

Whitehall, November 3, 1812.

Whereas it has been humbly represented to His Royal Highness the Prince Regent, that, in the night of the 6th day of October last, the crew of a boat belonging to the Scourge lugger, in the service of the Customs, who had seized a six-oared galley, with a large quantity of smuggled spirits on board, at the north end of the town of Deal, in the county of Kent, were feloniously fired upon and assaulted by a number of persons, unknown from the houses and beach, who rescued the said galley and spirits, and also feloniously fired upon and assaulted Henry Pulley, Mate of the Rattlesnake lugger, in the service of the Customs, and a party of the Westmeath Militia, who came to the assistance of the said boat's crew of the Scourge lugger, and resealed the said galley only, when Zachariah Thompson, a boatman of the Customs, and John Munsoon, a private of the Westmeath Militia, were hurt by stones thrown at them by the said unknown persons;

His Royal Highness the Prince Regent, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, in order to the better apprehending and bringing to justice the persons guilty of the aforesaid felony, is graciously pleased to promise His Majesty's most gracious pardon to any one or more of the persons concerned therein (except those that actually fired), who shall discover any one or more of his accomplices, so that he or they may be apprehended and convicted thereof.

And the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs, in order to the discovery and bringing to justice the said offenders, do hereby offer a reward of THREE HUNDRED POUNDS to any person or persons (except as before excepted) who will discover any one or more of the persons guilty of the said felony; such reward to be paid on his or their conviction, by the Receiver-General of His Majesty's Customs:

Notice is hereby given, that application is intended to be made to the Honourable the House of Commons in the ensuing sessions of Parliament, in order to obtain an Act for the purpose of amending, altering, and repealing certain parts of an Act, passed in the thirty-third year of His present Majesty's reign; intituled "An Act for making and maintaining a navigable canal from the town of Brecknock to the Monmouthshire canal, near the town of Pontypool, in the county of Monmouth; and for making and maintaining railways and stone roads from such canal to several iron works and mines in the counties of Brecknock and Monmouth."
