**H**ere is lately brought in by a *Scotts Privateer*, a prize laden with Timber, taken towards the Coast of Norway.

*Plymouth, June 18.* This afternoon a Vessel arriving in two days from *Morlaix* informs us, that the Duke de Beaufort is with 16 sail of his Fleet are at *Brest*, having but few soldiers aboard him; but that there were about 2000 foot quartered in the Country near that place; 16 sail more are Cruising between the Lands End and *Ushant*, with four Fireships, which are all of them well manned, and have been seen three daies following from the *Lizard* and *Mountsbay*, but have made no attempt.

Here is lately sent in a Prize being a *French* ship laden with Wine, Brandy and Vinegar.

*Weymouth, June 19.* On Monday last we discovered 15 sail of great ships to the Westwards of *Portland*, which at the first appearance were thought *French*, but upon a nearer approach of a Vessel sent out to take an account of them, proved a Fleet of *Offenders* with their Convoyers, who delivered to them two English Merchants they had aboard them, who tell us, that in their way they met with no ships, but only one *Dutch* Caper of 30 guns, who would have seized a *Plymouth* Vessel in their company, but the *Ostend* Convoyers by threats protected her, and brought her safe to her Port.

*Portsmouth, June 20.* Yesterday two supposed prizes were sent in hither, their lading *French* Wines and Brandy.

*Warsaw, June 3.* The Diet being ended the 19 past, to the infinite satisfaction of the whole kingdom, *Te Deum* was ordered to be sung in all the Churches for this prosperous beginning of the repose of the Kingdom: His Majesty had some design of being present at a meeting of Commissioners at *Lemberg* the 23 instant, for the payment of the Army, which he has since changed, intending with his Court to be at *Cracow* about the midst of *August*, there to continue till the solemnization of the Queens Funerals in that place, which is appointed to be upon the 7th of *September* following. The Vacant places since her death are most of them disposed of, Monsieur de Noye her Treasurer, is made a Denizen of *Poland*, and hath the Government of *Touchelet* conferred on him, as the Government of *Grandenz* is on the Lord *Eorowsky*. The Lord *Cobielecky* his Majesties Envoye to the *Tartar Cham*, arrived about eight daies since at the Court, with great hopes, that the *Tartars* who assisted the Rebel *Cossacks*, will submit to the Obedience of his Majesty. The *Swedes* Express is returned this Morning with Letters from this King, in answer to those from his Master. *Cracow* is garrisoned, and the Soldiers sent thence to *Sambor*. The general Rendezvous of the Foot is appointed to be at *Faworrown*, His Majesties extraordinary Ambassador to the Great *Czar* of *Moscow*, the Lord Palatin of *Cbernikow* is ready to set forwards with a great Train of Persons of quality. 'Tis said the States of *Poland* have proposed three Ladies to his Majesty, amongst whom to choose a Wife, viz. the young Dutchess of *Inspruck*, the Widow Queen Regent of *Swedeland*; and the Eldest daughter to the great *Czar* of *Moscow*, with which last he is offered some Millions of Gold, and some Lands upon the Frontiers.

*Vienna, June 5.* The third instant arrived here a second Courier sent from the Marquis de *Castel Rodrigo* to his Imperial Majesty with the News of the advance of the King of *France*, with the Queen and his *Dauphin*, that he had with his Army passed *Arras*, and was marching towards *Brussels*, soliciting the Emperor for speedy succors; which notwithstanding is like to take up longer time than the pressing affairs of

the *Netherlands* can well permit, for though the Princes of the Empire intend effectually to assist them, yet much time will necessarily pass in the formalities of their proceeding.

An Express is sent to the Council of War to hasten their Commissioners in reviewing the forces of the Empire, out of which 'tis said, his Imperial Majesty has resolved to send them ten Regiments, besides such other forces which are raised, and to be raised upon the account of the Spanish Ambassador in this Court, who has, to this purpose, received bills of Exchange, to the value of at least 400 M. Florins. To morrow another Courier is to be sent hence for Spain. A Gentleman is also to be employed from this Court to the King of *France*, to remonstrate to him the great inconveniences which may happen upon his farther proceedings by the way of force and armes; and to desire him, that the whole matter in dispute may be put to a reference.

The Spanish Ambassador is preparing with much solemnity to receive the Fiefs of *Burgundy*, the *Low-Countries* and *Milan*; but 'tis whispered that the *French* Resident the *Sieur de Gramonville* has order from his Master to be ready to make his protestation against it.

The Emperor has ordered the Chancery of *Hungary*, to give a general pardon in due form to the Count *Balassi Imbrt* and to make him restitution of his Estate that was confiscated.

Here is even now another Courier from the *Netherlands*, posting away for *Luxembourg* to the Emperor, by whom we find the Marquis has secured all the great and considerable Towns against the *French*, and is raising such forces as will give them more difficulty in their design then they could probably have expected.

*Venice, June 9.* By a Barque arriving lately from *Cattaro*, we have Letters which inform us, that the *Turks* about *Castel-nuovo*, with some others from *Risano* to the number of 200, taking notice that the people of the County of *Zuppa* were employed at *Cattaro*, in the rebuilding of that City, took that opportunity to make an invade into that Country, where they took a considerable booty, with 20 slaves, and the heads of five, who were killed in defence of their houses, with which prey they were returning as they came by the way of *Montenegro*, but the Country upon the Alarm, getting together, pursued them; and fell so luckily upon them, that though they were now got into the *Ottoman* Territories, where they had the assistance of the Country, they were forced to save themselves by flight, leaving not only their booty behind them, but 17 of their number dead upon the place, and 16 prisoners, amongst whom *Murath*, and *Mehomet*, both of them *Agas*; and *Glanouich*, Captain of the *Corsayres*, of *Castelnuovo*: this attempt of the *Turks* will make the Country look better to their defence; and to have less confidence for the future in any truce that shall be made with such perfidious people, who having since the late terrible Earthquake upon their own desires obtained a Truce, for the better reparation of their Towns that were thereby ruined, contrary to their Faith given, took this occasion to Violate it.

By a *Feluca* purposely sent hither from *Dalmatia* we are advised, that the *Turks* have got together in *Albania*, a body of ten or twelve thousand men, and give out that their design is upon *Ragusa*: upon which Intelligence, the General of *Dalmatia* has upon several Gallies and Barques put aboard the Forces sent thither from the Pope, and dispatcht them away for defence of that place.

This news has much allarmed the City of *Cattaro*; fearing lest these forces however pretended may be employed against them.
