the British people, have been for ages so admirably protected.

We also humbly desire to state to your Royal Highness, that we have heard with sorrow and surprise of the desperate menaces anonymously sent to your Royal Highness; and we heartily lament, that any traces of riot or dissaffection should exist in this highly favoured land. We, in common with every true friend of our excellent constitution, have observed with pleasure and satisfaction, the wisdom of your government during the period in which your Royal Highness has exercised and administered the royal power and authority. And we implore your Royal Highness to accept our heartfelt gratitude, for your solicitous regard for the welfare of His Majesty's subjects. And we further beg leave to assure your Royal Highness of our ainabated attachment to the person of our beloved and venerable Sovereign, and to the admirable tabric of our constitution in church and state,

And if there do exist (of which the late organised tumults and violent proceedings in some. parts of the kingdom excite general apprehensions) evil-minded and ill-designing persons insidiously attempting (by misleading some classes of His Ma-jesty's subjects, and unjustly and maliciously attributing all evil occurrences to the measures of Government) to disturb the civil peace, and deface the constitution, so long and happily established in this empire, we trust that all such wicked machina-tions will speedily meet detection, discomfiture, infamy, and exemplary punishment, by the blessing of God aiding the means and energy of your Royal Highness's councils, and the patriotism and vigor-ous assistance of His Majesty's well-disposed

The humble and dutiful Address of the Magistrates and Council of the Town of Kilmarnock.

May it please your Royal Highness,

WE, the Magistrates and Council of the Town of Kilmarnock, impressed with feelings of the deepest sorrow and regret for the loss which the public has sustained in the death of the late Right Honourable Spencer Perceval, entreat permission to tender our condolence on the melancholy occasion.

We cannot but view with the utmost abhorrence and detestation, the atrocious act of the vile assassin, by which His Majesty's government and the country, in a juncture of difficulty and danger, have been de prived of one of their most able, enlightened, and virtuous statesmen. But we rejoice to think, the act is merely that of a solitary individual, resulting from a vicious and depraved mind, and altogether unconnected with any party who may be supposed to have been inimical to the late Minister's political conduct. Having recently had an opportunity of offering our grateful acknowledgements to your
