

An Act to amend the several Acts for regulating the distillation of spirits in Ireland.

An Act for regulating the office of Registrar of the High Court of Admiralty and High Court of Appeals for Prizes.

An Act to continue, until the first day of January one thousand eight hundred and nineteen, an Act made in the fifty-first year of His present Majesty, to explain and amend the laws touching the elections of Knights of the Shire to serve in Parliament for England, respecting the expences of hustings and poll clerks, so far as regards the city of Westminster.

An Act to amend an Act made in the forty-fifth year of the reign of His present Majesty, intituled

“An Act to amend the laws for improving and keeping in repair the post roads in Ireland, and for rendering the conveyance of letters, by His Majesty's Post Office, more secure and expeditious.”

An Act for the further support and maintenance of stipendiary curates.

An Act to render valid and to authorise the payment and granting of certain pensions at Kilmainham Hospital; and to empower the Commissioners of the said hospital to commute pensions for a sum of money, in certain cases.

An Act to enable the Phoenix Assurance Company of London to sue and be sued in the name of their Secretary or any member.

And one private Act.

**T**HIS day, the Lords being met, a message was sent to the Honourable House of Commons by the Deputy Usher of the Black Rod, acquainting them, that *The Lords, authorised by virtue of a Commission under the Great Seal, signed by the Prince Regent, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, for declaring His Majesty's Royal Assent to several Acts agreed upon by both Houses, do desire the immediate attendance of the Honourable House in the House of Peers to hear the Commission read; and the Commons being come thither, the said Commission, empowering the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, the Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, and several other Lords therein named, to declare and notify the Royal Assent to the said Acts, was read accordingly, and the Royal Assent given to*

An Act for granting the sum of fifty thousand pounds to John Palmer, Esq. in consideration of the public services performed by the said John Palmer in the improvement of the Post-Office revenue.

An Act for continuing in the East India Company, for a further term, the possession of the British territories in India, together with certain exclusive privileges for establishing further regulations for the government of the said territories, and the better administration of justice within the same; and for regulating the trade to and from the places within the limits of the said Company's charter.

An Act to provide for the payment of the charge of the annuities created in respect of the sum of

six millions, granted for the service of Ireland for the year one thousand eight hundred and thirteen.

An Act to relieve persons who impugn the doctrine of the Holy Trinity from certain penalties.

An Act for vesting in His Majesty certain parts of Windsor Forest, in the county of Berks; and for inclosing the open commonable lands within the said forest.

An Act to limit the responsibility of ship-owners in certain cases.

An Act for extending and amending an Act of Queen Anne for making the River Cham more navigable from Clayhithe Ferry to the Queen's-Mill, in the county of Cambridge.

An Act to enable the Norwich Union Society, for the insurance of lives and survivorship, to sue in the name of their Secretary, and to be sued in the names of their Directors, Treasurers, and Secretary.

An Act to enable the Norwich Union Society, for insurance against loss by fire, to sue in the name of their Secretary, and to be sued in the names of their Directors, Treasurers, and Secretary.
